# Free Lunch Program For Schools

Abernathy ISD Announces New Free and Reduced Price Policy Abernathy Public Schools has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. The school serves a well-blanced nutritious lunch each school day. The charge to students who can pay is 40¢. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the building principals or special programs director to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches. Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price lunches are urged to apply. Copies of the application form were sent home in a letter to parents earlier this week. Additional ( copies may be obtained at any principal's office. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence. based on the following Inco-

me Scales prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture in accordance with Public Law Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire flood, or any other disaster of this nature; seasonal unemployment and similar emerg-

ency situations, will also be considered. If a family is not satisfied with the decision made on their application, it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to Dr. Webb Superintendent of Schools in the administrative office at the High School. He will review the application with them and see if different arra-

ngements can be made. The school district's formalfree and reduced price policy statement and the procedure that will be followed when a decision is appealed are on file in the superintendent's office and may be reviewed by any interested person.

#### Japan's Textile Exports To US Up 63% in 9 Mos.

TOKYO (FNS) - Exports of textile products to the United States during the first nine months of 1970 showed a 63 per cent increase over the corresponding period of 1969.

Shipments of knitted fabrics approximately tripled from 1.8 million pounds during the January-September period of last year to 5.6 million pounds for this year's nine-month period.





A. No. the children's check will continue, but your benefit will be terminated. At the present time the benefit amount for the children is reduced due to the maximum amount payable to the family. When you are no longer eligible for payments, the children's benefit will be increased


