Baird Bears Wallop Anson Tigers Here Friday Night 55-6

The Baird Bears unleashed a relentless offensive and defensive attack Friday night, Nov. 7, and completely destroyed the obviously outmanned Anson Tigers. The win ups the Bears record to 8-1 with Rotan coming up next Friday Nov. 14 at Rotan.

Senior Mike Duncan opened the scoring floodgates with 2:35 to play in the 1st quarter on a 4 yd. run. Greg Austin had a brilliant touchdown run called back on a motion penalty just prior to Duncan's score. Alan Bohannon added the extra point and the score stood 7-0. With 5 minutes left in the half, Sid Grant gathered in a Darryl Harris pass and scamper 14 yds. for the touchdown. Bohannon added another extra point kick and Baird moved ahead 14-0. Grant electrified the crowd just before half with a 78 yd. punt return. Bohannon delivered the final block and Grant scored his second T.D. of the night. Anson finally managed to score with 40 seconds to go and the half ended 20-6.

With only 2 minutes gone in the second half, Harris hit Grant down the sideline for a 52 yd. touchdown pass and run. Again Bohannon's kick was good and the score grew to 27-6. Just one minute later

the Bears struck for 7 more on a 6 yds Harris pass to tightend Larry Segura. The 3rd quarter ended with yet another Baird touchdown as Harris found Davy Vestal over the middle for 6 and consistent Bohannon added the extra point. Baird now claimed a comfortable 41-6 lead.

In the 4th quarter the Bears added 14 more points. Harris got the 1st 6 on a 5 yd. run with 10:28 left in the game, and Vestal ran 60 yds. on a pass interception. Bohannon made good on both extra points to bring the final score to 55-6.

Austin led all rushers with a 103 yds. on 15 carries and had one 60 yd. T.D. called Back. Offensive lineman Dana Gillit, Brian Fears, Ricky Defosses, Alan Bohannon, and David Collins dominated the line of scrimmage. On Defense Larry Hallmark had one interception as did Vestal. Duncan and Bohannon combined for 26 tackles and ends Fears and Gillit contained all Anson could throw at them. Mike McCormick, Jeff Day and Brent Shaw played exceptionally well inside as did Walker and Defosses outside. Alan Tatum played his best game of the year and was credited with 7 tackles.

City Council Votes To Apply For Fund Program

The Baird City Council met in regular session Monday night, November 10, 1980.

The first item on the agenda was discussion of the bids for mineral rights at Baird Lake. The only bid received was from Sinda Top Oil and Gas, offering \$21.50 per acre out to about \$6,300.00 total. The City would retain 1/8 interest of the mineral rights. There would also

be a \$2.00 an acre delay rental as a bonus. This totals about \$6,122.00. It was recommended by Mayor Brame to accept the bid with the stipulation that the city can limit the gas shut in clause to the term of the lease. He also recommended the company not have water rights on the lake.

It was accepted by a unanimous vote.

In other action the city voted to apply for a pre-application into the Community Development Block Grant Program. By doing this, the council approved paying \$2,000.00 to a Lubbock firm, Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper, to handle all the details. The firm will come in an evaluate the needs of the city, in terms of

housing. This will be done by a point system. City's with the most points are considered the most in need of this program. If accepted, the city could receive up to \$464,000.00 in which to upgrade housing. Any property owner, earning less than \$12,400.00 per year would be eligible. The stipulation is that the owner would have to live on the property. However he is not required to pay back any money.

The council also approved putting in sewer lines to Jim Tolletts property on Thelma St., with the only stipulation being that he install 6-inch lines to any house he builds.

In other action, the council voted to lease the shed, owned by the city, on 3rd and Walnut Streets. Ray Willeford of Baird, asked the council if he could lease the property, however by law, the city has to advertise a notification of lease. The ad will run for three weeks.

In executive session, the council voted to hire Evelyn Fox as City Secretary. Mrs. Fox is presently employed by the City of Baird.

When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it, of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record, once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:

- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
- A hissing or roaring sound (caused by petroleum or product escaping from a pipeline).
- A dense white cloud or fog.
- A spot of dead or discolored vegetation.
- An accumulation of petroleum

- Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which could cause the liquids or vapor to ignite and burn. If you find yourself in a suspected vapor area, do not light a match, start an engine or even switch on an electric light.
- Notify the pipeline operator as soon as you reach a safe area. Call collect. Give your name, a description of the leak and its location. If you do not know who the pipeline operator is, call your local fire, police or sheriff's department, or the state police. Advise them of the nature and location of the emergency.

If you see someone digging near a pipeline or doing other construction work... or if you plan to do such work near a pipeline yourself... please call the telephone number shown on the sign and let the pipeline company know so damage can be avoided. It's in your interest... and the nation's.

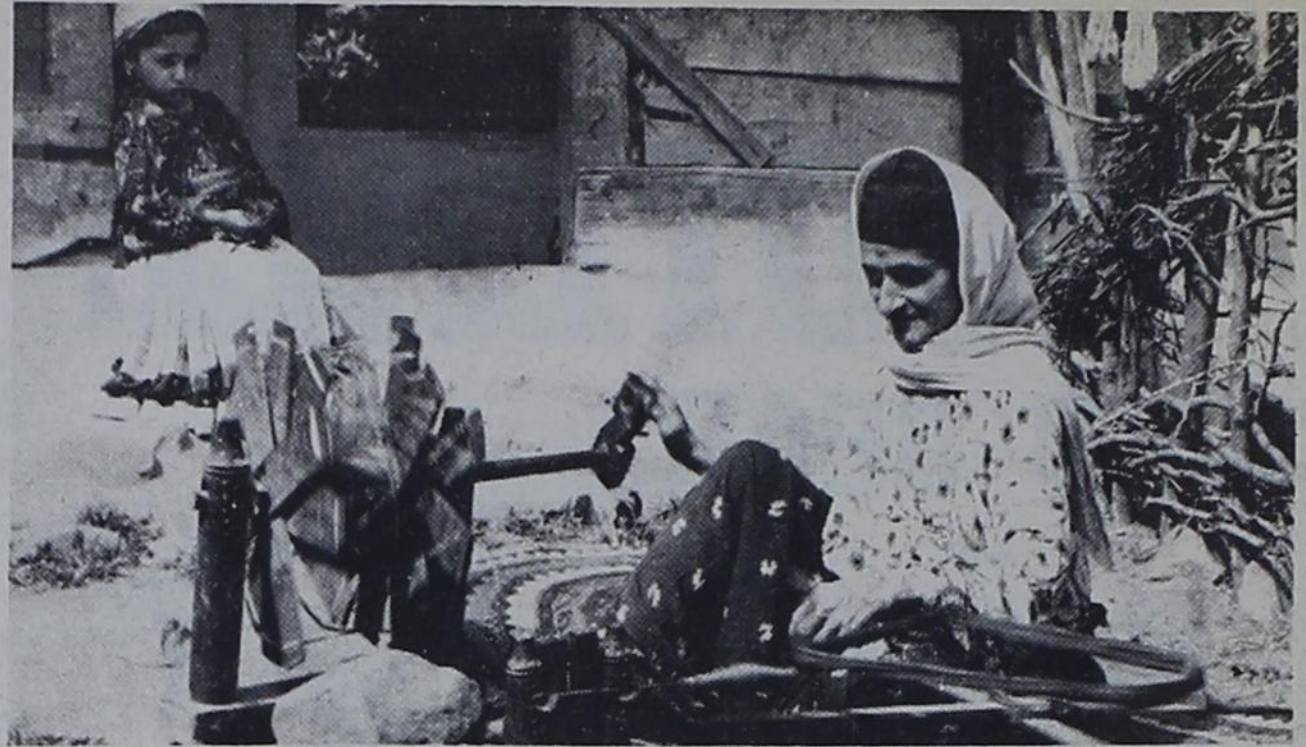

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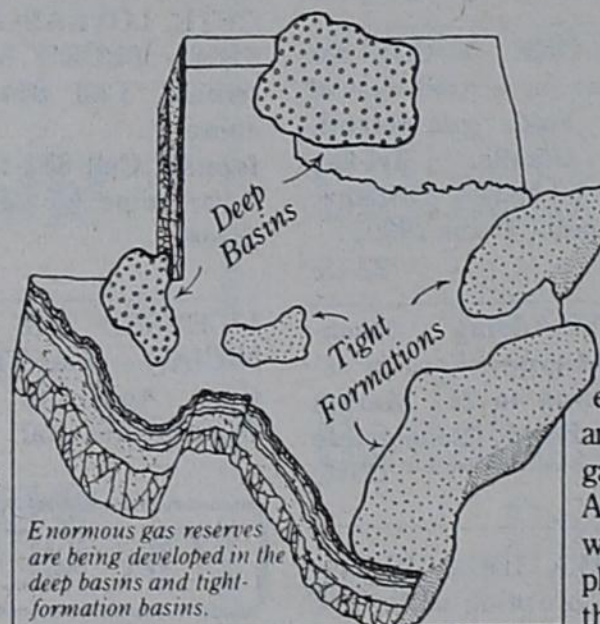
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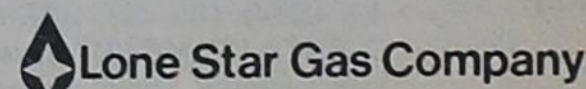
