



nually) 3. Dress policy for members & guests must be appropriate for the season. Boys must wear a shirt at all times: no short-shorts; and no swim suits at any ti-

4. Visitors to the teen center will be admitted without charge but will not be allowed to use any available equipment. 5. Guest must be accompanied by one member per guests; may use the facilities but must pay a guest fee of fifty cents. Use of intoxicant in any fo-

rm is strictly forbidden. Anyone showing the effects of the use of intoxicants will be barred from the premises. No smoking in the building. No abusive language. No loitering in cars and /or
