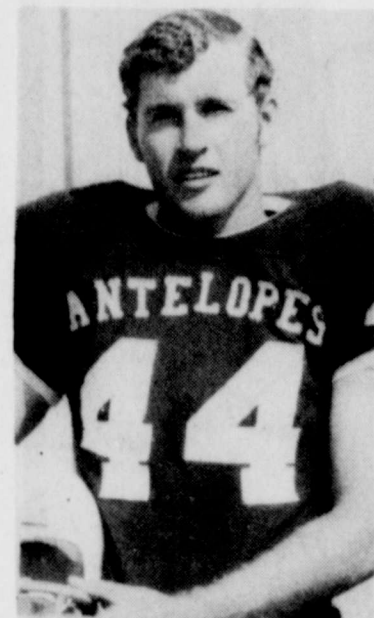

## Antelopes to Meet Dimmitt Here Friday; Down Littlefield, 47-14

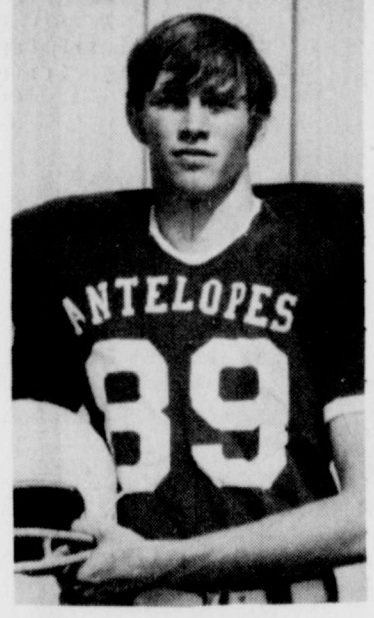

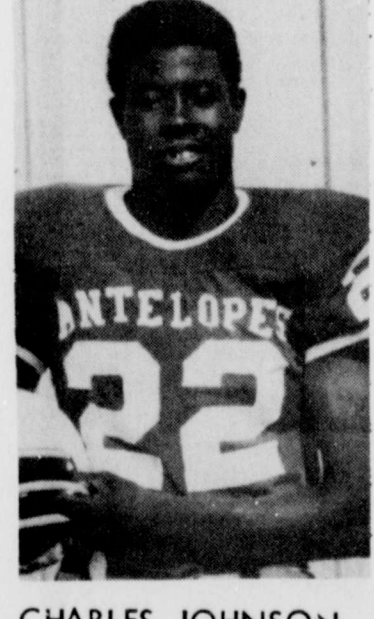

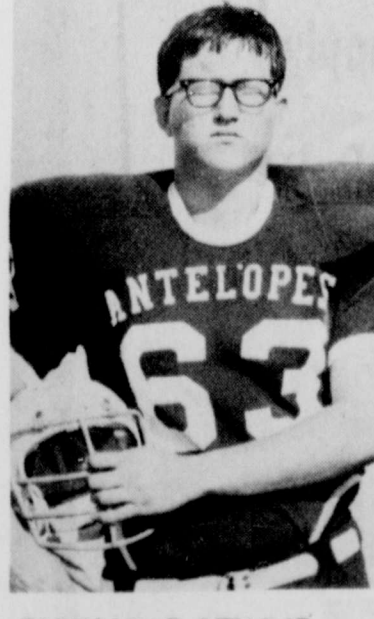

The beginning was the same. The middle of the game was the same. And the outcome was the same. In fact, it was just as if the Friona game was being played again. The Antelopes took an early lead against Littlefield, just as they did against Friona, and saw the Wildcats, come back to go ahead, and then the Antelopes came roaring back to take the win in the last quarter again just like in the Friona contest. But this time it was by a bigger margin - 47-14.

Mark Harrison scored first for the Lopes on a seven yard run. Dave Davenport kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead. In the second period, Kirk Lane hauled in a Davenport and raced 63 yards for a touchdown. The kick try failed. Littlefield went to the air and scored on the last play before the intermission. Ruwayne Struve blocked the kick try and the Lopes went to the dressing room leading 13-6.

The Antelopes lost the lead in the third quarter when the Wild cats scored after, recovering a fumbled punt on the Antelope 15 yard line. The extra point try saw the cats pass for two points and a 14-13 lead.

It was time for the Lopes to be aroused and true to form they came roaring back to score five touchdowns. The first came four plays after the kickoff following the Wildcats go-ahead score. Charles Johnson scored from one yard out after a pass interference against Kirk Lane in the end zone.

Mark Harrison scored from 18 yards out and then caught a pass from Davenport for the extra points. Bruce Kinast caught a 35 yard pass from Davenport for the next T-D and Bobby Rogers ran the bonus points. Charles Johnson scored from five yards and the Antelopes closed out their highest scoring effort of the year when Harrison intercepted a pass and raced 60 yards for the T.D.

Even though it was the offense that dominated the game, the defensive crew drew praise from the coaches. "We shut out their running game, holding them to 47 yards rushing," Coach Kennedy said. "We passed for 96 yards, but we were forcing them to throw more than they ever had before. We thought our defensive players played a great game. We had several big plays throwing their passer for a loss six times for a total 44 yards," he added.

The Antelope offense accumulated 408 yards. Mark Harrison got 64, Mike Kerr 11 and Bobby Cuevas 7. In the passing department, Dave Davenport completed 7 of 10 passes for 167 yards and two touchdowns. The Lopes had 21 first downs while the Wildcats got 13. Over all it was a great win for the Lopes who pushed their season record to 6-2, and their district to 4-1. This week the Antelopes play host to the team that gave them their worst defeat last year - the Dimmitt Bobcats. Sporting a 5-3 record, the Bobcats came to town riding a two game winning streak. In district play they have defeated Littlefield and Lockney, while losing to Floydada.

### PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

There were stars in abundance last Friday night in the Antelope victory over Littlefield. The coaches named five boys as players of the week, with one, Mark Harrison, gaining the honors both on offense and defense. Bruce Kinast and Ruwayne Struve were the other defensive standouts, and Charles Johnson and Jackie McGaugh were the other offensive players named.

Harrison scored three touchdowns, two on runs of 7 and 18 yards and one on a beautiful 60 yard pass interception. He also caught two passes for 11 yards on an extra point try. He rushed for 64 yards on seven carries and was in on six tackles on defense. Coach Nickerson said, "Mark has shown great improvement in all areas this year. He put it all together in this game -- blocking, running, receiving, and defense. He played a great game."

Johnson had his second best rushing night of the year - 268 yards on 25 carries. Charles scored two T.D.'s, and according to Nickerson, "ran as hard as any back I've ever seen." Mark and Charles give us a good one-two punch on offense and with Dave Davenport passing our offense is well rounded," the Antelope coach added.

Jackie McGaugh was the top offensive lineman, grading 80% for the game. "This was Jackie's first game of the year, and his blocking was as good as we could ask for," coach Nickerson stated.

The third stanza was scoreless but in the fourth, the young Lopes scored once more on a 54 yard bomb from McClendon to Dominguez. Hardin ran the extra points and the Lopes won 38-0.

The ninth graders will play Olton here, this Thursday at 5:30. Their record now stands at 3-2.

On defense, several big plays were responsible for stopping the Wildcat offensive efforts, and Ruwayne Struve was in on some of these. This is the third week in a row for Struve to be named an outstanding defensive player. He was in on 14 tackles, blocked on extra point, and recovered a fumble.

Bruce Kinast, getting back into the starting line up, after being hindered by an ankle injury, was in on 12 tackles and played a top game. Coach Kennedy noted, "Both Bruce and Ruwayne were extra tough on ball carriers for several losses. Bruce's pass rush was good, and Struve's tackling was top notch."

Others mentioned by the coaches for their play were Dave Davenport, Kirk Lane, and Mike Hedges on offense, and Bobby Rogers, Larry Klafka, and Mike Kerr on defense.

Coach Nickerson also mentioned the improvement shown by the reserves, mostly sophomores. "These young players are a great asset to our football team, and their play, especially on our specialty teams, plays a great part in our winning," he said.

Mrs. J. H. Pace, 55, Rt. 2 Hale Center, was killed about 3:15 p.m. Friday in a car-pickup collision east of Plainview at the intersection of two county roads. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Glenn Stone.

Mrs. Pace was driving a car headed west, according to investigating highway patrolmen, and the pickup, driven by Isuro R. Gutierrez, 43, 108 SE 10th, was travelling north. The collision occurred half mile north of Linder Gin.

Gutierrez was listed in satisfactory condition at Central Plains General Hospital. Barrett Ambulance Service removed the two victims of the mishap. Gutierrez reportedly sustained a fractured left arm and multiple bruises.

Funeral services for Mrs. Pace were at 10:30 a. m. Monday at Hale Center Baptist Church with Rev. T. J. Ozburn, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Murry L. Brewer, Abernathy First Baptist Church Pastor. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park.

## Gunman Is In Custody

A 27-year-old Lubbock man who robbed Dale Worthan at gunpoint in the early morning hours of Oct. 25, at the Worthan home northwest of Abernathy, is in the Hale County jail in Plainview. The gunman was out on bail bond on a murder charge in Lubbock county at the time he robbed Worthan.

Hale County Deputy Sheriff Frank D. Russell of Abernathy was considering a suspect in the Worthan case when he received an anonymous telephone call. The caller said officers "had the right family" but the wrong member of the family was being suspected. A brother of the gunman was the original suspect.

The gunman was apprehended, charged with armed robbery and lodged in the jail in Plainview.

One of the factors that helped break the case was the injury Worthan delt the gunman with a crowbar as he was attempting to drive away from the Worthan home in a pickup. The pickup stolen from a farmer in Lubbock County, and that county probably will charge the gunman with vehicle theft to go along with his murder charge in that county and armed robbery charge in Hale County.

The five members of the Worthan family were terrorized by the gunman in their home for at out an hour, but they were not injured.

## Soldier Goes To Germany

Ft. Riley, Kan. (AHTNC) Army Specialist Five Juan Sosa, 21, son of Mrs. Maria Sosa, Anton, Tex., was among the 11,000 troops of the 1st Infantry Division, who left Ft. Riley Kan., Oct. 4-10, to be airlifted to Germany to participate in exercise reforgeer II.

The Big Red One Soldiers departed from Forbes Air Force Base in Topeka, Kan., and landed at one of three West German airfields, Rhein Main, Ramstein, or Echterdingen.

A few hours later, the troops picked up weapons, tanks and armored personnel carriers, which had been pre-positioned in Europe, and departed to the exercise site near the Czechoslovakian Border.

During the five-day training exercise, the division opposed aggressor forces from the 3rd Infantry Division, regularly stationed in Germany, and the German 35th Panzer Grenadier Brigade.

Reforgeer II was designed to test U.S. Army deployment from stateside bases in defending Western Europe with Nato Forces. A similar exercise, reforgeer I, was held in Germany in January 1969.

Members of the 1st division are scheduled to return to Ft. Riley in late October and November. Spec. Sosa, whose wife, Maria, lives on Route 1, Shallowater, Tex., is assigned to the Division's Battery C, 8th Battalion 6th Artillery. (H)

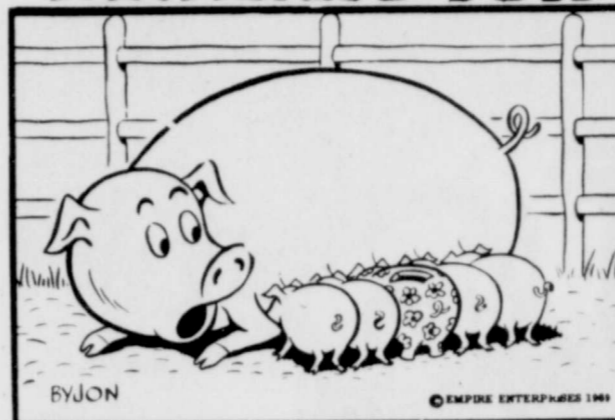

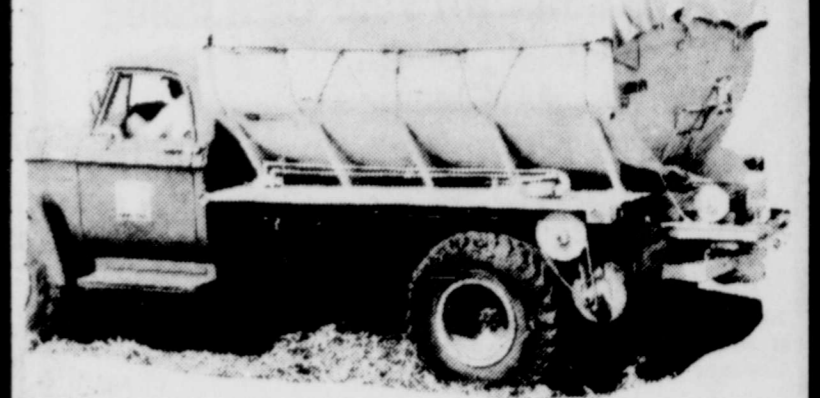
