Death was from complications resulting from injuries suffered in an automobile accident near Clovis, N. M. May 20. Injuries of the mishap were fatal to his wife. She was instantly killed in the collision.

He was taken to the hospital July 28 after a paralysis stroke. He recently had been residing at the home of a sister, Mrs. Ed Farris, in Lubbock.

Mr. Rankin, who was born August 16, 1889, at Gay Hill, Texas, had been a member of the Baptist church since childhood.

NO EMPLOYMENT IN CALIFORNIA

Agricultural workers in the Abernathy area today were urged not to go to California in search of work by A. B. Cherry, Manager of the Plainview office of the Texas State Employment Service.

"To go with the mere hope of finding work there will result in disappointment and hardships for most migratory workers," Mr. Cherry said.

Agricultural workers entering California increased from approximately 2,000 in January to more than 5,000 in June, according to records of the United States Employment Service. The June total represented an increase of more than 1,600 over the corresponding month of the previous year.

Because of the surplus of workers that continue to exist in California, Texas workers who migrate there in search of jobs that do not exist are certain to find the trip to be a costly and useless venture, Mr. Cherry pointed out.

OCTOBER 31 LAST DATE FOR FILING IN AAA PROGRAM

The AAA will not recognize assignments of payments under the 1939 agriculture conservation program after October 31, 1939, said J. W. Evans, secretary of the Hale county agriculture conservation association, said.

Following is Evans' statement:

"In regard to final date for filing forms ACP-69 under the 1939 agricultural conservation program, no assignments of payments under the 1939 agricultural conservation program will be recognized by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration after October 31, 1939. Therefore, all lending agencies who are taking assignments on form ACP-69 should bear this in mind."

Near 3,000 Soldiers Pass Through Here By Truck and Train

Close to three thousand soldiers in the nations standing army passed through here by truck and train the last few days, enroute to maneuvers at Camp Bullis and Camp Palacios. A special train, of 13 coaches passed through here last Saturday morning enroute to Palacios, bearing 250 or more National Guardsmen of the Texas Panhandle. The men entrained at Amarillo, Canyon, Plainview, Lubbock and Snyder on their way to the summer maneuvers.

Monday more than 500 men came through by truck, from Fort Morgan, Colo., enroute to Camp Bullis. Field equipment was carried in the trucks and on trailers behind the trucks.

Tuesday morning saw the largest movement of soldiers through here when almost 2,000 officers and men of the 20th U. S. Infantry, from Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyoming, passed through. The army games are to be from Aug. 14 to Sept. 2, when the men will return over the same route to their starting points.

After camping for two days in the fair grounds at Amarillo, the 20th Inf. next moved to Big Spring where it camped Tuesday night. The Tuesday movement through here saw 189 vehicles in service. There were 2 sedans, 2 ambulances, five motorcycles, 18 small trucks, three pickups, 131 ton and a half cargo trucks, and 28 trailers.

The convoy closed up without distance between trucks occupies a single line 1 1-2 miles long.

The convoy in motion runs in five serials or sections at ten-mile interval with a hundred yards between vehicles of each serial or section to enable civilian traffic proceeding in the same direction the convoy is traveling to cut in and out of the column without delay, and occupies a road space of 10 1-2 miles.

The rate of speed is dependent upon the type of highway traveled, the population of districts passed through, traffic encountered, weather, and time of day.

Every effort is made to cause just as little confusion as possible during the time the convoy is on the highway.

TO SOW WHEAT THIS MONTH

ABERNATHY SUPERINTENDENT AT COLORADO COLLEGE

The Workshop of the Colorado State College of Education in Greeley names among its participants this summer Mr. Frank Andrews, Superintendent of Schools of Abernathy Public Schools.

The Greeley Workshop is one of ten being sponsored this summer by the Progressive Education Association. Other Workshops are located at Denver, Portland, Claremont Colleges (Calif.), Palo Alto, Columbus, Chicago, Evanston, Bronxville and Syracuse. The workshop movement started in 1936 as a method of in-service education for teachers from the Association's eight year experiment. The plan was so successful that it has been extended to include a limited number of selected teachers from all over the nation.

Each teacher brings to the Workshop the problem he faces in his particular school. By group discussion, conferences with staff members, and an individualized program of reading and study, each teacher attacks his problem. Instead of "taking a course" in a general area within which the teacher's particular problem may be only incidentally treated, the Workshop participant arranges his program so that all of his activities are centered around this problem.

Mr. Andrews says "Problems of school administration and guidance have been my program. The Workshop affords a unique opportunity for me to work on these problems under expert advisors."

Mr. Andrews and his family will return to Abernathy about August 20. School opens here and at County Line September 4.

HUGE ENGINE, COMING FOR FARMERS GIN

Power, 29,000 pounds of it, is enroute from Beloit, Wis. to Abernathy Farmer's Co-op gin. That is the weight of the new Fairbanks-Morse, three-cylinder, engine to be installed this month at the gin. The old two-cylinder engine has been moved to Dallas and its foundation has been taken out to make room for the new foundation, 29 cubic yards of concrete, for the larger engine.

Additional feature of the gin this year will be a new type overhead bur machine and cleaner. This extra machinery to give better ginning service weighs 17,000 pounds, said W. H. Brown, manager.

New stands, press and other machinery was installed there last year.

Robert Young in boots and sombrero is a novel sight that awaits motion picture fans at the local theatre, where he makes his debut as a he-man of the plains in "Maisie," the new comedy-drama in which he is featured with Ann Sothern. Although fans should not be surprised, because horses are Young's side-line in private life, they probably will be when they see him as a two-fisted, woman-hating rancher who can ride, fight or love as the occasion demands.

"Maisie" is a story laid in the West, but is not a horse opera in any sense of the word. It is a very modern story of the tangled lives of four people—a rancher, a honky-tonk showgirl, an Eastern business man and his wife who are brought together through circumstances that at times are humorous yet build to a big dramatic climax when a suicide leads to a murder trial.

There is no cattle rustling, nor gold claims at stake. There is no chase in the final reel with the hero arriving in the nick of time to save the girl from the conniving villain. But it is replete with smart story angles and sums up to fine, intelligent and, at times, thrilling entertainment.

Ann Sothern plays Maisie Raver who is stranded in Big Horn, Wyoming, when the manager of her honky-tonk show vanishes with the funds. She meets Slim Martin, a ranch manager and woman hater, when she is accused of stealing his wallet at a carnival concession in which she gets a job.
