BASKETBALL SEASON IS OPENED HERE

The Antelopes Basketball teams of Coaches Steve Hill and Luke Nickerson opened the cage season last week against Idalou. The varsity of coach Hill lost to a fast breaking and pressing team of Wildcats 81-64, while the Jr. Varsity of Coach Nickerson defeated the "B" Wildcats 58-28.

In the varsity game the first of the year for the Antelopes and the third for Idalou, the Lopes were trailing at half time by 4 points, but a third quarter scoring spree, which saw the Wildcats score 20 points while the Lopes could only muster 12, proved to be the difference. The Lopes suffered from poor passes and the pressing of the Cats to trail 53-42 at the end of the third period. In the 4th stanza, the Antelopes scored 22 points while the Wildcats tallied 16.

All 12 Antelope players saw considerable action and 11 out of the 12 scored points. The top point producer was Steve Phillips with 15, followed by Mark Harrison, Dave Davenport, and Bruce Kinast with 8 each. Others seeing action on the varsity were Kirk Lane, Mike Kerr, Larry Klafka, Keith Lambert, Larry Betts, Charles Johnson, Bobby Rogers, and David Lovelace.

The Jr. Varsity Lopes trailed at the end of the first period 9-12, but in the second quarter, the Lopes held Idalou to only one point while scoring 10, to take a 28-13 point half time lead. At the end of the 3rd quarter, the Lopes led 38-19, and at the end of the game 58-28. Two players scored in double figures - Dick Rogers with 18, and Dane Vickers with 16. Others involved in the action for the Jr. Varsity were Larry Lutrick, Jessie Webb, Randy Settle, Audie Corning, Roger Phillips, Ernest Johnson, Kent Snodgrass, and Wayne McCune.

Stir well. Fill shell with mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. When custard is set, scatter 1/2 lb. crisp bacon pieces on top. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.
