AHS Antelope Band Wins Sweepstakes Award In U. I. L. Competition

For the first time in four years, the Antelope Band of Abernathy High School has won the Sweepstakes Award in U. I. L. competition. The contest was held at the Freshman School auditorium Wednesday, April 19.

The Sweepstakes Award consists of First Division rating in Concert-Playing, Sight-Reading, and Marching. The band won its top rating in marching in a contest at the Texas Tech stadium on November 22, after winning first place in the Lubbock Fair Parade in September.

Abernathy and Dimmitt were the only Sweepstakes winners among Class AA bands of the area. Other ratings in concert-playing, sight-reading, and marching were as follows: Friona 1, 1, 2; Morton 1, 2, 1; Hale Center 2, 1, 1; Lockney 3, 1, 2; Olton 3, 1, 2; Slaton 3, 2, 2; Floydada 3, 3, 3; and Freshman 4, 4, 3.

The judges were unanimous in rating Abernathy First Division. Strong points mentioned in the written criticisms were: accuracy, quality, dynamics, style, precision, preparation, and spirit. They noted there is room for improvement in intonation in some areas, and that the solo players need to play with more warmth and perhaps some vibrato.

Concert judges were: Melvin Montgomery, Snyder; G. T. Gilligan, Kermit; and Tom Rhodes, Fredericksburg. The sight-reading judge, Joe Rogers of New Braunfels, complimented the band highly, commenting that the music was very musically performed with good dynamics and few errors.

Everett Maxwell, director, was well pleased (to put it mildly) with the band's performance and made this statement: "I would like to thank the school board, administration, faculty, and parents for their cooperation; Mrs. Ruth Fulton who assists me in teaching; the band officers, Bobby Vannov, Bill Rhodes, Frances Burnett, Lanny Newton, and Sharon Albers, for their leadership; the fine group of students, 119 in all, who comprise the membership of the 1966-67 Antelope Band, and especially the 'small band', a group of thirty key players who carried the heaviest load in contest performance."

Mr. Maxwell pointed out that the fine showing of the band is not the result of just one year's efforts, but goes back seven years to the time when this year's seniors started as beginners in 1960. "The band seniors this year are truly an outstanding group," he said. "My special thanks also goes to some student leaders of past years who stuck by me when the going was a bit rough; namely, Bill Forbes, Susie Deering (now Mrs. Keith Ellis), Cheryl Hall (now Mrs. William Engle), and Mike Johnson."

The public will have an opportunity to hear this superior band at the annual band concert on Monday evening, May 15.

Carolyn Barton Wins Trip To Washington In Oratorical Event

Carolyn Barton, seventeen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl D. Barton, 1009 Avenue F, won an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D. C. at the finals of the 1967 South Plains Electric Cooperative Oratorical Contest held Monday night, April 17, in the Cooperative's auditorium.

Carolyn a senior at Abernathy High School was among nine area students vying for the twelve-day trip to the nation's capital.

Carolyn's speech used an imaginary time machine in which she guided her audience on a tour of the rustic past, the present, and the highly-anticipated future. A vivid portrayal of the way electric power has helped and will help lighten the burden of rural America was made by Carolyn.

The 1967 oratorical was open to any boy or girl who was 16 years of age on September 1, 1966 but who would not be 18 years of age prior to September 1, 1967. The entrants also were required to live in a school district served by the South Plains Electric Cooperative.

Each entrant in the contest gave a five to seven minute speech based on rural electrification. One finalist, who received a twenty-five dollar savings bond and advanced to the finals, was chosen from each school district by a committee composed of members of the school's faculty and representatives from the Cooperative.

Joe Lovelace, local farmer, was named a director from Hale County on the Board of Directors of the Grain Soughum Producers Association. The announcement of his appointment was made by Elbert Harp of Abernathy, GSPA president.

United States Postal Savings certificates, which are on deposit at Post Offices will cease earning interest for depositors on April 27, 1967. Postmaster Lambert urged that all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts and invest their funds into United States Savings Bonds or the new Freedom Shares, which on May 1, will pay 4.74% interest.

As of April 27, a year ago, Postal Savings were discontinued, and no deposits were accepted by the Post Office Department. Certificates whose anniversary dates have been reached since last April 26 have earned their final interest payment, Postmaster Lambert said.

On June 30, he said, all remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department to be held in a trust fund until liquidated. There they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

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Holders of Postal Savings certificates can arrange to redeem them simply by applying at the post office where the certificates were issued. The postmaster there, he said, will provide guidance and necessary forms to assist in cashing certificates. All transactions can be handled by mail, and certificates issued to persons now deceased can be cashed by legal heirs in accordance with State laws governing such distributions. Again, the postmaster at the issuance post office will render authorized assistance.

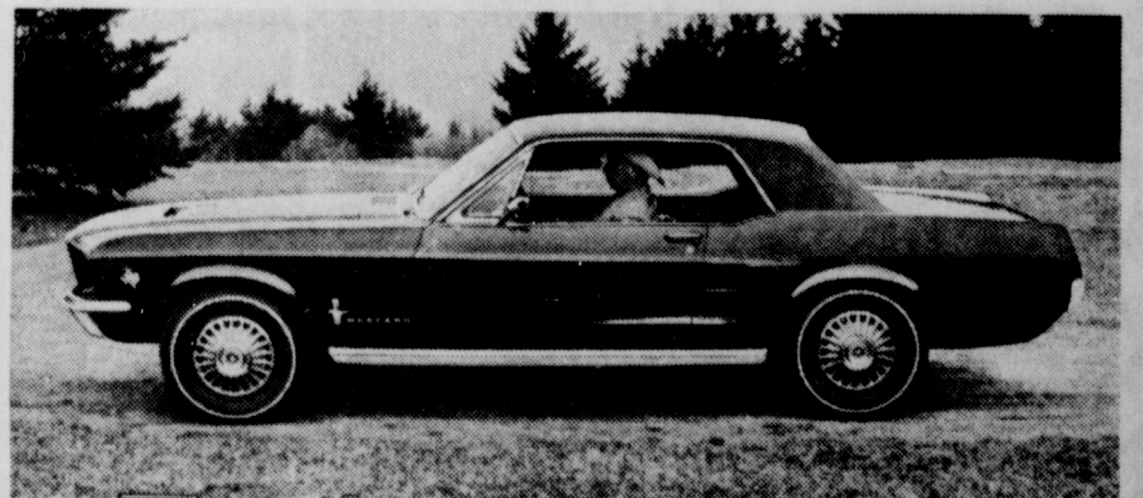
