

Antelopes Lost to Petersburg; To Play At Seagraves Friday

It was Christmas time in September last Friday night as the Abernathy Antelopes played the generous host to Petersburg and gave them an unexpected victory. Fumbling the ball seven times and playing listless and uninspired on offense, the Antelopes lost to an aroused ba-

nd of Buffaloes, 22-8. The offense never got a sust ained drive going as fumbles, penalities, and missed blocking assignments, forced the Lopes to give up the ball five times on punts and four times on lost fumbles. The longest run of the night for the Antelopes was a 9 yard blast by Charles Johnson on the Lopes first offensive play. Ball carriers were able to pick up only 98 yards rushing all night, and this was off-set by a loss of 75 yards -- 65 of whici came when Q.B. Dave Davenport was trapped while try-

ing to pass. The only thing the Lopes had to smile about on offense was their last play of the game --a 40 yard pass from Davenport to end Kirk Lane that got the home team on the score board. Bobby Rogers pulled in a pass from Davenport for the two extra points.

On defense the Antelopes pl-eyed better ball, except in one or two cases where men were caught out of position. Petersburg was held to II first downs and picked up less than 200 yards total offense; but they we re valuable yords that resulted in three touchdowns.

The Antelopes recovered one fumble, intercepted two Buff passes, and forced two poor punts, but were never able to take advantage of these breaks. Coach Nickerson didn't mince his words when he said, "We got beat by a good ball club, but we played very poorly on offense. I was especially disappointed in this because we had looked so good in our two scri-mmages." "We had a complete breakdown in our offensive blocking --- by linemen and bacocking, "he added. "We are a much better team than we showed Friday night, and I know our players will come back this

week. " he concluded. And look what the Antelopes have this week -- the No. 1 rat ed team in Texas in Class A football. Seagraves, fresh off a victory over a highly regarded Eunice, N.M. team, has been tabbed by all polls as the team that will win the State Championship in Class A. And you can well see why this prediction -- a line that averages over 200 lbs. a backfield that will come close to 200 lbs., and a



Drivers License Law To Be Strictly **Enforced In City**

Under instructions from the Chief of Police a crackdown campaign against unlicensed drivers is in progress in the Ci-

ty of Abernathy.
Anyone found operating a motor vehcle with out a valid drivers license will be cited for a violation unless that person is specifically exempted by law One example of exemption by state law is the operation of farm tractors temporarily. There a few other exceptions but most people are not exempted by

Another violation that is common is by persons holding a restricted drivers license(learners permit). State law requires that anyone operating a motor vehicle on a learners permit be accompanied by a duly licensed driver (over 21) and with at least one years experience). This person must occupy the

seat next to the driver. Anyone found operating a vehicle under a learners permit and not complying with the state law will be cited.

The police department is asking citizens to cooperate in this matter. They ask that you not permit any unlicensed drivers to operate any of your motor vehicles nor that you nermit any learner to operate

without proper accompaniment. Another matter to be enforced is the operation of motor-cycles without proper licenses and without the prescribed headge-





But in order to have the coverage of the doctor bill insurance start as soon as you reach 65, you must sign up during one of the three months before the month of your 65th


