

County Residents Get New Chance On Voter Signup

Hale County residents who didn't pick up their voter registration forms before the Jan. 31 deadline will get another chance

beginning Monday. Gov. Preston Smith signe. law Friday passed by the 62nd Legislature which extends signup deadline to Feb. 25.

Hale County Tax Assessor Collector Bill Hollars said the extra month will mean no changes in his office, with the exception of a final total.

Although final figures for the regular registration period are not yet complete for Hale County Hollars said Saturday he would estimate "in excess" of 10,000 persons had signed up in the regular registration period. He said he didn't think the extra month would bring in more than a couple of hundred new

voters. Hollars said since Feb. 23 falls on a Sunday, the last date for voters to fill out forms at his office will be Feb. 26. Before the regular registration period ended. Hollars kept his office, usually closed on Saturday, open from 9 a.m. until midnight the final Saturday before the deadline. However, he said he planned no extra opening hours during February.



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
