During that time the City Hall was bombarded with calls to come pick up a dog or dogs that had turned over the trash barrels, chased small children on their way to school or out at play, carried off the morning paper and etc. A pe-

erson that has not been there can not realize what it is like to have a neighborhood gang up on the City employees. Two weeks ago we had a man start trying to catch a few dogs. We have caught a few and are going to continue to catch the strays, as well as the pets that are allowed to run loose. There is nothing a child likes more than a little dog for a pet. That is fine but they must learn to take care of their pets. Also, there is nothing more disturbing than a dog that is allowed to run free or bark all night.

In a few days we will have a clinic with a cage and equipment to handle dogs a little better. Maybe we will have better luck keeping a dog catcher on the job. Any dog picked up will have to have a dog license. \$2.00 for male, \$3.00 for female, vaccination shot, \$1.00 per day pound fee and a fine of \$5.00 for the first time, \$10.00 second time and \$25.00 for the third time and up to \$200.00. anything of your pet please take care of it. Don't get mad at us when we catch it. We will not come up in your yard to pick up a dog unless we are asked to. This is one of the unpleasant jobs of a City employee. Roy E. Jones, City Manager

Dear Editor:

Thanks for your answer to Mr. Les.

Now I would like to have my say. The traps set at 1110 14th St., are not predatory traps of the nature Mr. Les seems to suggest. These traps don't harm any animal, unless it be his or her dignity. But as far as the definition of predatory states, dogs are more or less predatory animals, they turn over trash cans, chase and occasionally kill cats and in general destroy and ruin yards, gardens, and clothes hanging on clotheslines.

I would be glad for the humane society to inspect said traps. I don't believe it inhumane to trap dogs but some people are putting out poison and that most certainly is inhumane and dangerous to small children. Our family lost three dogs back in the 40s to poison. Now as to a predatory trap, I do have such a trap with which I caught a skunk about a year or so ago, but that trap was set in a hole and covered by a cage so as not to catch either a dog or cat. Yes, we caught the skunk and the "end" results was unpleasant for a few weeks.

Now as to exercise for these pets, a fenced yard or long leash would provide plenty of exercise. If not the owners could walk the dogs. Knowing that Mr. Les has had heart attacks, I have also had two heart attacks and my doctor suggested I walk about two miles a day. So perhaps it would work two ways, help the owners as well as exercise the dog.

I'm sorry to have the dog problem brought up again especially since you said in the Jan. 14 paper you would shut up. But when our neighborhood seemed to be going to the dogs (sorry for that) I thought I could help by ridding us of the roving bands of dogs and any other that the owner's swear never leave their yard, funny how those nice faithful stay at home dogs just happened to get into these traps a block away. Some of those nice dogs have taken a liking to the traps, they have been caught three times.

But there are other taxpayers who have thanked us for getting rid of the dogs, some people I don't know have called (since Mr. Les complained) and thanked me. If you have read this far, again thanks and I hope we can somehow all get together and get the dog problem under control. As long as the law stays on the books and I am able to continue trapping them in a humane way.

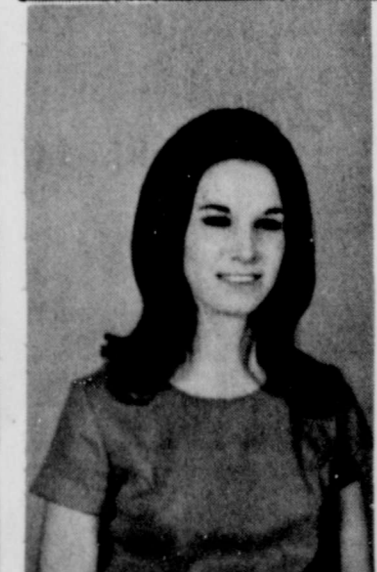

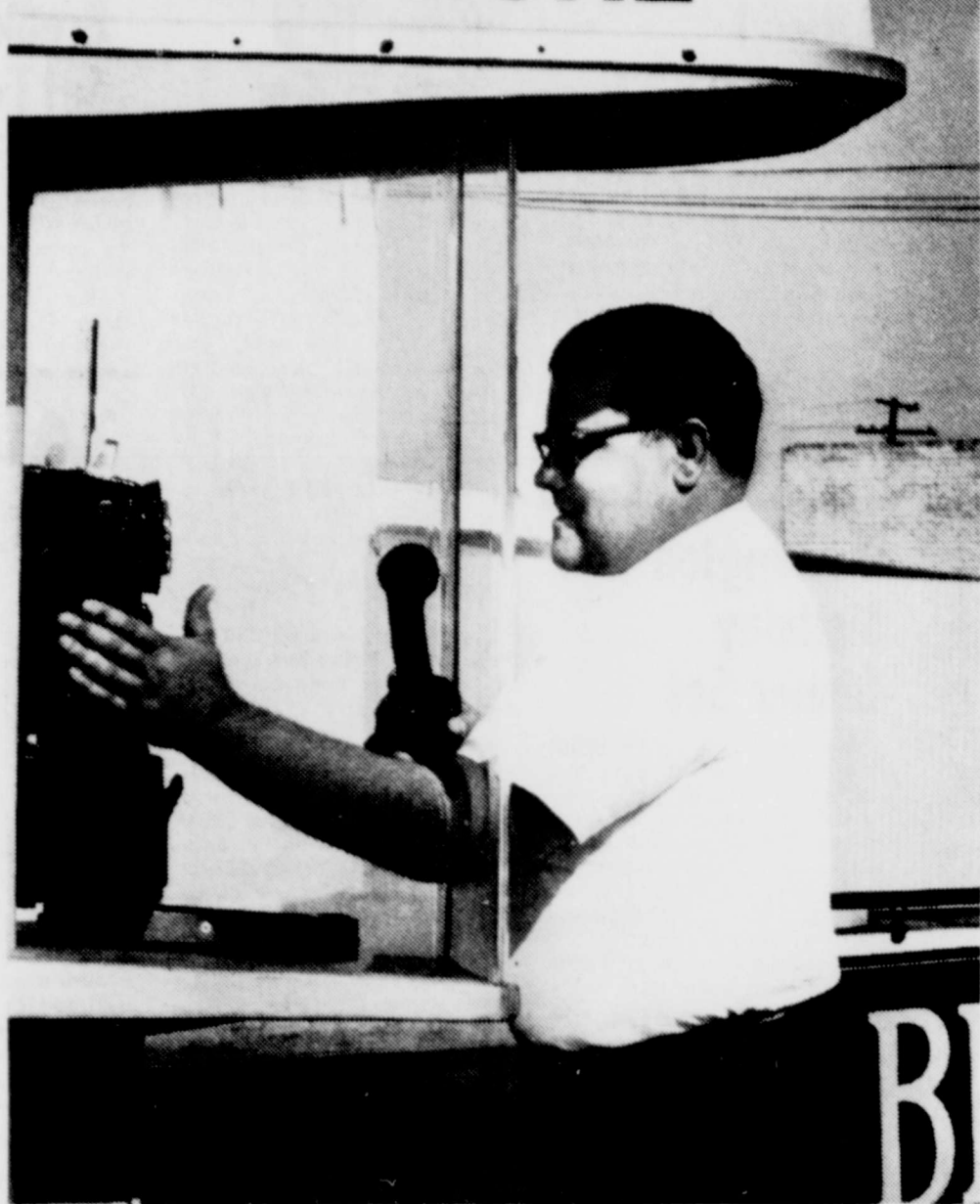

Scott, 53, owner and operator of The Heckville Country Store, died Saturday about 12:10 p. m. in a Lubbock hospital, where he had been under treatment for injuries sustained in a two-car collision the afternoon of Jan. 30. The fatal accident happened at the intersection of Highway 400 and U. S. Highway 62 east of Idalou. Mr. Scott was a passenger in a vehicle driven by Robert E. Bailey, 47, of 500 Slide Road, Lubbock. Also a passenger in the vehicle was U. D. Gregory, 50, of Rt. 1, Lubbock. Bailey and Gregory were treated at a Lubbock hospital and released. Bailey was headed north on Highway 400 when his vehicle and one being driven by George Medellin of Lorenzo collided at the intersection. Medellin was driving west on U. S. 62. Medellin was not injured, reports said. (See another story in this paper for more information on Mr. Scott.)

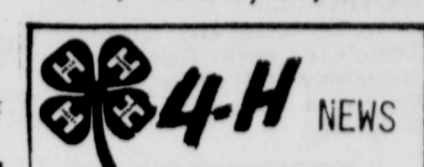
