Section 16 Grant Requests

The Texas Department of Transportation has issued a request for applications from non profit organizations to apply for Section 16 grants. To be eligible, these organizations must provide transportation services to elderly and or disabled persons, or be in need of equipment for eligible transportation programs.

Section 16 grants provide for eligible capital expenses to include the replacement of buses, vans, trolleys and other vehicles used to transport elderly and or disabled persons. Also included are the purchases of vehicles

for service expansions, purchase of radio equipment and necessary auxiliary equipment. The funding is appropriated by the Federal Government under the Federal Transit Act.

To be eligible for consideration, each proposal must include a completed Section 16 grant nomination form. Forms for organizations in the Abilene District are available from Joe Clark, P.O. Box 150, Abilene, Texas 79604. He may be reached by telephone at 915/676-6812.

Written proposals must be received in Clark's office on or before January 26, 1996.

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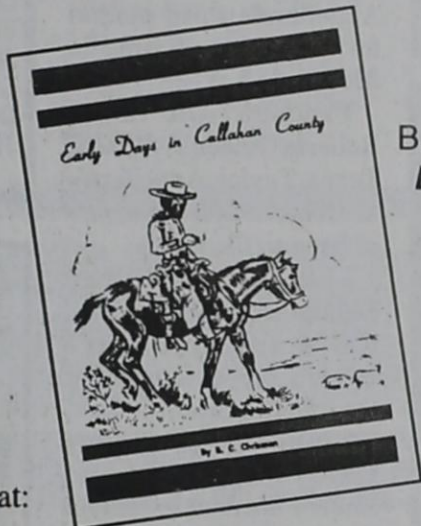

Views On Dental Health

WHAT IS ROOT CANAL?

Years ago, a badly infected tooth was doomed to be pulled. Today, that's a last resort. Root canal treatment consists of: 1. the removal of the infected pulp that lies within the root canals of the tooth, and 2. the sealing of the root ends to prohibit any further infection.

The pulp is the tooth's center core of soft tissue (nerves, blood vessels and fibers). When the dentist removes a "nerve" from a tooth, he really removes pulpal tissue that contains the nerve.

Removing the pulp from the tooth does not produce a "dead" tooth. It

will be very much alive and functioning because it has a source of blood and nerve supply from the surrounding tissues that hold it in place. The tooth will have no sense of feeling because the nerve has been removed, but the tooth itself will be fine; it should last as long as your other teeth and could even be eventually used as an anchor tooth for a denture or bridge.

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New James Bond Movie, 'Golden Eye' Showing At Majestic This Weekend

For the first time in the 90's James Bond, writer Ian Fleming's Agent 007, brings his trademark combination of action, style and wit to the big screen in the new movie Goldeneye.

The 16 previous Bond films had pretty much run through all Fleming's novels and short stories. So a team of writers collaborated on finding new ways to place the entire world at risk, and even more innovative ways for 007 to save it.

Jeffrey Caine and Bruce Feirstein wrote the screenplay for Goldeneye, from a story by Michael France.

Even as these creative aspects were coming together at United Artists, perhaps the most vital element was yet to be decided: Who would be the new James Bond?

Eight years earlier, a handsome young Irish actor named Pierce Brosnan had almost captured a Bond part. In 1994 the same actor became the unanimous choice of the filmmakers.

Brosnan reflects, "It was something that came and went out of my life in '86, and though I didn't wait in the wings for it to come back, come back it did. When something happens in your life a second time, it carries a

certain significance." The actor adds that he's been a part of the James Bond audience for many years, having seen Goldfinger back in 1964.

"I was a ten-year-old lad from the bogs of Ireland and there was this beautiful gold lady on a bed. It made quite an impression on me!" Director Martin Campbell says: "If you look back at all the various actors who have played Bond, they've all brought entirely different characteristics to the role.

"Now we've got Brosnan, who has all the right qualities. He's not only a fine actor, but is wonderful with humor, fantastic at action, and is a terrific looking guy with a real classiness to him."

In the picture a number of International actors play the roles of friends and foes to Bond. There are the usual ruthless double agents, sinister plots, and of course some beautiful women.

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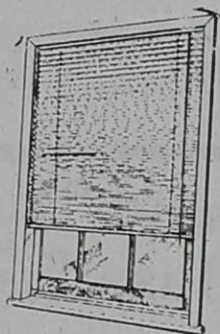

Computers May Help Meet Agrichemical Record Requirements

Jose G. Pena, Extension Economist-Management
Concerns for health, the environment and a perceived erosion of resources have caused legislators to encourage chemical users to find ways to reduce dependence on their use and passing laws to document their use.

Four basic laws (two state and two federal) have been passed recently requiring applicator licenses for the use of restricted use chemicals and requiring specific records to be kept when agrichemicals are applied: the Texas Agricultural Hazardous Communication Law, commonly known as the Right-to-Know (RTK) law; the Texas Pesticide and Herbicide Law; the 1990 Farm Bill; and, the Federal Worker Protection Standards (WPS).

keeping requirements and improve the management of agrichemical use.
This brief article will attempt to summarize recordkeeping requirements and identify computer software which may help a user comply with requirements.

Who Should Keep Records
Farmers (including ranchers), foresters, and managers of nurseries and greenhouse who meet any of the following criteria must keep accurate agrichemical use records;
*employ at least one full time or part-time individual outside the immediate family.
*use registered agricultural chemicals (the term registered refers to any chemical which is registered anywhere, not just to restricted use chemicals).
*employ seasonal or migrant workers with a payroll of \$15,000 per year or permanent employees with a

payroll of \$50,000/year.
*use or store 55 gallons or 500 pounds of a single active ingredient registered chemical.

Records
Agrichemical recordkeeping requirements include the date/time of application, specific location, name/license number of person(s) making or supervising the application, crop/pest treated, product name/EPA number/active ingredient, rate/volume of material applied, total area treated, restricted entry interval (REI) and wind velocity/direction/air temperature at the specific time/place of application. Date and place of chemical storage must also be maintained. Some records must be kept for two years while others must be kept for 30 years. The 30 year record requirement is in the process of being reduced to 2 years. In addition, the restricted entry interval (REI) for a specific application must be posted prominently in the farm and the REI record kept for 30 days.

Computerized Records
Software packages to help keep records fall into two categories; field recordkeeping systems and stand alone agrichemical recordkeeping programs.
Field crop recordkeeping systems are designed to keep a closer tab on field operations and crop performance. While most of the crop record programs let users record chemical use, these are more specialized programs and are likely to be the most useful to large intensive operations orchards, citrus groves, vegetables producers, etc.
These recordkeeping systems vary in complexity from full Geographic Information Systems (GIS) which are often linked to satellites and monitor specific field activities, to simple direct entry programs to help a user to improve the management of farm activities.

Agrichemical Recordkeeping Software
A second set of software focuses on agrichemical records only and would be generally considered simpler to use if the user's primary objective is to computerize agrichemical use records.
These programs satisfy most federal and state Restricted Use Pesticide recordkeeping requirements; some manufacturers offer separate state-specific modules that will help users comply with the more stringent pesticide reporting requirements that are, so far, required in only a few states, including California, Washington, and Texas. Some programs are designed for labor intensive operations and frequent pesticide applications while other software suppliers differentiate their software by designing programs specifically for use by a specific unit (farm or ranch) and modifying the software for use by commercial applicators.
About twenty-five software developers were contacted for example copies of their software. Eight software packages in the second category, stand-alone agrichemical recordkeeping systems, were reviewed (Table 1).

Penalties
Failure to keep correct records is subject to the same penalties as any other violation of that particular law.
*1990 Farm Bill compliance is under the direction of the USDA and violators may be subject to fines from \$0-\$1,000.
*compliance for WPS and the Texas law is directed by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).
Penalties may include: warning and 14 days to comply (first time offender), \$0-\$2,000 per violation with a \$4,000 maximum fine by TDA (failure to comply with warning), criminal charges with possible fines to \$25,000 as determined by a court (knowingly violating), and civil lawsuits.

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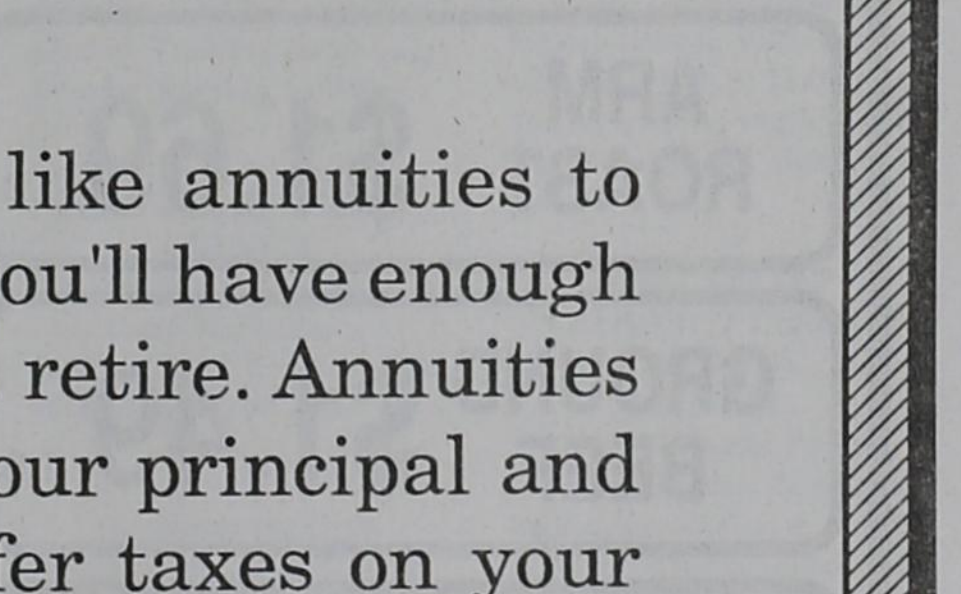
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How A Computer Can Help
As mentioned above, required chemical application records may be kept manually on a piece of paper. Computerizing the recordkeeping require-

ments will help record complicated names, such as active ingredients, restricted entry intervals (REI) and a multitude of other repetitive requirements which may be stored and withdrawn from a computer as entries are made.
Software Review Results
The following are general comments by the reviewers of the various software packages listed in Table 1:
*software varied from simply giving spaces to record information (Indiana FB) to data bases including all of the information on the label for a long list of chemicals (BEAPS).
*all software reviewed met requirements contained in the 1990 Farm Bill.
*none of the software reviewed met the storage location and date requirement of the Texas Right to Know Law.
*all software reviewed seemed to run fine from within Windows, but none of the packages were Window based.
*the packages that the reviewers liked best included the following features: included a list of many chemical names to select from, allowed addition of chemicals not included, and allowed user to build lists of chemicals, applicators and locations and then access those lists to create applications
*using chemical recordkeeping software does not guarantee compliance.

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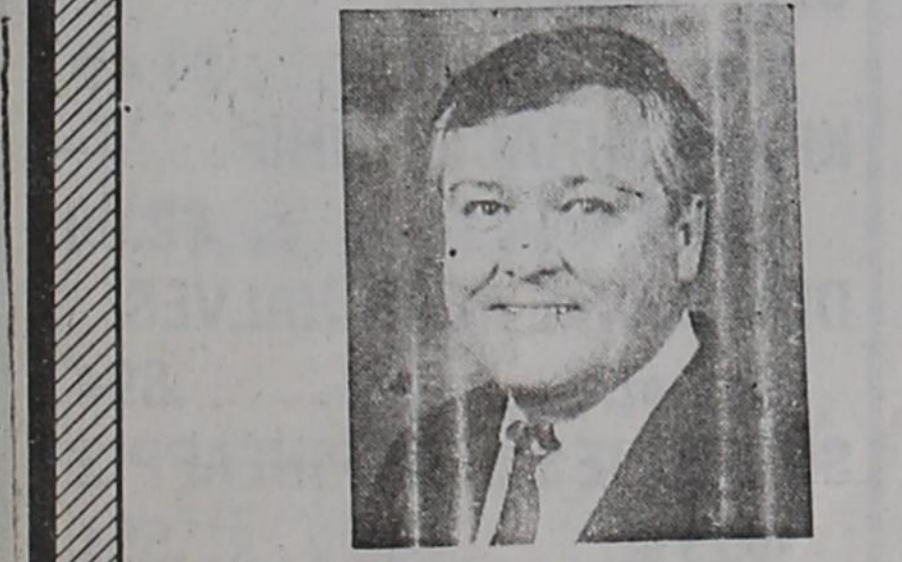

his seat since 1973. Pauken, however, acknowledged that Laney -- who has made his mark as a concensus-builder governed by conservative principles -- would be hard to beat at home, and White said the Hale Center farmer is not likely to lose his reelection bid.

Republican strategy also will focus on the state Senate, where Democrats hold a 17-14 seat edge. Pauken figures the GOP needs two more seats to strip some of Democratic Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock's power.

Last legislative session, however, Bullock presided over the Senate with support from both sides of the aisle, while working toward common goals with Gov. George W. Bush on a number of hot-button issues, such as the education bill, tort reform and concealed handgun legislation.

Recipe for Couch Potatohood If you think the Texas variety of couch potato is any different from the Maine or Idaho varieties, think again.

A survey of households conducted in 1994 by the Texas Department of Health revealed four traits that most sedentary Texans share: 1) They're older than 65; 2) They have less than a high school education; 3) They have an annual income less than \$15,000; and 4) They have no health insurance.

These traits are about the same in Americans from sea to shining sea. But change is possible and recommended.

Dr. Philip Huang of the Texas Department of Health warns against planting oneself on the couch, munching junk food and zoning out to the tube.

"A sedentary lifestyle is one of the major causes, along with smoking and improper nutrition, of heart disease, the leading cause of death in Texas," he said.

Uribe Seeks RRC Seat Hector Uribe of Brownsville, a former Democratic state senator and representative, has filed as a candidate for the Texas Railroad

Commission and will run against Republican Carole Keeton Rylander of Austin.

Uribe served in the state Senate from 1981 to 1990 and in the state House from 1978 to 1981. He dropped a bid last year to become chairman of the Texas Democratic Party.

Rylander was elected in 1994, defeating Democratic appointee Mary Scott Nabers. The winner will serve a full six-year term on the commission.

Lower WC Rates Demanded The Texas Department of Insurance has told 17 insurance groups representing 74 companies to lower their workers' compensation rates, justify them or face state hearings aimed at forcing them lower.

"Our patience has worn thin, and we're carrying out the responsibility the Legislature gave us to challenge excessive rates," Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer warned.

The department said that workers' compensation insurance losses were between 52 percent and 57 percent lower than they would have been without reforms enacted by the Legislature in 1989.

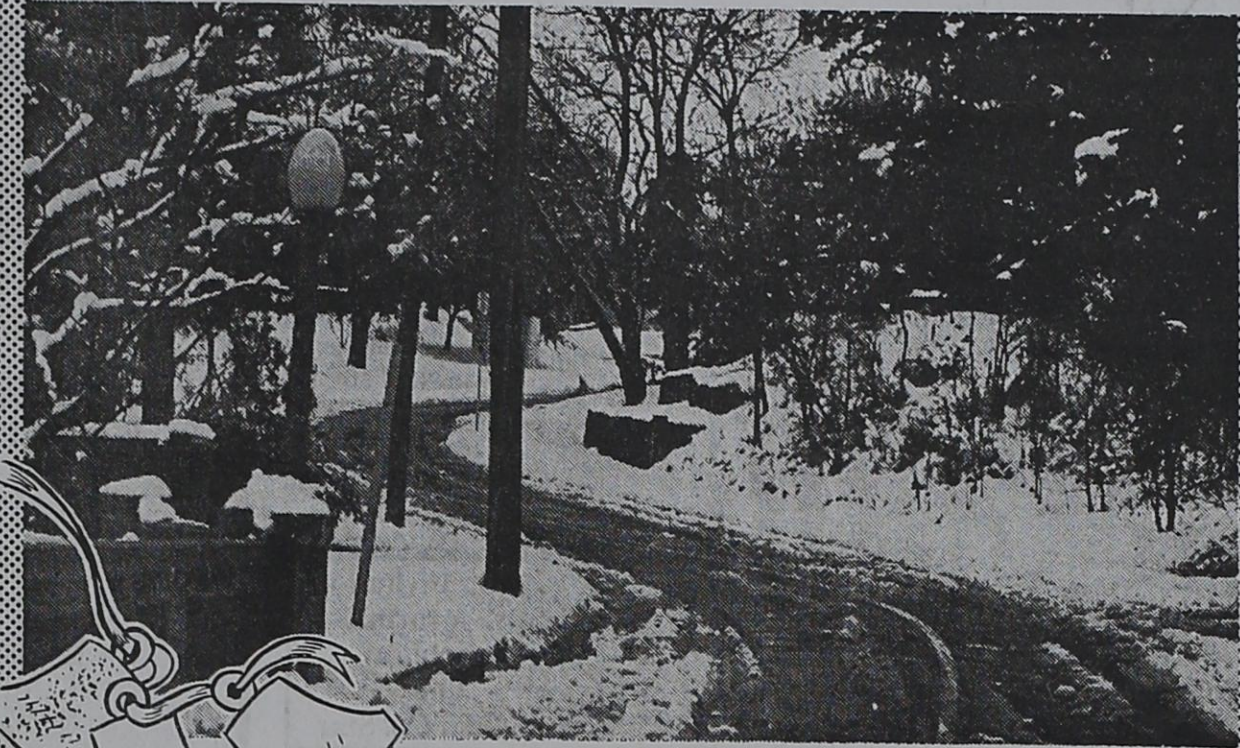
Industry spokesman Rick Gentry said the department's figures are misleading because they do not account for reductions negotiated with individual employers.

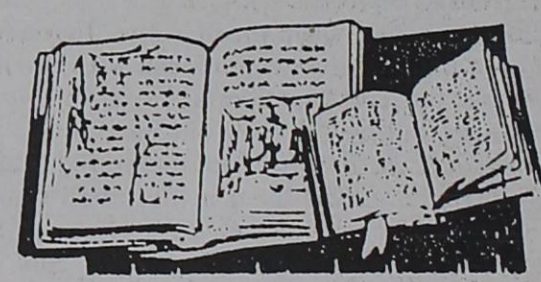
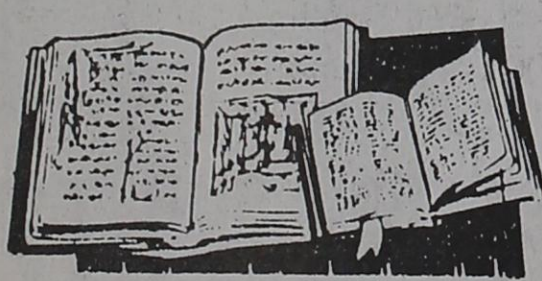
