Adult Education Classes Begin At Local School September 14

NEED MORE EDUCATION? Adult education is available to adults 16 years of age to 116 years of age!

The Abernathy Public School System is pleased to announce the beginning of the 4th year of basic and secondary education program for the adults of this community and surrounding areas. There is no cost to the student-classes are free. Instruction will be given in reading, writing, English as a second language, English speaking, and other courses. This program is designed to improve a person's ability to secure employment, qualify for a job promotion, achieve a Certificate of High School Equivalence (G.E.D.), and to become a more efficient consumer and citizen.

Classes will meet two nights per week—Monday and Thursday—two hours per night from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in room #1, Junior High School Building. Adults may enroll at any time during the year. Classes begin on September 14, 1970.

Teachers employed for this year are: Mr. Bill Caffey—Mathematics and Social Studies; Mrs. Georgia Bartlett, English, Science, and other courses leading to the G.E.D. tests; and Mrs. Carolyn Wade, teaching beginning reading and English as a second language. Mrs. Wade is bilingual in English-Spanish. Typing will again be offered to those interested.

The newest innovation for adult education is the establishment of an Adult Learning Center. This Center is also located in Room #1 of the Junior High School building. This center was made possible by a Federal Grant of \$10,000.00 from the Adult Education Act of 1966 as amended. Free instruction for adults age 16 and up is available Monday thru Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Adults may attend at any time convenient to them and as often as desired. Instruction will be given in the basic educational areas of reading, writing, English arithmetic, English speaking and other subjects. There are many excellent materials for those studying for the G.E.D. tests. Typing instruction and other special courses will be provided on request. Teaching

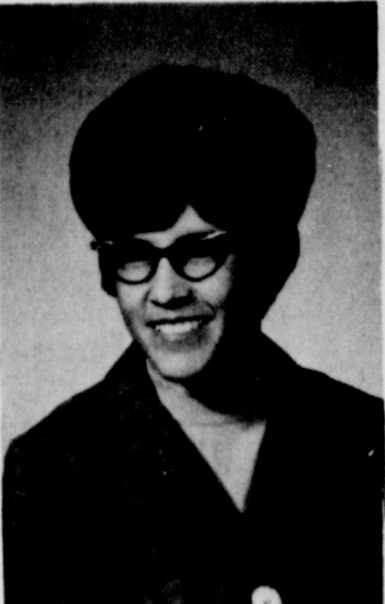

Weevil Located In Area Grain Sorghum Fields

The Sugar Cane Rootstock Weevil has been detected in several grain sorghum fields in Hale and Crosby Counties. Area Entomologist, Dr. Don Rummel, said the insect was identified from specimens submitted by Hale County Agricultural Agent Ollie Liner and Crosby County Agricultural Agent Bruce Griffith last week.

According to the County Agent's reports, the present infestation appeared to be restricted to a relatively small number of fields, however, lodging in several fields, due to damage caused by the insect, has been observed. Liner stated that the field being affected resembles a field that has "Gotten hot" due to lack of water and begins to fall. A close inspection by splitting a stalk at the ground level, a farmer can find a small white grub in the stalk.

According to Liner the Sugar Cane Rootstock Weevil is considered an occasional economic pest in grain sorghum in Central Texas but has rarely caused trouble in West Texas. However, erratic infestations have been found since 1912.

Adult weevil feeds on young grain sorghum plants and in the root-ticks of older plants. Adult injuries are noticeable but not as serious as the larvae. "Holes and tunnels caused by larvae provide ideal entry places for charcoal rot and we normally find this when we find the larvae," Liner said.

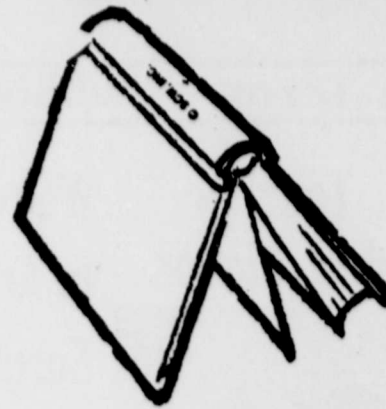

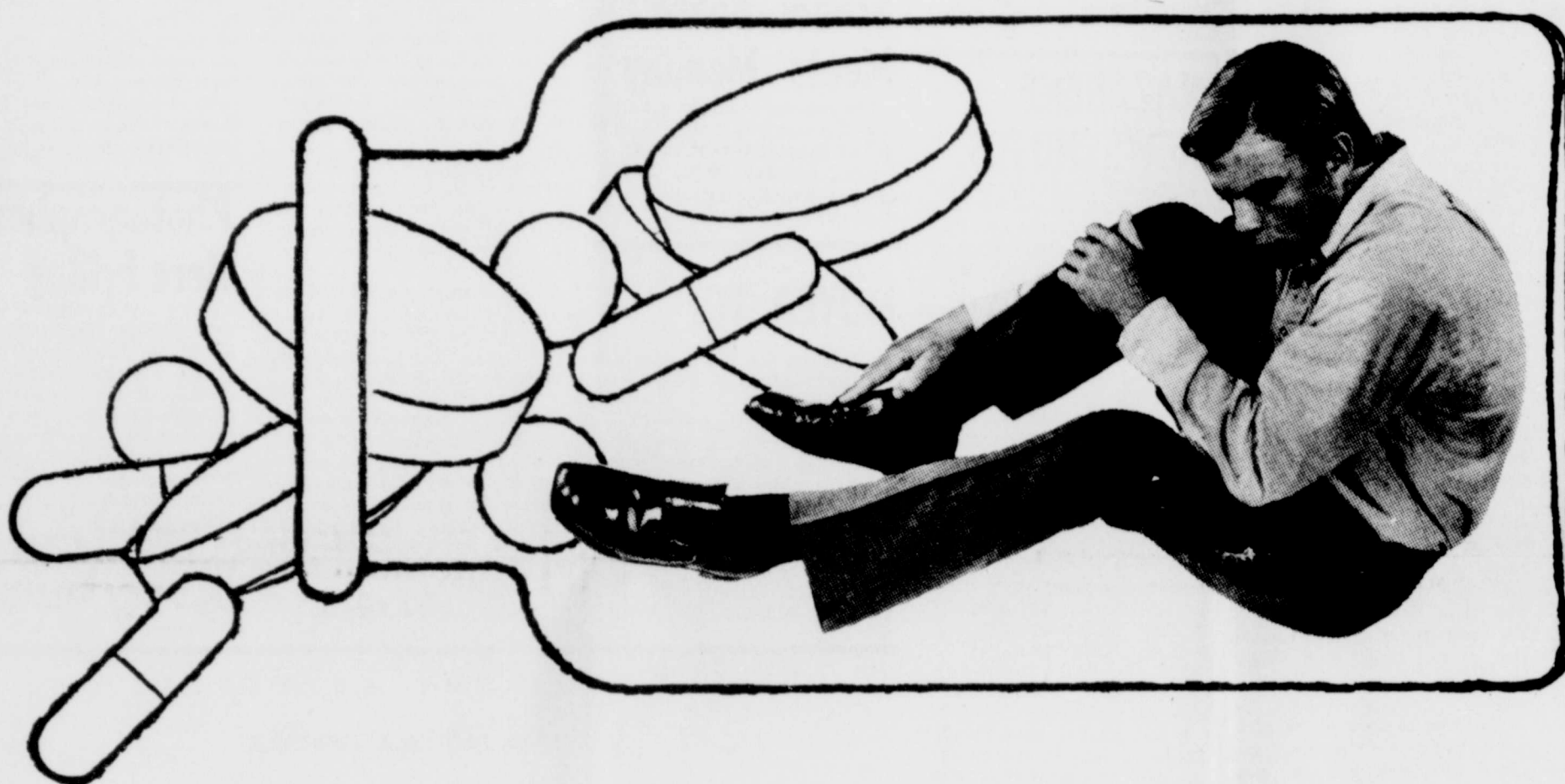

Questions and Answers

Q. Is it necessary for me to apply for the lump sum death payment or can the funeral home take care of it for me?

A. This is one thing the funeral home cannot do for you. It is necessary for the individual, usually the one who pays or assumes responsibility for the payment of the burial expenses, to file an application with social security. However, you can call the social security office. Someone there will help you complete an application form and mail to you for signature. The telephone number of the social security office in Plainview is listed in the telephone book under "Social Security," under "Medicare," and under "U.S. Government."

FORMER ABERNATHY QB

Versatile Lane Wade To Try Hand At Defense This Fall

In the Tech sports publicity office, publicist Ralph Carpenter keeps a file of pictures on the Raiders.

In the Lane Wade file is one of the Abernathy product dropping back to pass and another of him on the receiving end of a toss.

This fall, the file will bring another pose—possibly of Wade batting down an aerial, knocking a receiver off his feet, or maybe back-peddling.

Wade, Tech's man of many positions, is now one of the members of coach Jim Carlen's defensive secondary, a position the new coach feels is well fortified.

And, as he talked to newsmen from over the state at Monday's Tech press conference, Carlen stopped long enough to toss in a little extra about Wade.

"Lane can play for us. He was a wide receiver last year, but we suspected our secondary wouldn't have much depth, so we shifted Lane over."

"Lane has the speed, he's fluid. He's what the pros look for—a kid who can run backward. That way he can keep his eye on the receiver. And Lane can do this."

History had prepared Wade for his current spot, but he wasn't. Lane came out of Abernathy as a sprinter-quarterback. He had 9.8 speed in the 100-yard dash and was recruited as a quarterback. He played that spot as a freshman, then had knee surgery in the spring of that year. He was held out of the 1967 season because of that operation and played behind Tech's duo of Joe Matulich and Tom Sawyer as a sophomore in '68.

"I have to try to concentrate on the receiver," said Wade. "We have a lot of man-to-man coverage where you have the receiver all to yourself, and I have to stay with him. I picked up a lot in that two weeks in the spring; I didn't know anything about it. And I'm learning every day."

"Cutting when the receiver does is the hardest thing. Trying to outguess him isn't all there is to it. I'm trying to play it straight, keep from guessing. I used to catch myself guessing with them and I got beat a couple of times—and that ended that."

Carlen guessed on Lane Wade—and that ended Wade's search for a home.

TALK IN PRINT

The office of Dr. Delwin Webb, Abernathy School Superintendent, reported an enrollment of 1,146 students from grades one through 12, as of Monday, August 31. This compares with 1,085 students on the corresponding date last year, an increase this year of 61 students enrolled. These figures do not include kindergarten students. About 60 are in kindergarten this year.

What's your guess? Abernathy's 1970 population count will be released in a few weeks by the U.S. Census Bureau. Will the highway signs now showing a population of 3,190 be close? More? Less? The 3,190 now showing on the signs as our population figure is an estimate made through count of the utilities' meters. In the past, this method of making estimates of population has been close to correct.

If the census count is less, I'm not going to choke up about it, because we have what we have and that's all we have and there's no reason to worry about things you cannot help. And, if we happen to have more than the current estimate we'll all be happy.

A 1969 graduate of Abernathy High School, Larry Vannoy, last week was graduated from Western Technical College in Denver as an automobile technician. He is employed at Joe Gordon's Automotive here. Auto mechanics are getting fewer and fewer and there are more and more autos, tractors, irrigation motors, etc. Automotive repair is a good field and more and more young men should consider entering that kind of work. Vannoy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Les Duckett, who went to Denver to attend the graduation exercises.

I thought the sun would start coming up in the west every morning before I'd ever agree with any proposal made by Senator Edward Kennedy. Senator Kennedy is one of the backers of a proposal to have a National Health Insurance organization to provide adequate medical care for everyone. I suppose the proposed program would be administered by HEW, with an increase in Social Security taxes.

Cost of hospital care already is out of sight, and threatens to go higher. We carry two major medical policies and several other smaller policies. We fell all are necessary to meet a prolonged hospital stay. The amount of Social Security increase for National Health could not be more than we are now paying on health and accidents policies.

The retail business life is being crushed out of the small and medium-size towns on the South Plains. Empty business buildings plague towns the size of Littlefield and Brownfield as well as the small ones. The reason, I think, is the so-called discount stores in the cities. The only thing that can turn this trend around is a Fair Trade Price law. Passage of such a law in Texas has about as much chance as a snowman in the middle of Main Street in mid-August.

A few months ago this column noted the increase in religious activities and interest in the community. Coming to my desk last week were newsletters from the First Church of the Nazarene and the First United Methodist Church of Abernathy. The Rev. Louis Schapp, Nazarene pastor, noted an average increase.

The Rev. Conrad M. Ryan, Methodist pastor, had his secretary, Mrs. Chris Waters, prepare a comparison of summer attendance for 1969 and 1970. The summer of 1970, showed these increases over 1969 in average attendance: Church school, 179 in 1970, to 138 in 1969; Morning Worship, 226 in 1970, to 182 in 1969; Evening Worship, 135 in 1970, to 72 in 1969.

Other churches in Abernathy probably are enjoying similar increases in their services this summer over the 1969 summer average.

At last count there were 26 million dogs in the United States, accounting for 40% of the pet population. Dogs have been a problem for local city officials for as long as I can remember. They are a problem today. Currently, Abernathy is without a dog catcher. Do you want the job? Abernathy has a city ordinance that makes it unlawful to let dogs run loose in town. They must be kept on a leash and within a fenced area. Maximum fine for breaking this law is \$200, says the ordinance. Only recently, a large dog attacked and injured a two-year-old child here.

Unless the city does something about dogs roaming all over town, the dog-poissoners will start operating again, further endangering the lives of small children.

"Our offense was better than I expected, and our defense, especially pass defense, was too slow reacting." These were the comments of Coach Luke Nickerson following the Ralls scrimmage last Thursday night. The Antelope offense never faltered as the running of Mark Harrison, Charles Johnson, and Mike Kerr, and the passing of Dave Davenport led to seven touchdowns in the controlled scrimmage. Working from the "I" formation, Davenport ran the triple option offense, calling on Ha-

rison inside and Johnson outside. Good blocking in the line was provided by Keith Lambert, Larry Klafka, Jackie McGaugh, David Lovelace and Mike Hedges. Davenport's passes were aimed at ends Kirk Lane and Bruce Kinast. Reserve fullback Bobby Rogers caught one pass for a T.D.

"We were especially pleased with our blocking on offense," Nickerson said. "There were very few busted assignments and the blocking was crisp and hard. Our backs ran hard and blocked well," he added.
