

The county commissioners court and city council, in joint session Monday morning, chose Duncan from a list of eight applicants to handle issuance of stamps and other details. He will serve at a salary of \$115 monthly, and will be required to furnish an automobile for transportation and give surety bond of \$4,000

County and city governments will require Duncan to spend regular periods at Abernathy, Hale Center and Petersburg each month, and shorter time at Halfway and Edmonson. The issuing office, probably to be stuated in the courthouse, will have clerical assistance provided by WPA.

How Does the New Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act Compare With the Old 1906 Act?

J. O. Clarke, Chief of the Central District, Food and Drug Administration replies that "the new law is a more effective agent against the use of unfit cream in the manufacture of butter" because, in addition to perpetuating the prohibitions of the old law against unfit food products, it "introduces a very important section which condemns as adulterated a food product which has been ' . . . prepared, packed, or held under unsanitary conditions whereby it may have become contaminated . . . '.'

As far back as July, 1934, W. G. Campbell, Chief of the Food and Drug Administration, Washington, D. C., said, in a notice to the dairy and butter industry in substance:

It is evident that the objectionable conditions responsible for the adulteration are largely the result of carelessness in the handling of the cream and milk at various stages from the time of production up to its manufacture into dairy products, and that the condition of the butter and cheese itself is traceable to

the unfit character of the cream and milk

used in its manufacture.

Producers, shippers and users of cream and milk are warned that precautions should immediately be taken by every agency concerned, from the producer of the milk to the ultimate manufacturer and shipper of butter and cheese, to correct this situation. The Administration has observed with approval the steps taken by various branches of the industry for improvement. These steps are essential, but to be effective must be participated in by each and every branch of the industry, including producers, purchasers, receivers and manufacturers.

These statements, Mr. Clarke emphasizes, "are no less pertinent today than they were . . . nearly six years ago." Under date of June 3, 1940, the Food and Drug Administration served notice upon the butter industry that the Administration "expects to continue legal actions against unfit butter and cheese."
