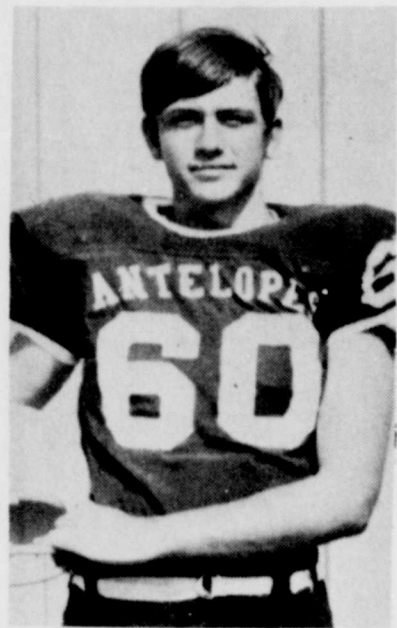

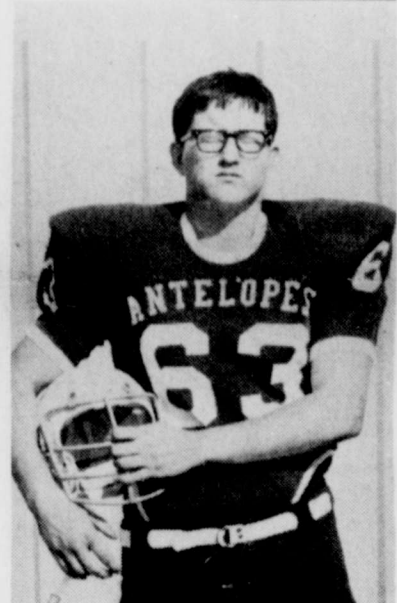
### Plans Made

### AHS Homecoming Game Friday With Friona; Lose to Olton

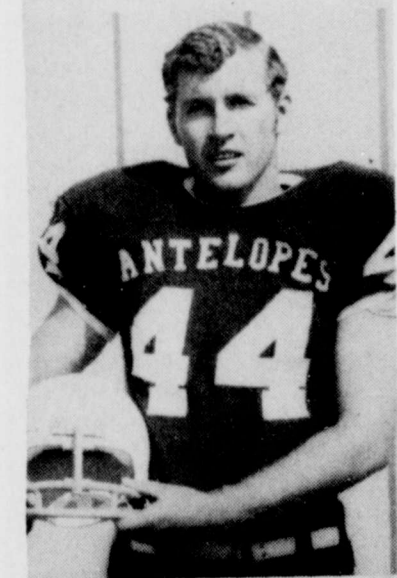
#### Players Of The Week

Two defensive tackles and a hard running fullback were named as the outstanding players for their play against Olton last week. Keith Lambert and Ruwayne Struve were the top defensive men chosen by the coaches. Both were chosen because they graded good and because they made several big plays on defense. Struve was in on 17 tackles and drew special praise for his play in the Antelope goal line defense. Lambert was in on 13 tackles and played his best defensive game of the year. Coach Kennedy said "Both Keith and Ruwayne were whipped some, but their play was very good, considering the responsibilities they had in the game stop the great running backs of Olton, and put pressure on their passer. They both did a good job on this."

Although Mark Harrison's offensive statistics weren't impressive, he drew praise from Coach Nickerson for his blocking and tough running. "Mark always runs hard, but he's blocking hasn't always been what we would like. But this week he blocked real good. He has worked on this and has shown that he can do it," he said. Harrison carried the ball only five times and picked up 14 yards and one touchdown. Others who drew praise for their play was

The Abernathy Antelopes battled the Olton down to the very last, but finally bowed to the Mustangs 27-20. It was a game that saw the lead change hands six times. It was a game that kept spectators on their feet most of the time. It was a game that saw Olton gain in over 400 yards total offense while holding the Antelope attack to less than 100 yards. But most of all, it was a game that saw the Antelopes suffer their first district loss in three tries. The Lopes must hope now for someone to upset Olton while Abernathy wins the rest of theirs.

Unable to ever get their offense untracked, the Antelopes made several big plays on defense and on their speciality teams to score 20 points. The first Lopez score came in the first quarter of play after Charles Johnson had intercepted on Olton pass and returned it to his own 35. From there the running of Johnson, Mark Harrison, and Mike Kerr carried the ball to the one yard line. From there Johnson got the T-D. Dave Davenport kicked the extra point and Abernathy had a 7-0 lead.

Olton came back for two touchdowns and one extra point to take a 13-7 halftime lead. They held this until midway in the third period when a bad snap from the center on a punt try allowed Dane Vickers to break through and block the kick. Mike Bridges recovered the ball on the four yard line and Harrison took it over for the touchdown. Davenport's kick was true and the Lopes led 14-13.

The Mustangs drove 65 yards for the go ahead touchdown, taking a 19-14 lead. But the Lopes came right back with the games most spectacular play - a 85 yard kick-off return by Johnson. The kick try was no good and the Lopes led 20-19. Olton then proved why it has been able to go through six games without a loss -- they drove the ball 64 yards in 14 plays. Mixing passing with running, and taking advantage of a pass interference

call against the Lopes, the Mustangs took their final lead of the game on a T-D and pass for the extra.

Coach Nickerson said of the Antelopes: "We are disappointed that we didn't win, but we are certainly not disappointed with the way the Antelope team kept coming back. We didn't play as well as we thought we could on offense or defense, but Olton has a great football team and our kids have nothing to be ashamed of. We'll just have to bounce back and get after the rest of them -- and I know that's exactly what these boys will do. They have too much pride and team spirit to just give up."

There were several bright spots in the game that drew praise from the coaches. Coach Kennedy made mention of the play of the sophomores.

"We played several of them on our speciality teams and they performed like veterans. They have made a lot of improvement this year and will be a great help to us the rest of this year and next year."

This week the Antelopes will play host to the Friona Chieftans. It will be homecoming in Abernathy, and the Lopes will be going against a team that has won its last two games in district play. After losing to Olton, the Chiefs have defeated Dimmitt (14-0) and Littlefield (13-0).

Coach McKay, who scouted the chiefs last week, says, "Friona plays a real sound game their running attack is good -- they throw better than they did last year -- and their defense is tough. They have a great running back in Wesley Clark, and their quarterback, Don Fortenberry is a good man under."

### Texas Tech To Honor Charles Bucks

A graduate of Abernathy High School will be honored as a Distinguished Alumnus of Texas Tech in ceremonies Friday, October 23 in Lubbock.

Charles A. Bucks, Senior Vice President-Marketing of Continental Air Lines, will be one of four former students to receive the award of the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association.

Also to receive the award: Demetrio B. Lakas, president of Panama, Waymond Austin Davis of El Segundo, Calif., staff vice president in the headquarters of North American Rockwell Corporation, and Rear Admiral Felix P. Ballenger, commanding officer, National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Maryland.

The luncheon in the University Center is open to the public. Tickets costing \$4.00 each, may be purchased from the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association and the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Bucks was born in Lubbock, Texas in 1927, received his early schooling in Abernathy and attended Amarillo Junior College and Texas Tech.

During World War II he served as an instructor at the U. S. Naval Training Base in San Diego and later was assigned to destroyer duty in the South Pacific. Upon his discharge in 1946 he attended the South Plains Flying School in Lubbock and won a commercial pilot's license.

In January 1948 Bucks joined Pioneer Air Lines as a transportation agent in the Lubbock station and was promoted to district sales manager in the West Texas territory in April 1950. Three years later he was transferred to Dallas as district sales manager. In 1954, he was promoted to regional and interline sales manager for Pioneer. When Continental and Pioneer Air Lines merged in 1955, Bucks assumed the duties of district sales manager in Dallas, transferring in 1956 to Denver as sales promotion manager.

In 1969 he was elected to the board of directors of Continental and at the first of this year he was named senior vice president-marketing.

In this position he is responsible for defining the airline's marketing objectives and strategy, for determining the product it sells and for the manner in which the company sells and delivers that product. He also heads up the advertising, sales and service and market services activities of the vast Air Line.

In 1969 Bucks was extended an invitation to membership in Conquistadores del Cielo, a select group of 125 individual leaders in the field of aviation from throughout the world. He now serves on the Board of Directors.

Bucks is married to the former Joyce Turner, who attended school in Abernathy. They have four children.

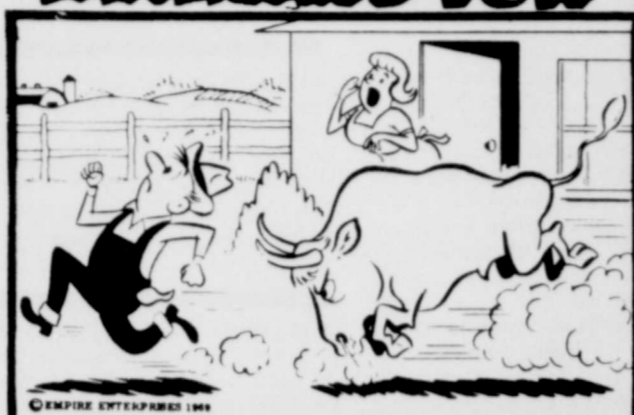

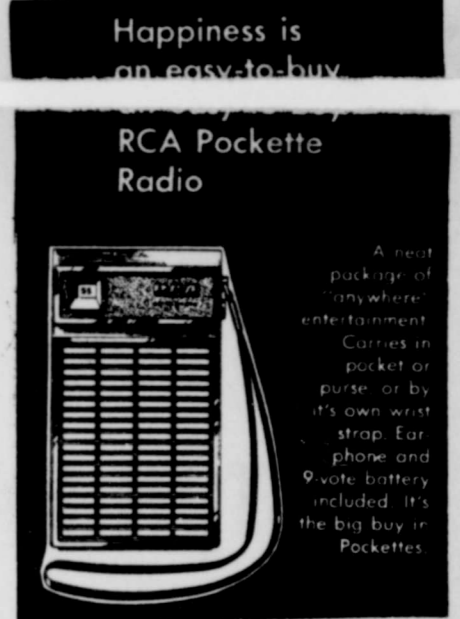

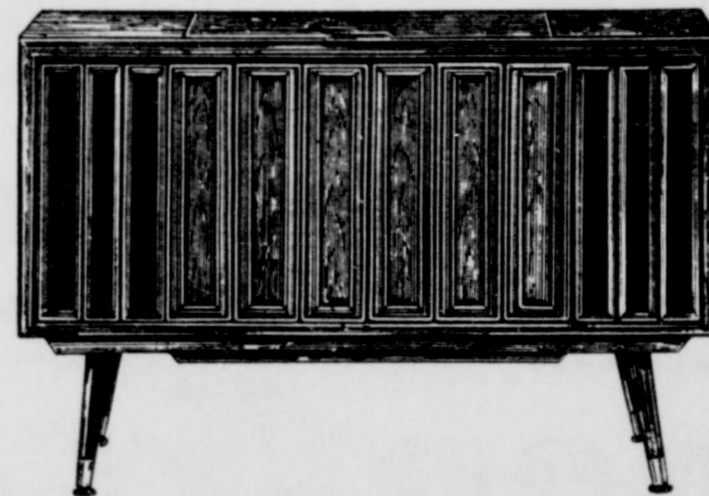

SCHOOL ASSEMBLY PROGRAM OCT. 29

COLLEGE STATION---Nuclear energy and its applications will be demonstrated in an Oct. 29 presentation at Abernathy High School.

The program titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint Abernathy students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research.

Conducted by Harold L. Watson, the program is part of the

Atomic Energy Commission's traveling educational program. Watson will explain in student terms the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion. Special equipment will be used to demonstrate sources of radiation and how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity. Use of radioisotopes to aid in diagnosis and treatment of diseases and to learn more about life processes also will be graphically portrayed.

The program will be presented by Texas A&M University in cooperation with Oak Ridge Associated Universities, a non-profit educational and research corporation of Southern colleges and universities which operates the nationwide AEC educational program.

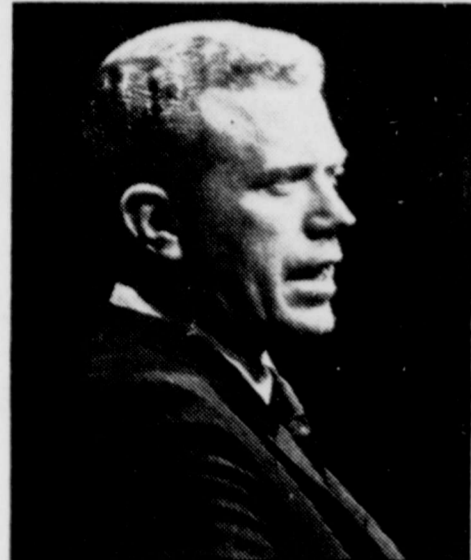
