Larger Free Lunch Program For Schools

Abernathy ISD Announces New Free and Reduced Price Policy. Abernathy Public Schools has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. The school serves a well-balanced nutritious lunch each school day. The charge to students who can pay is 40¢. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the building principals or special programs director to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches. Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price lunches are urged to apply. Copies of the application form were sent home in a letter to parents earlier this week. Additional copies may be obtained at any principal's office. The completed application, signed by an adult member of the family should be sent to the building principals or special programs director. Such applications will be reviewed promptly and within 5 days the family will be notified in writing as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence. Decisions for approval will be based on the following Income Scales prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture in accordance with Public Law 91-248. Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood, or any other disaster of this nature; seasonal unemployment and similar emergency situations, will also be considered. If a family is not satisfied with the decision made on their application, it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to Dr. Webb, Superintendent of Schools in the administrative office at the High School. He will review the application with them and see if different arrangements can be made. The school district's formal free and reduced price policy statement and the procedure that will be followed when a decision is appealed are on file in the superintendent's office and may be reviewed by any interested person.

School Attendance Shows An Increase

School Board In Meet Here

The Board of Education of Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session Monday, December 7, at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room of the High School. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and bills for the month of November were approved as presented. Reports given included the tax collection report for the current year showing 86.86% of the current roll as having been collected. An itemized budget progress report for the first quarter of the fiscal year was accepted as presented. Enrollment report for the 3 months of the year revealed 1166 students in grades 1-12 and 70 in kindergarten. Also, reports were given on the luncheon operation and policy changes were approved regarding free and reduced-price lunches. A story will be released to the newspaper explaining this in detail. The average daily participation for November was 652. An athletic report showing the football receipts for 1970 was presented and it revealed that the average income per game was \$515.95. This is broken down showing an average per home game as \$579.94 and an average per game away from home \$451.91. It was also pointed out that over a 10-year period the best game receipts came from contests involving Petersburg, Floydada, Hale Center, or Post. The new fiscal accounting system for public schools was discussed and it is planned that the local schools will make gradual changes until they are able to be in full compliance prior to the deadline date of September 1972. The special education procedure known as "Plan A" was discussed and tentative plans were made to cooperate with area schools to examine the possibilities of up dating special education programs. TEXTILES

Japan's Textile Exports To US Up 63% in 9 Mos.

TOKYO (FNS) — Exports of textile products to the United States during the first nine months of 1970 showed a 63 per cent increase over the corresponding period of 1969.

Shipments of knitted fabrics approximately tripled from 1.8 million pounds during the January-September period of last year to 5.6 million pounds for this year's nine-month period.

The doldrums that struck here in the last half of the 1960s are giving way to anticipated progress. Several new homes are under construction here. A business building, to house Joe W. Gordon Automotive Repair, is going up, and there is a chance for drilling to start soon on inside tests in the Anton-Irish Oil Field west of town in the County Line Community. Drilling is due to start within the near future on 15 or more of the inside test

wells. "Inside" means that the test wells will be drilled within the now-producing Anton-Irish Field, not outside the field.

-tip- Another bright spot of progress is Abernathy's very fine school system. Enrollment at last report in the school board meeting stood at 1,165 compared with 1,110 for the same date in 1969. -tip- Not only is the school progressing in numbers of students and teachers and teachers' aides, the quality of the education process is improving which is more important than "numbers".

-tip- Local churches are enjoying increased attendance along with deeper and more active religious interest among the memberships.

-tip- Take a look at the bustling activity in Abernathy's business sections. That, too, has improved from the last half of the 1960s.

-tip- A rumor says that builders are seeking a site bound on the east by West Service Street, on the south by Main Street and on the west by Ave. C to construct a restaurant building and Conoco service station.

-tip- Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association purchased the old lumber yard site fronting east on West Service Street west and on Ave. C, to build a service station and service center. They already own the property north of that site, bound on the north by 10th St.

In Accident At Lubbock

G. B. Woods, 23, Lubbock, was killed Friday night when the car he was driving crashed into the rear of a car driven by Gary Lovelace, 20, of Abernathy. 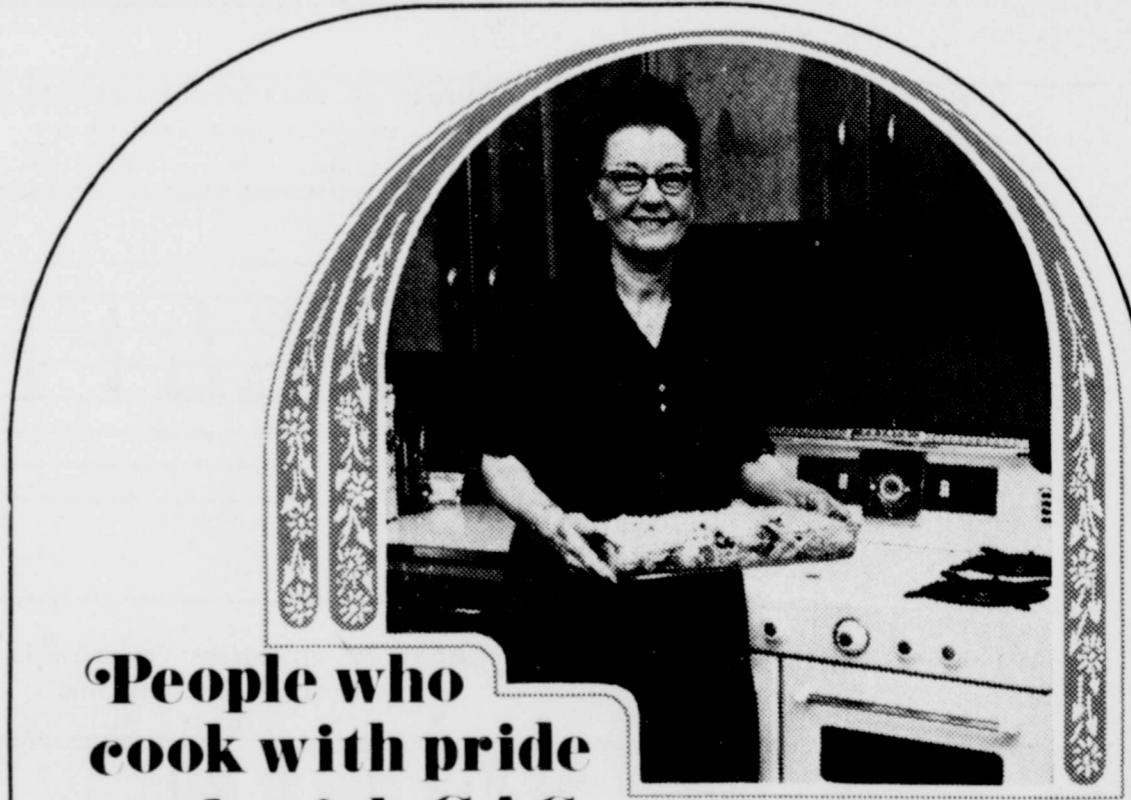

Questions and Answers

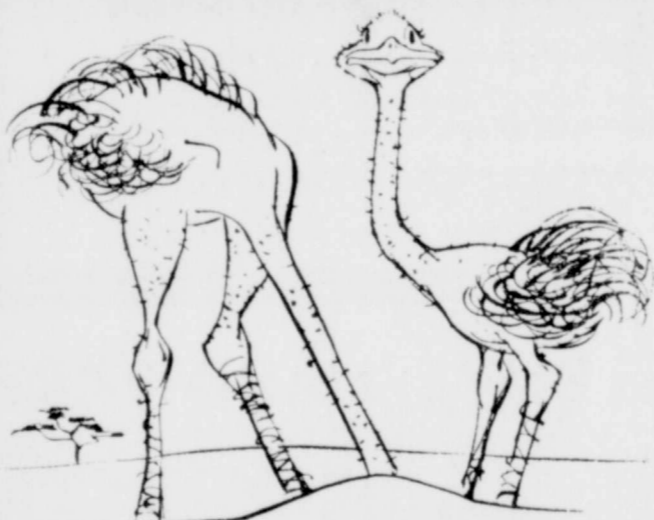

Q I have been receiving social security checks for myself and three children since my husband's death three years ago. If I re-marry, will the children's checks be stopped?
A No. The children's check will continue, but your benefit will be terminated. At the present time the benefit amount for the children is reduced due to the maximum amount payable to the family. When you are no longer eligible for payments, the children's benefit will be increased.
For more information contact the social security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview. If more convenient, meet with a social security representative. He is in Floydada at the courthouse on Wednesday morning in Matador in the lobby of the First State Bank on the first Tuesday morning of each month, and in Abernathy in the City Hall on the second Tuesday morning of each month.

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National Merit Scholarship Program

National Merit Scholarship Program, Counselor Charles Bowen announced today.
The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide Merit Scholarship competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Text (NMQST). The test will be given only once during this school year. Our school is scheduled to give the NMQST at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, February 16, 1971.
Taking the NMQST is also the first step for students who wish to participate in other scholarship programs administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). These programs include the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students and Special Scholarship programs administered by NMSC for business and industrial firms.
NMQST participants pay a \$1.25 test fee.
When his NMQST scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him understand his scores and compare his test performance with that of other high school students across the country. The handbook, which contains information about making college choices and financing a college education, is furnished as a part of reporting the student's test results. Other interpretive materials are sent to the school.
The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Merit Program Semifinalists and, if they advance to Finalist standing, they will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the
