# Mrs. Harp and **Daughter Hurt** In Collision

Mrs. Elbert Harp, vocational education teacher in Abernathy Junior High Schoo', and their daughter, Carol Harp, who will be 12 years old Jan. 13, were injured in a two-vehicle collision about 3 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 30, at the intersection of U.S. Highway 87 (I-27) and Highway 54, three miles north of Abernathy.


