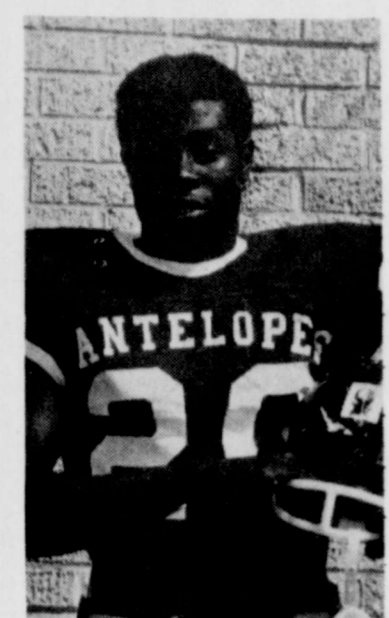

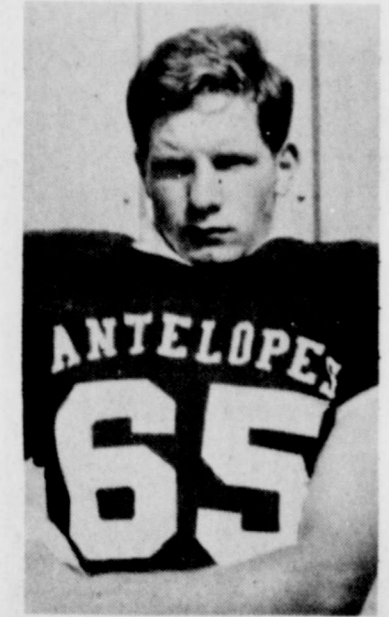
## Antelopes Play Lockney Here FRIDAY

## PUNT, PASS & KICK COMPETITION

### Players Of The Week

With three minutes left in the first quarter of play, the Abernathy Antelopes had run only one offensive play (a pass that was intercepted), but held a 14-0 lead over the Morton Indians. How? "By alert plays on defense," was the way coach Kennedy put it.

After the pass interception, Morton moved the ball to the Abernathy 40 yard line and on an attempted pitch out by the Q.B., defensive end Larry Klafka swiped the ball out of the air and conveyed by several teammates, "raced" 60 yards for a touchdown and the thrill of a lifetime for a lineman. Johnny Hemphill kicked the first of five extra points for the night.

After the ensuing kick off, Morton was forced to punt and safety Kirk Lane, not to be outdone by a lineman, fielded the ball on his own 10 yard line and sped down the left sideline for the Lopes second touchdown.

Mark Harrison added another T. D. from two yards out before the half to give the Abernathy team a 21-0 half time lead. The lead held up, but Morton came to life in the fourth quarter and scored two touchdowns and ran for the extra each time. Each Morton score came back and scored each time after they scored. It was a good win, but we know we are capable of playing better.

This week the Antelopes host the Lockney Longhorns, a team that defeated Littlefield last week, 27-13. Lockney is a young ball club with a lot of speed and talent in the backfield. They are led by J. B. Charles Mathis, who got three touchdowns against Littlefield; and Q. B. Tony Ford a good passer and runner. The Longhorns are coached by Jerry Connan who is in his first year as head coach.

Lockney, although young in experience, has improved each game and is going to come into this game ready to extend their winning streak and stay in the district race. "Coach Steve Hill pointed out, Lockney defeated the Antelope team last year 21-7.

Hedges played his best game of the year, "said coach Kennedy. Mike was in on 17 tackles and was one of the reasons the Morton team was forced to abandon its triple option offense. The defensive signal caller for the Lopes made tackles up and down the line and helped break up a couple of passes in the secondary.

Others who drew praise for their defensive performance were Mike Kerr, Charles Johnson, Ruwayne Struve, and Dave Davenport.

Charles Johnson and Mike Hedges were chosen as the players of the week for their play against Morton. Johnson was the top offensive player, and Hedges the top defensive man.

This was a repeat for Johnson as he was also chosen last week for his play in the Hale Center game. Against Morton, Charles carried the ball 23 times and picked up 148 yards for a 6.4 average. Although he didn't score a touchdown, it was his running that set up three Antelope scores. His longest gain of the night was a 30 yard slash through the middle of the Morton defense. Coach Nickerson said, "Charles seems to get better with each game. His hard running and ability to pick up extra yardage makes him a threat every time he carries the ball." Johnson was also praised for his defensive work where he was in on 13 tackles. Others mentioned for the offensive honors were guard Keith Lambert and center Larry Klafka.

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### JUNIOR VARSITY

The Abernathy High School Jr. Varsity football team, coached by Ricky McKay suffered its first loss last week, falling to a strong Slaton team, 45-3. Giving up size, speed, and experience to the team from Slaton, the young Lopes were never in the game as the Tigers scored on several long runs and passes. Poor playing and penalties seemed to be the thing that hurt the Antelopes the most.

The only spark shown by the Lopes was a 35 yard field goal by Joe Evans in the fourth quarter.

The Jr. Varsity will play Littlefield's J.V., there, this Thursday.

### 9th GRADE

David McClendon, playing quarterback for the first time, led the Abernathy freshman football team to a 23-8 victory over the Slaton 9th grade. McClendon scored two touchdowns one in the first period from six yards out, and one in the third quarter from 15 yards out. After the first T. D. Ruben Rodriguez kicked the extra point, and Bobby Johnson ran for the extras after the second. Pat Hedges scored the other Antelope touchdown, and the extra points came on a pass from Dwight Hardin to Bobby Johnson.

Slaton scored on a 15 yard run in the third period and passed for the home points. This was the only time the Tigers came close to the Abernathy goal line.

Coach Steve Hill was pleased with the passing game of the Lopes. Albert Dominguez caught two passes for 45 yards to lead the receivers. Coach Hill named Mike Clendon, Hardin, Rodriguez, and Mike Lambert as playing good games on offense. Hardin, Hedges and Johnson were praised for their defense play.

The 9th grade team will journey to Littlefield this Thursday for a game, slated to begin at 5:30.

### JUNIOR HIGH

On September 29th Abernathy Junior High played host to the Tigers from Slaton and once again lost both outings.

The 7th graders, playing much improved ball, sparkled on offense throughout the game, and even led in first down 9 to 8, but costly fumbles prevented them from scoring in the first half. A blocked punt which led to safety and an end sweep gave Slaton a 10-0 bulge at half-time. The Yearlings finally dented the scoreboard with three seconds left in the game when quarterback Wayne Riley plunged over from the one foot line. A pass for the extra points was incomplete. The 7th graders exhibited a fine passing attack with Riley connecting on 8 of 12 attempts. His favorite targets were Robin Wright and Abel Guitierrez. Other boys who played outstanding for the Yearlings were John Hill, Kevin Gregory, Frankie Dominguez, like Campbell, and Dwayne Blivens. The final score was Slaton 22 Abernathy 6.

The 8th grade faced Slaton's highly touted 8th grader and played extremely well although outweighted greatly by the Tigers. The Yearlings played brilliantly on defense and scored at the end of the first quarter was 0-0. The largest Tigers finally broke the game open as Abernathy's punt defense broke down in the 2nd and 3rd quarters and the game ended with Slaton in front 28-0.

Coach Campbell was highly pleased with the progress of both the 7th and 8th graders. He said "our 8th graders played against the finest 8th grade team I've seen play and our boys held up under fire."

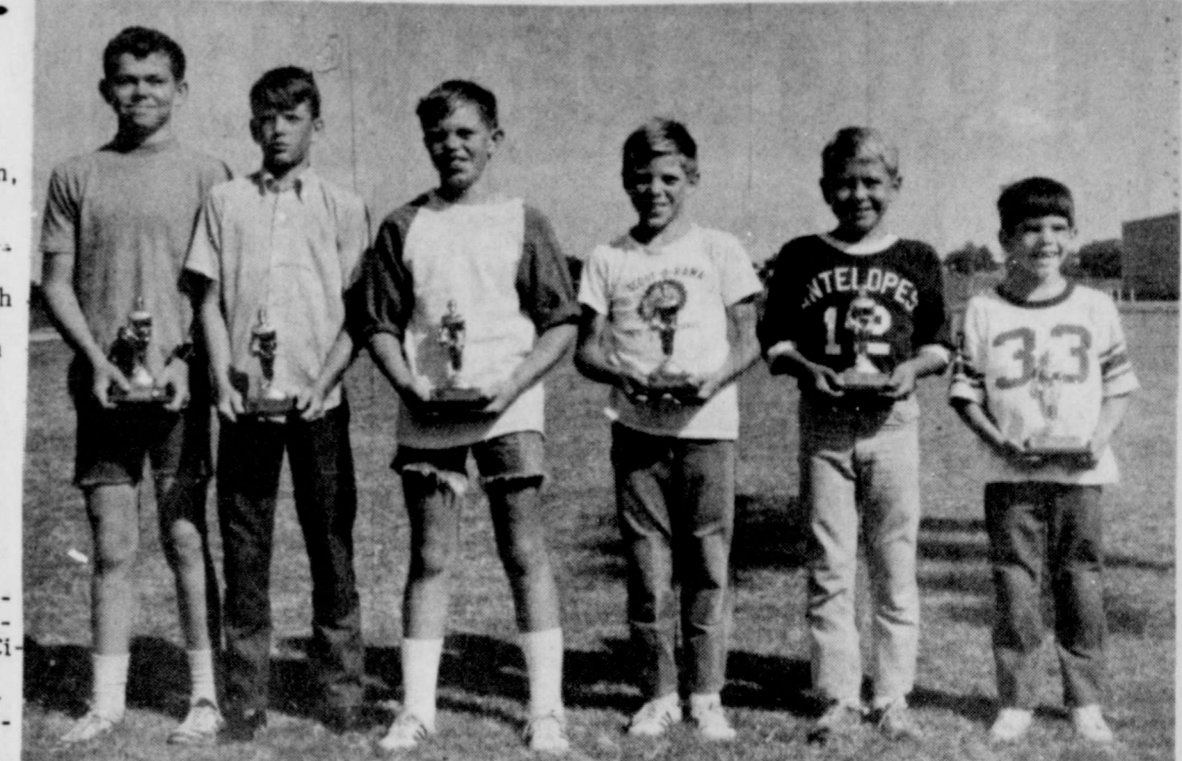

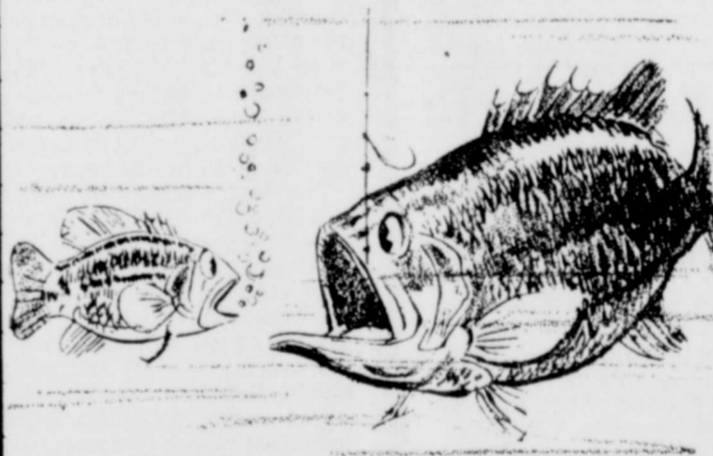

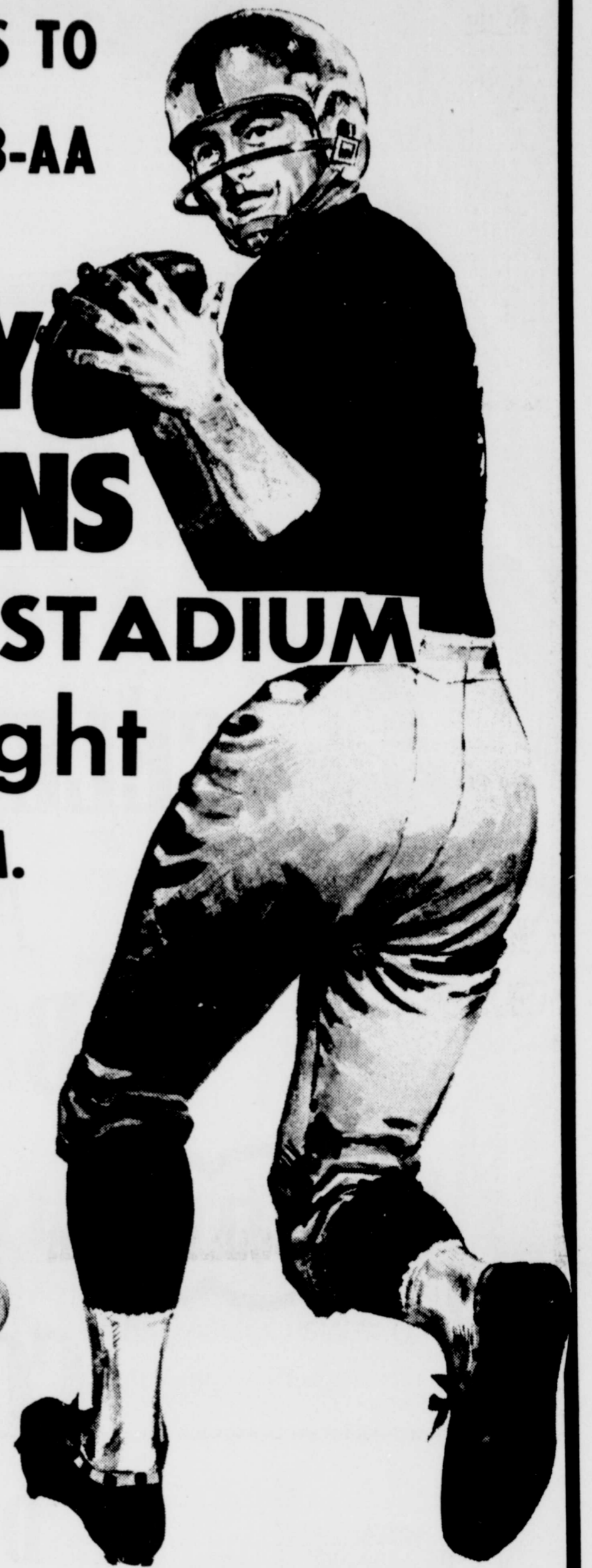
