

## Haskell Reserve Major Terry M. Diggs Honored Upon Retirement

A veteran Army officer from Haskell who spent a year in German prisoner-of-war camps after being captured in World War II was honored Saturday upon his retirement from 28 years of active and reserve military service.

Major Terry M. Diggs was presented a certificate of achievement for meritorious service as an instructor in Abilene for the 415th Fort Worth U. S. Army Reserve School for the past six years.

490th, thanked Major Diggs for his contributions to the achievements of that organization.

A rural mail carrier working out of Haskell for the Weimer post office since 1938 (with seven years out for active duty), Major Diggs enlisted in the Army in Abilene as an aviation cadet in May, 1942.

He received his commission in 1943 and was flying a mission over northern Germany when he was shot down and captured without injuries.

Prior to becoming an instructor in the school, Major Diggs was a platoon commander in the 490th Civil Affairs Co., at whose weekend drill the awards were given him Saturday.

Presenting the certificate on behalf of Col. Henry Creel of Fort Worth, commandant of the school, was Lt. Col. Jack Holden of Abilene, coordinator for the school in Abilene.

He spent a year in prison camps in Germany and Poland before being released at the end of the war.

He returned to active duty during the Korean War, then was a member of the 490th when it was called up during the Berlin Crisis in 1961. He was promoted to major two years later.

He and his wife, Kathleen, a teacher at Haskell High School, have one daughter, Terry Kay, 18, a senior at Haskell High.

It may not be Round-Up time in Texas, or Spring time in the Rockies, but it will be "Clean-Up" week in Haskell beginning Monday, April 20th, and continuing through Friday, April 24th.

Next Monday, city trucks will begin hauling away trash and rubbish from the residential areas of town.

In designating the coming week as "Spring Clean-Up," city officials are asking Haskellites to put forth extra effort to make this the most intensive of its kind in years. To that end the cooperation of all citizens is necessary, including individuals, civic groups and organizations.

Residents are not only reminded to rid their premises of winter rubbish but to join their neighbors in cleaning vacant lots.

The city will provide trucks to haul away rubbish and trash of all kinds, except trees, limbs and anything that will not burn, that becomes a menace to health as well as causing an unsightly appearance. All trash should be placed in containers for quick handling, but if unable to obtain containers, rubbish should be piled in a location accessible to the city trucks.

City officials are going all-out to make this the most thorough clean-up ever in Haskell, but in order to do this, full cooperation from all citizens will be needed.

Here are some of the things Haskellites can do to help promote the city-wide clean-up campaign:

Clean-out garages, basements, attics, etc., of things that might be a fire-hazard; clear yards or lots of all trash; trim shrubbery, hedges, repair and paint fences, clear-off any vacant lots, or space around your premises.

In the business section, keep windows clean and sidewalks clear; wear entrances free from unsightly rubbish; don't throw garbage or refuse of any kind in back yards, or vacant lots; place garbage and trash in piles for easy pick-up and place in accessible location.

Clean-Up Week will also be an ideal time to paint-up and brighten the home and make Haskell sparkle with attractiveness.

### Automobile Visitors to Texas Added More Than \$1 Billion To Economy

For the second time in history, automobile visitors to Texas added more than \$1 billion to the State's economy, the Texas Highway Department reported today.

The Department's annual Visitor Industry Report estimates that out-of-state automobile visitors spent a record \$1.06 billion, an increase of 4.5 per cent over the 1968 level.

Visitors who arrived in Texas by commercial transportation added \$503 million, according to the Texas Tourist Council, for a grand total of almost \$1.6 billion.

Although spending by automobile visitors was up during 1968, the total number of visitors was down 2 per cent. In all, 16.3 million out-of-staters visited Texas by automobile. That was approximately 325 thousand less than in 1968 when the HemisFair in San Antonio was in the national spotlight.

Estimated total expenditures by automobile visitors was up by \$46.2 million over 1968. Average visitor expenditures were \$11.47 per day, compared to \$10.88 per day in the previous year.

More than 1 million visitors were assisted by professional travel counselors at the 11 Travel Information Centers operated by the Texas Highway Department. The centers are located at key highway gateways to the State, in the Capitol in Austin and at the Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center in Langtry.

In addition, the Department's Travel and Information Division answered some 221 thousand mail requests for literature and information about Texas.

Of that number, 17 per cent were coupons generated by the Texas Travel Development Agency's media advertising program.

Data on automobile visitors were developed from information contained in more than 22 thousand questionnaires completed by visitors at the end of their Texas travels.

In addition, regularly scheduled visual traffic counts were conducted by Highway Department personnel.

The survey revealed that more than half a million Mexican citizens who can be classified as tourists visited Texas. This included some 410 thousand who came by car and 96.8 thousand who arrived by plane.

The figures include only those Mexican citizens who secured permits from the U. S. Government to stay more than 72 hours or to travel more than 150 miles from the border.

The survey also showed that the typical tourist party visiting Texas consisted of 2.8 persons who stayed 5.7 days. Nearly one third of those responding to questionnaires said it was their first visit to Texas.

The survey also indicated that almost 83 per cent of the visitors were favorably impressed. Most frequently mentioned "likes" of the visitors were highways, tourist bureaus, Texas and safety rest areas. Fre-

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





WASHINGTON, D. C. — The 14th Amendment in our Constitution has been the launching pad for many controversial Supreme Court decisions in recent years.

Just a few days ago it entered another dimension unheard of or imagined. It embraced the extraordinary idea that an individual can claim welfare

payments as a "property" right even when his eligibility to receive payments from the Government is under question. The 14th Amendment provides that no entity of government can deprive persons of life, liberty and property without due process of law. The Court by a 5 to 3 vote decided that welfare payments were a part of the individual's "property" and they can not be removed from welfare rolls without a court hearing. There is little doubt that a Government attorney will be furnished to represent the individual, although in other instances it is illegal for those in Government to represent a client having a claim against the Government. The Ruling strikes at the

heart of the concept that welfare programs are an instrument of charitable support. Instead, the decision portrays the collection of welfare benefits as an established property right. In a dissent, Justice Hugo Black said, "Government's promise of charity expressed in our welfare programs considered to be a property right, strains credulity."

An immediate consequence of the ruling will not only add to the already staggering cost of welfare but will lead to endless hearings before courts already burdened with overloaded dockets. In the meantime, those found ineligible by those responsible for such a determination will continue to be paid.

The elevation of public welfare into an obligation of the Government to support every citizen is in danger of being written even more explicit into our laws when the Nixon Administration's "Family Assistance Plan" is enacted by the Congress.

The Administration's proposal assures every family that its income, for whatever reason, will not fall below a specified level.

Once people are on the welfare rolls, under the Court's ruling it will be extremely difficult for them to be removed, even though it is determined

by local welfare administrators that their eligibility has ceased to exist. It will discourage efforts to remove those found to disqualify for whatever reason.

It is not a matter of not being responsive to the genuine needs of unfortunate people. The American people have always responded in helping those who can not help themselves. Cities, counties, states, the Federal Government—plus countless private agencies, organizations and groups, provide aid to genuinely needy people. True charity is one thing but a Court's decision which says it is guaranteed under the Constitution removes the moral concept of charity and places those who are unwilling to work in a position to claim public money as a property right. It gives the lazy and shiftless a right alongside those in genuine need and who are unable to support themselves.

The court's decision is a violation of the property rights of

the American taxpayer who is required to contribute a goodly portion of his earnings to those who have no inclination to better themselves. The decision denies property rights to men and women who get up every morning and go to their jobs. The Court's action has the effect of confiscating property through taxation to be handed out in the name of charity which brings us to the point where there is no charitable duty or obligation except that of the Government—where there is no moral concept except that which is set by the Government—no conscience but state conscience. Perhaps the latter is even more serious to us as a people.





### Judge McCloud Campaigns In Haskell County

Judge Austin McCloud of Colorado City was here Monday, April 13, campaigning for election as Chief Justice of the Eastland Court of Civil Appeals. McCloud, accompanied by his wife, Mary Anne, spent a good part of the day visiting with local friends and supporters. Mrs. McCloud, a Colorado City school teacher, has taken a months leave of absence and is campaigning with the Judge.

In an interview, McCloud said that he has visited every county in the District and that he is grateful for the support and interest that he has found for his candidacy.

The veteran District Judge added that he has felt particularly honored by the overwhelming support he has received from the lawyers in the 23-county District. In a judicial poll conducted by State Bar of Texas, lawyers in the District voted more than 4 to 1 for Judge McCloud over his opponent. The vote was 225 for McCloud and 48 for his opponent. This preference was emphasized by the vote of lawyers in the home counties of the two candidates. Judge McCloud was favored more than 2 to 1, in his opponent's home county of Taylor, while in his own home county of Mitchell, it was unanimous for Judge McCloud. Moreover, McCloud has been unanimously endorsed by lawyers of the 32nd Judicial District of Nolan, Fisher and Mitchell counties where he now serves as District Judge.

His legal writings have been published on invitation in State and national lawyers and judges journals, and he has been recognized by his fellow judges who elected him to serve on the important Executive Committee of the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas. He has been recognized nationally as a judge by being invited to attend the National College of State Trial Judges. McCloud graduated from Texas Tech and received his law degree from Baylor University. He served in the United States Air Force during the Korean Conflict.

The planned 1,900-foot venture spots 5006 feet from south and 2413 from east lines of A. Rodriguez survey.

Brittany Drilling Co., Dallas, staked No. 4 C. M. Walsworth in the O'Brien, North (Strawn) Field, 1 1/2 miles east of O'Brien.

Environmental pollution is a people problem, as well as an industrial problem. While we demand that industry do something about polluting air and water, we should go a step farther and crack down on the individual polluters that number in the tens of millions.

The National Academy of Sciences in cooperation with the highway departments of 29 states, has just completed a study. It shows a lot of people aren't nearly as concerned about pollution as they profess to be. Each month, American motorists drop an average of 1,304 pieces of trash on every mile of the nation's vast network of primary highways...nearly 16,000 pieces per mile each year. Paper items accounted for 59 per cent of total roadside litter. The rest was tabulated at 16 per cent cans, 6 per cent plastic items, 6 per cent bottles and jars, and 13 per cent miscellaneous.

The large miscellaneous grouping included tires, lumber and a variety of unclassified items ranging from hair curlers, underwear and false teeth to ice chests and washing machines. This is the work of a public that, judging by press accounts, is calling for instant solutions to all our environmental problems.

#### TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

It's a pretty good guess that the Taxpayer Service Representatives at the Internal Revenue Service could give you an accurate date even if they had completely lost their calendar. The questions have changed this past week from "How do I get an extension to delay filing my income tax return?" to "When do I get my refund?"

The Taxpayer Service Representatives have a good answer for you on "When do I get my refund?" As you would guess, the answer is "It depends." If you filed your return before April 1 and made no errors to hold up the processing, the chances are good that you will have to wait about 6 weeks for that refund check if one is due. If you filed as a member of the 11:59 p. m. April 15 Club, your chances for having an error that will delay your refund are real good. If you have an error, you will get your refund about 6 weeks after Internal Revenue has got back the correct information from you and had a chance to correct the errors. How long this will be is probably indefinite. If you did manage to join the 11:59 p. m. April 15 Club, and still escape without an error, getting your refund will take a little bit longer than for the taxpayer who filed earlier. Be assured that you can't drop by and pick up the refund on April 16 or 17. IRS hasn't quite set all of the returns out of the mail bag by this time.

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
