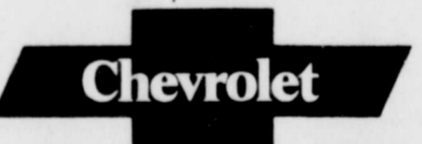

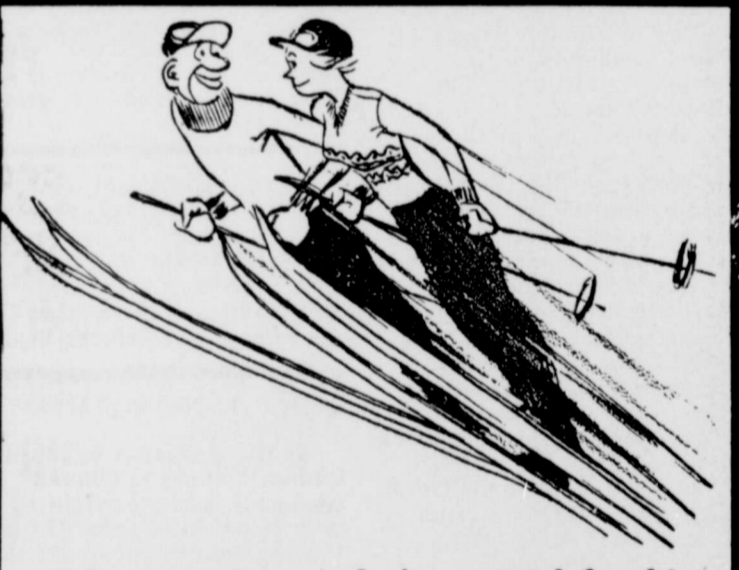

The Pattersons' apology is to those who may have driven over town to check the list of houses and yards selected by the judges for various honors.)

National Merit Scholarship Program

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide Merit Scholarship competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST). The test will be given only once during this school year. Our school is scheduled to give the NMQST at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, February 16, 1971.

Taking the NMQST is also the first step for students who wish to participate in other scholarship programs administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). These programs include the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students and Special Scholarship programs administered by NMSC for business and industrial firms.

NMQST participants pay a \$1.25 test fee.

When his NMQST scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him understand his scores and compare his test performance with that of other high school students across the country. The handbook, which contains information about making college choices and financing a college education, is furnished as a part of reporting the student's test results. Other interpretive materials are sent to the school.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Merit Program Semifinalists and, if they advance to Finalist standing, they will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 24,800 students have won Merit Scholarships in the fifteen programs to date. Approximately 2975 new winners of Merit Scholarships entered college this fall.

Abernathy High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1972 should register now to participate in the 1971-72 National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 450 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts.

Checking the last issues, EBONY was thicker than both LIFE and LOOK combined, EBONY was chock-full on national advertising. EBONY is a well-edited, interesting magazine. In these days of racial strife, I like to know what the Negro is thinking and saying. That's why I take, and read the EBONY.

Thanks to all the people who went to all the trouble and considerable expense to light and decorate their yards and homes for Christmas. Your efforts are appreciated.

H.E. Richter, who resides at 1401 Ave. K, reports that bluebonnets in their yard have been blooming for the past month. Mr. Richter, who was reared in the bluebonnet country of the Blanco-Burnet area of Texas, says it is very unusual to have bluebonnets blooming here at this time of the year.

There is a 40-mile-per-hour highway speed sign in one-half block of one of the most dangerous street intersections in Abernathy. The sign is posted on First Street (FM 597) just before it crosses Avenue D (Loop 369) at the Joe Thompson Implement Co. corner. That intersection has logged a number of serious vehicle accidents plus several minor "fender-bending" contacts.

Local motorists, who drive-to survive coming off First onto Ave. D, ignore the 40 mph sign and cut speed slower to approach the stop sign. Strangers in the area going 40 mph when they pass that speed sign are hard-pressed to halt at the stop sign a half-block away.

Also, many of city's traffic control signs seem "misplaced," guarding light traffic on unpaved streets, making heavy traffic on paved streets "stop" or "yield." The city should have a professional traffic safety engineer come in and make a survey of the town, letting him suggest where traffic control signs should be placed.

The Rev. U.S. Sherrill of Abernathy, pastor of Lakeview Methodist Church, reported a good crowd there New Year's Eve in a religious service to see the old year out and to welcome 1971.

A rural dirt road west of Abernathy has been approved for paving, it was announced by the Hale County Commissioners Court last week. Boyd Griffith, one of several residents in that area who have been working to get the paving, said the route of the improvement will be as follows: starting at Highway 54 near the Harold W. Thomas farm home, and go south three miles, plus connecting with FM 597 where the road runs between Sections 22 and 23, Block DT. The new paved road will be one mile east of the Griffith farm home. He said the new paved road will serve about 14 families in that area and a school bus route out of Abernathy. This is in addition to transient highway traffic.
