**How Does the New Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act**

**Compare With the Old 1906 Act?**

J. O. Clarke, Chief of the Central District, Food and Drug Administration replies that "the new law is a more effective agent against the use of unfit cream in the manufacture of butter" because, in addition to perpetuating the prohibitions of the old law against unfit food products, it "introduces a very important section which condemns as adulterated a food product which has been . . . prepared, packed, or held under unsanitary conditions whereby it may have become contaminated . . ."

As far back as July, 1934, W. G. Campbell, Chief of the Food and Drug Administration, Washington, D. C., said, in a notice to the dairy and butter industry in substance:

It is evident that the objectionable conditions responsible for the adulteration are largely the result of carelessness in the handling of the cream and milk at various stages from the time of production up to its manufacture into dairy products, and that the condition of the butter and cheese itself is traceable to

the unfit character of the cream and milk used in its manufacture.

Producers, shippers and users of cream and milk are warned that precautions should immediately be taken by every agency concerned, from the producer of the milk to the ultimate manufacturer and shipper of butter and cheese, to correct this situation. The Administration has observed with approval the steps taken by various branches of the industry for improvement. These steps are essential, but to be effective must be participated in by each and every branch of the industry, including producers, purchasers, receivers and manufacturers.

These statements, Mr. Clarke emphasizes, "are no less pertinent today than they were . . . nearly six years ago." Under date of June 3, 1940, the Food and Drug Administration served notice upon the butter industry that the Administration "expects to continue legal actions against unfit butter and cheese."

*Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act*—(Public Act No. 717, 75th Congress, approved June 25, 1938, effective in part June 25, 1938, and in part June 25, 1939; amended by Public Act No. 151, 76th Congress, approved June 23, 1939.) An Act to prohibit the movement in interstate commerce of adulterated and misbranded food . . . and for other purposes.  
**PROHIBITED ACTS**  
Sec. 301. The following acts and the causing thereof are hereby prohibited:  
(a) The introduction or delivery for introduction into interstate commerce of any food . . . that is adulterated or misbranded.  
(b) The adulteration or misbranding of any food . . . in interstate commerce.  
(c) The receipt in interstate commerce of any food . . . that is adulterated or misbranded, and the delivery or proffered delivery thereof for pay or otherwise.  
(e) The refusal to permit access to or copying of any record as required by Section 703.  
(f) The refusal to permit entry or inspection as authorized by Section 704.  
**PENALTIES**  
Sec. 303. (a) Any person who violates any of the provisions of Section 301 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall on conviction thereof be subject to imprisonment for not more than one year, or a fine of not more than \$1,000, or both such imprisonment and fine; but if the violation is committed after a conviction of such person under this section has become final such person shall be subject to imprisonment for not more than three years, or a fine of not more than \$10,000, or both such imprisonment and fine. (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, in case of a violation of any of the provisions of section 301, with intent to defraud or mislead, the penalty shall be imprisonment for not more than three years, or a fine of not more than \$10,000, or both imprisonment and fine. **DON'T TAKE CHANCES**

... that the new Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act covers everything that goes into a food product—and that this includes milk and cream for butter and cheese making?  
... that unfit milk and cream under this law are considered to be *adulterated foods*?  
... that unfit milk and cream may be seized, condemned and destroyed by Federal and State authorities?  
... that anyone who *introduces* unfit milk or cream in interstate commerce, or who *delivers* it for introduction in interstate commerce, or who *receives* it in interstate commerce, or who *holds it in any place where it may become unfit* is liable to the severe penalties of the law?  
... that Federal inspectors have the right to enter and inspect any place where milk or cream is produced, where it is received or held for shipment or delivery, or where it is manufactured into butter—and that it is against the law to deny them such access?  
... that this includes *farms, cream stations, trucks, railroad stations or cars, and creameries*?  
... that unfit milk or cream means *serious trouble* to all who produce or handle it, whether it crosses state lines or not?  
... that many states have adopted new food laws to conform with the new Federal Act and others propose to follow the spirit of the Federal Act under their present laws?
