## School Enrollment Reaches 1,173, Plus Kindergarten, 64

The Board of Education met in regular session Monday, September 7, in the Board Room of the High School. After approving the minutes of the previous meetings and bills payable the following reports were given: tax collection report showing 98.19% of taxes collected; an oral report on the 5-day pre-school workshop; and a report concerning the other 5 days that are required as teacher in-service days; the current enrollment report showed 1,173 students exclusive of 64 kindergarten pupils. This is 72 students more than on the corresponding dates in 1969.

## Antelopes Lost to Petersburg; To Play At Seagraves Friday

It was Christmas time in September last Friday night as the Abernathy Antelopes played the generous host to Petersburg and gave them an unexpected victory. Fumbling the ball seven times and playing listless and uninspired on offense, the Antelopes lost to an aroused band of Buffaloes, 22-8.

The offense never got a sustained drive going as fumbles, penalties, and missed blocking assignments, forced the Lopes to give up the ball five times on punts and four times on lost fumbles. The longest run of the night for the Antelopes was a 9 yard blast by Charles Johnson on the Lopes first offensive play. Ball carriers were able to pick up only 98 yards rushing all night, and this was off-set by a loss of 75 yards--65 of which came when O.B. Dave Davenport was trapped while trying to pass.

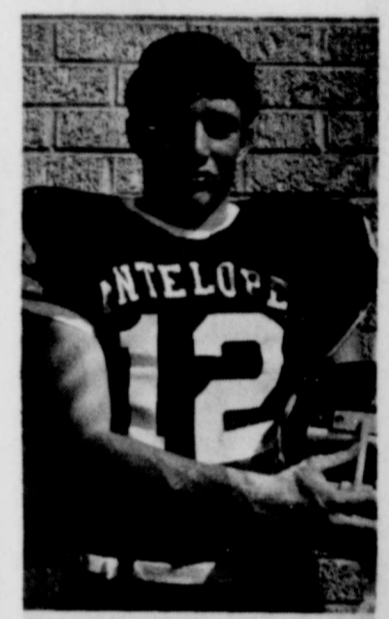
The only thing the Lopes had to smile about on offense was their last play of the game--- a 40 yard pass from Davenport to end Kirk Lane that got the home team on the score board. Bobby Rogers scored a pass from Davenport for the two extra points.

On defense the Antelopes played better ball, except in one or two cases where men were caught out of position. Petersburg was held to 11 first downs and picked up less than 200 yards total offense; but they were valuable yards that resulted in three touchdowns. The Antelopes recovered one fumble, and forced two poor punts, but were never able to take advantage of these breaks. Coach Nickerson didn't mince his words when he said, "We got beat by a good ball club, but we played very poorly on offense. I was especially disappointed in this because we had looked so good in our two scrimmages." "We had a complete breakdown on our offensive blocking--by linemen and backs, particularly in our pass blocking," he added. "We are a much better team than we showed Friday night, and I know our players will come back this week," he concluded.

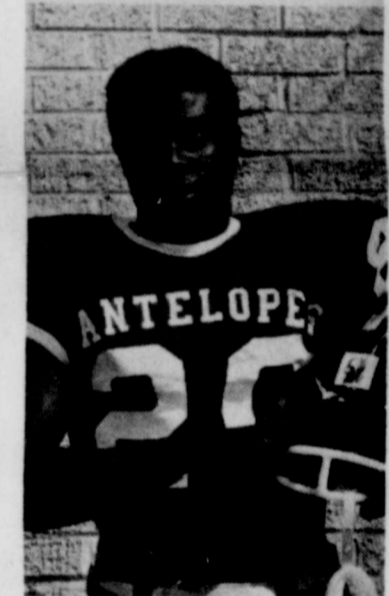
And look what the Antelopes have this week--the No. 1 rated team in Texas in Class A football. Seagraves, fresh off a victory over a highly regarded Eunice, N.M. team, has been tabbed by all polls as the team that will win the State Championship in Class A. And you can well see why this prediction--a line that averages over 200 lbs., a backfield that will come close to 200 lbs., and a

reputation and tradition unmatched on the South Plains. It sounds like and may be, but the Antelopes are looking forward to the opportunity. Coach Kennedy, who saw Seagraves scrimmage Morton, said, "They are big and strong, but not exceptionally tough. We feel like we can play with them, and by eliminating the mistakes, we can beat them." Again Nickerson added, "We know we are better than our performance last weekend we're anxious to see if the Antelopes have the courage and pride to come back."

Each week following the previous game, the coaches grade the performances of the Antelopes, using the game film. With this grade, game statistics and the opinions of the coaches and players, players of the week are chosen.

After such a disappointing game against Petersburg, it is difficult to say that we had an outstanding lineman or an outstanding back, but we felt there were some top performances in the game. Coach Nickerson stated, "And we feel it is only right that we recognize those boys whose play was better than average -- we as fans and coaches are always correcting and criticizing our players, so we want to point out the good things too," the head coach of the Antelopes added.

Two players, Charles Johnson and Mike Kerr, were singled out for their play against Petersburg. Johnson was the top ball carrier on offense with 58 yards on 18 carries; and got the most tackles on defense with 16. "Charles is an inspiration to all of us with his hustle and never-say-die attitude," Coach Kennedy said. "Even though he made mistakes on defense, he made up for them by hard tackling, and hustle," the defensive coach of the Antelopes added.

Mike Kerr was in on 9 tackles and broke up several Buff passes. Also, Nickerson praised Mike for his offensive play. "He didn't carry the ball a single time, but he did a good job of blocking and running pass patterns, and hustled all the time," he added. Others drawing praise for their play were Ruwayne Struve on defense (14 tackles, Keith Lambert on defense (13 tackles), and Kirk Lane for his pass catching. The defensive unit received more praise for their work than the offense, but the coaches pointed out that over-all the defense and offensive play was too inconsistent. The coaches and players know there is room for improvement and have dedicated themselves to this.

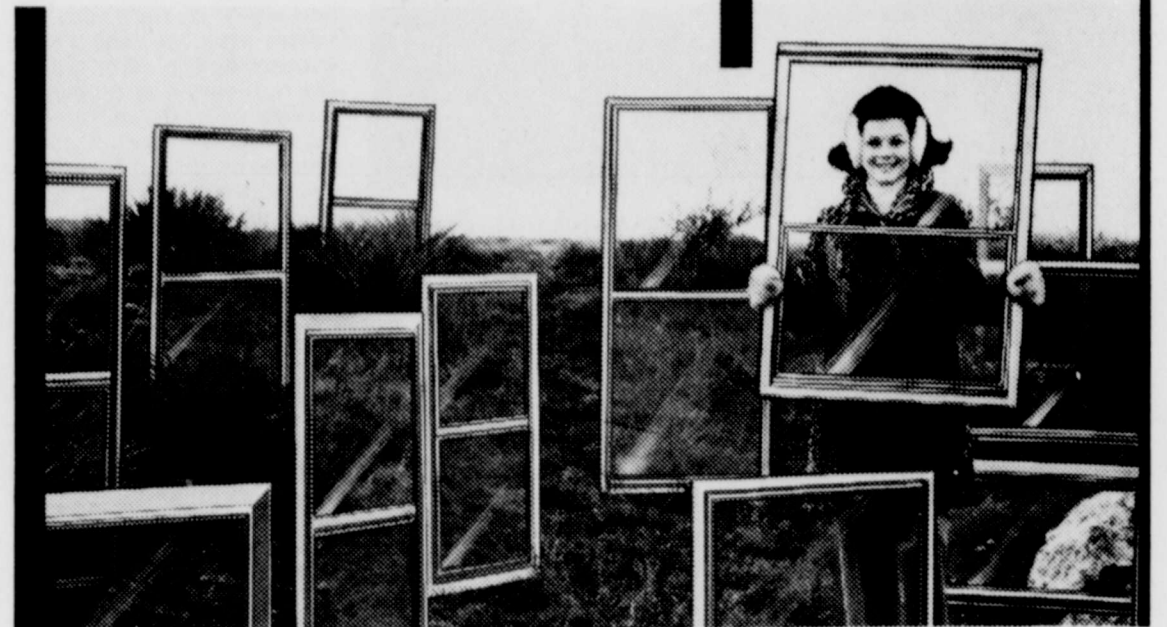

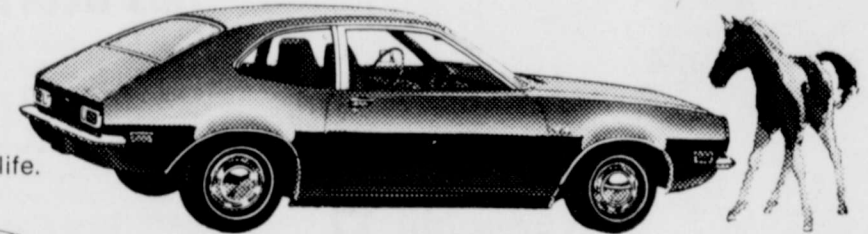

## Drivers License Law To Be Strictly Enforced In City

Under instructions from the Chief of Police a crackdown campaign against unlicensed drivers is in progress in the City of Abernathy.

Anyone found operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license will be cited for a violation unless that person is specifically exempted by law. One example of exemption by state law is the operation of farm tractors temporarily. There are a few other exceptions but most people are not exempted by law.

Another violation that is common is by persons holding a restricted drivers license (learners permit). State law requires that anyone operating a motor vehicle on a learners permit be accompanied by a duly licensed driver (over 21) and with at least one years experience. This person must occupy the seat next to the driver.

Anyone found operating a vehicle under a learners permit and not complying with the state law will be cited.

The police department is asking citizens to cooperate in this matter. They ask that you not permit any unlicensed drivers to operate any of your motor vehicles nor that you permit any learner to operate

Q. I will be 65 in a couple of months and I haven't yet made up my mind whether I will retire then, or go on working. If I do decide to retire, when should I get in touch with my social security office about getting benefits?

A. Whether or not you decide to retire, pay a visit to your social security office promptly—certainly before the beginning of the month in which your birthday falls. Medicare benefits are payable at 65, whether or not you are retired. But in order to have the coverage of the doctor bill insurance start as soon as you reach 65, you must sign up during one of the three months before the month of your 65th birthday.
