West Brings First 1939 Bale To Monroe

J. R. West, who operates a farm four or five miles east of Monroe, Friday brought the first bale of 1939 cotton to W. O. Fortenberry's gin there. It was ginned free of charge and Monroe merchants are to give premiums on the first bale.

The 1,500 pounds of seed cotton yielded 535 pounds of lint and 735 pounds of seed. Grading strict mid-ling, the Paymaster cotton staple was 31-32.

West's farm is in the Paymaster one-variety block of about 5,000 acres which was organized last spring by Fortenberry.

The first bale was fully matured cotton which opened under natural conditions.

Cotton from which the first bale was harvested was planted May 10 and first blooms were noticed July 7.

West is a state certified seed breeder and he has fine crops on his section of irrigated land. Samples of his good feed crop are displayed in the office of Fortenberry's gin.

Four bales of 1939 cotton were received this week at Monroe Farmers' Co-op gin, said S. B. Campbell, manager. They were brought in by E. J. Exum and Herman Habbinga.

School Opens At New Deal

Following an opening program Monday morning in the auditorium, classes have started at New Deal schools. Enrollment there Tuesday totaled about 440, announced Supt. A. L. Faubion. The high school there has 23 1-2 affiliated credits. All grade school students of the district attend classes at New Deal this year.

MONROE MEET ENDS
(Left Out Last Week)
A successful Baptist meeting closed at Monroe Sunday night. There were eight candidates baptized by the pastor, W. K. Horn, Sunday afternoon. There were six conversions, eight for baptism and six came on promise of letters. The church moved on for the glory of Christ Sunday night. Morning crowds averaged 42 and evening exceeded 120 average.

Fortenberry's New Gin Ready For Operation

In his advertisement in this Review, W. O. Fortenberry, Monroe ginner, announces that his two gins are ready for operation. Work recently was completed on his new plant which will be used to gin Paymaster cotton from the 5,000-acre one-variety block in the Monroe area.

The new plant is located north of the other gin, which was constructed in 1937. Both gins have new Lummus machinery housed in all-metal fire-proof buildings.

The plant built this year will be known as gin No. 1. It has four 80 Lummus stands. All machinery in the gin is of the latest type and was specially constructed to handle long staple cotton. Paymaster cotton only will be ginned at that plant. It is an automatic double-moting gin.

The other plant will be gin No. 2 and will be used to gin all varieties of cotton, Fortenberry said. It has five 80 Lummus stands and the machinery is designed to handle cotton of all staple lengths.

Both plants are powered with electric motors. Cotton dryers in the gins are heated from two 30 HP steam boilers using automatically controlled natural gas.

Equipment has been installed to control dust and flying lint in the two plants, thus creating more desirable working conditions and eliminating fire hazards.

Four bonded and insured warehouses are operated by Fortenberry. An 80-bale seed cotton house furnishes storage space for unginned cotton.

Machinery from the old gin, which was replaced by plant No. 1, was sold to an East Texas gin company and is now in operation there.

Fortenberry has been a ginner at Monroe since 1930 when he bought the interest of R. T. Moudy.

Subject to the approval of his customers, Fortenberry has bought 1,000 patterns of cotton bagging and will use it upon request by farmers. He will also have jute and sugar cloth bagging for those who prefer that type.

Although deterioration the last several days will decrease their yield, crops in the Monroe territory "are still fair," Fortenberry said.
