Mrs. J. H. Pace, 55, Rt. 2 Hale Center, was killed about 3:15 p.m. Friday in a car-pickup collision east of Plainview at the intersection of two county roads. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Glenn Stone.

Mrs. Pace was driving a car headed west, according to investigating highway patrolmen, and the pickup, driven by Isauro R. Gutierrez, 43, 108 SE 10th, was travelling north. The collision occurred half mile north of

Gutierrez was listed in satisfactory condition at Central Plains General Hospital. Barrett Ambulance Service removed the two victims of the mishap Gutierrez reportedly sustained a fractured left arm and multiple




