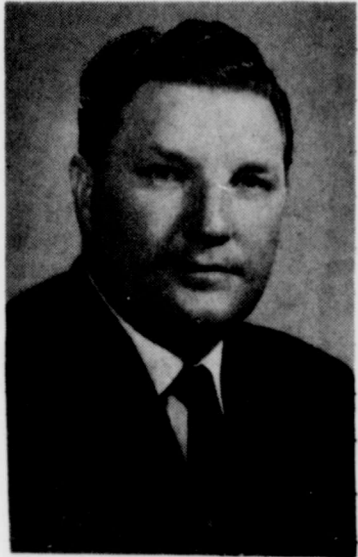

### Dr. Shipp To Speak At Church



Dr. Tom Shipp, pastor of Lover's Lane Methodist Church in Dallas, will be the featured speaker at the Abernathy First United Methodist Church, Wednesday, January 27th, 6:00 with a supper consisting of sandwiches, pies, coffee, and tea. The evening meal will be followed by congregational singing and several special services beginning at 7:30 p. m. The song service will be led by Wayne Starch of Abilene.

Dr. Shipp--turned out into the world to make it on his own at a very early age, overcame many obstacles to become what he is today. It seemed impossible that this "orphan" boy would one day finish school and become a preacher; that he would organize Lover's Lane Methodist Church in Dallas and remain as its pastor for some 25 years; that he would lead his 7,000-plus congregation into an active awareness and concern for alcoholics and drug addicts; that he would become an outstanding man in the Methodist world and a widely-known speaker throughout this great country.

Yet, all of this and much more! --has come to pass in the life of Dr. Tom Shipp. He says that it was all made possible through the love of God.

Dr. Shipp has received numerous religious, civic and academic awards, and serves as a director in a number of church and civic organizations in the Dallas area. Dr. Shipp emphasizes that rarely does one man deserve an award; rather it is an honor due many, for without the help of others, few of us can achieve the things we frequently are dedicated to achieve.

"We hope you will come and join in the fellowship. I am certain that you will not go away untouched if you hear this dynamic, effective Christian speak," stated the Rev. Conrad Ryan, local Methodist pastor.

## Tombstones Are Vandalized In Local Cemetery

On the night of January 17, 1971 someone entered the Abernathy Cemetery and overturned, broke and otherwise damaged thirty-five Tombstones. This was totally uncalculated and shows high disregard for the deceased. Damages are estimated to be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1000 to \$1500.

This act indicates a wanton disregard of other people's rights. It was an act of vandalism by an apparently misguided mind. Such acts as this bring on public reactions as fast as anything known to this officer.

At the time of the writing of this article a reward fund is being gathered. Every effort will be made to apprehend the person or persons responsible for this sick act.

Upon discovery of the guilty party or parties every effort will be made to prosecute them to the fullest limits of the law.

Each and every damaged tombstone constitutes a separate offense and unnecessary will be handled as such. Damages run from slight to major damage. Each act where the damage was slight calls for jail sentences. Those where major damages (over \$50.00) were sustained each carries possible time in the state Penitentiary.

This bit of information: Any person having any knowledge of this destruction should report such information to the Abernathy Police Department at once. Anyone having and withholding information regarding this incident and failing to report such to the police can be and if necessary will be filed on as "Aiding and Abetting" in the cases.

Just why anyone would indulge in such vandalism cannot be imagined. To prevent this from happening again at a future date patrols will be made at random thru the cemetery.

## Tractor Short Course Is Held

The tractor maintenance short course held last Monday through Thursday had a total attendance of sixty-four persons, with an average of sixteen per session.

Mr. Norm Waggoner, Texas A&M Specialist conducted the programs, sponsored by the Abernathy Vocational Agriculture Department.

After a brief introduction Mr. Waggoner explained the importance of a sound maintenance program, especially stressing preventative maintenance. The engine operation and functioning was then discussed.

After a short coffee and donut break, the men were divided into groups to put theory into practice. A dynamometer test was run on each of four tractors to establish the horsepower rating before tune-ups and maintenance.

This horsepower rating would then be compared to another test following the tune up.

The second session was devoted to air cleaners, ignition and tuning. The air cleaning system of the demonstrator tractors were thoroughly cleaned, then new points and plugs installed.

Gasoline and LP Gas Fueled systems were discussed the third session. Also the Diesel system was discussed at length. Following the break two diesel tractors were checked for injection timing. The timing was correctly adjusted after discovering both systems were out of timing.

The final session cooling systems, compression testing and lubricants were discussed. Following the discussion each tractor was tested for horsepower rating on the dynamometer. All tractors showed an increase in horsepower; 7 horsepower was the lowest increase and eighteen was the highest. This demonstrated the importance of a simple tune-up and maintenance program.

Each member attending the program received a certificate.

The next game found the Lopes defeating the Littlefield Wildcats 52-47. Kirk Lane was the lone Lone scoring in double figures with 16 points, but several players were involved in the scoring. Kerr had 8, Bobby Rogers 6, Larry Betts 5, and Mark Harrison 2.

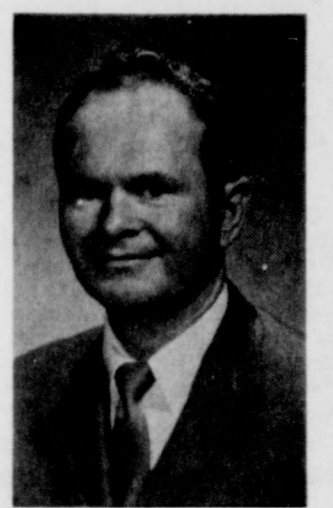
## Abernathy Physician Is Named Commander, AFR, For Reese 477th Medical Service Flight

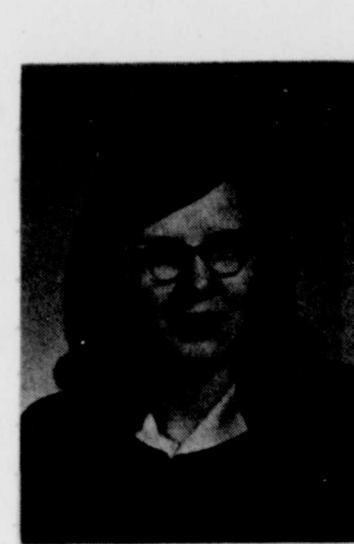

Is this television's sorriest season? Or, am I getting weary of the TV shows and the old movies that run and re-run and re-run and re-run on the boob tube?

I have not been in conference with the current city officials since starting this last dog howling in the column. I don't have to talk to them to

know what their problems are concerning the present dog situation. Their problems are the same that have faced all city administrations over the years.

Major problem city men face are attitudes people have toward their dogs. This may be a bit exaggerated, but the general attitude is, "You can insult my wife, kick my kids, but don't touch my dog."

Problem of enforcement of the dog ordinance fine assessment section is the city's burden of proof that the offender makes a general practice of letting the dog run wild. Most would claim that the dog "got out" of the yard and I didn't know it was straying.

Some community leaders who should be setting a good example by obeying the dog ordinance let their mutts run loose and they chase bike riders and nip at heels of pedestrians. These people should know better, and should get the same treatment as Joe Bloo, whoever he is.

Another big problem for the city is getting someone to be dog catcher. They've had a few but not lasted very long. Some joker may write my name in for dog catcher on the city ballot. Don't. I am afraid of dogs. I have had too many confrontations with mean dogs.

The \$2 bounty system used by the cities of Slaton and Post has its faults. If some non-city employee started gathering up dogs all over town, he might get shot.

Postmen and meter readers are victims of stray and or dangerous dogs. The man who reads water meters is the most vulnerable victim for mean dogs. He has to get on his knees, bend over and look into the meter box. In this position, he is a perfect target for mean dogs. I know, because water meter reading was one of my moonlighting jobs in the 1940's. Electric and gas meter readers also have their troubles with dogs.

In the case of city letter carriers, they have the protection of Uncle Sam. The letter carriers can, and should, refuse to deliver mail to homes that have mean dogs. If this noster ruling could be expanded to allow them to skin whole sections of town that have roving, and potentially dangerous, dogs, public opinion would be stronger against those who let their dogs run wild.

The city might try this approach to the dog problem: Have city employees report homes that let dogs run loose. Make a list of the offenders and have city policemen go to their homes
