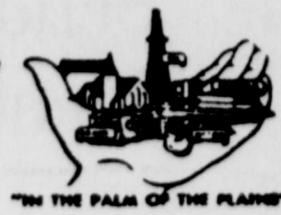

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The Abernathy Junior High School Intramural Basketball Tournament began Feb. 16, and will run through Saturday, Feb. 20. There are eight girls teams and eight boys teams with nine players on each team. Each team is composed of seventh and eighth grade students coached by high school basketball seniors. There is an admission of 10¢ for students and 25¢ for adults each time the person enters the gym. Players will be admitted free one time each session.

Special rules are necessary for a tournament of this nature to accomplish its purpose, participation, and at the same time maintain the competitive spirit of basketball. Each player on a team must play at least two full quarters but cannot play in more than three quarters during each game that the team plays (unless the player has committed five fouls).

The coaches of each team shall submit to the bookkeeper, five minutes prior to game time, the starting line up of players for each quarter. This line up must include all nine players on their team. Each player must play two full quarters before he or she can be substituted for or be used as a substitute. The clock will be stopped only for fouls, jump ball, and substitution and time outs (one per half per team). Decisions on rules will be made by the junior high coaches and/or principal.

Remaining sessions in the tournament will be as follows: 3rd session, Thursday, 4:00-9:00; 4th session, Friday, 4:00-7:00; 5th session, Saturday, 9:00-1:00; 6th session, Saturday, 5:00-9:00.

The annual FFA-4-H Club Project Show in Abernathy has been scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, March 8 and 9, at Service Grain Company's south barn. Weighing in for a stock will begin at 3 p.m. Monday with 7 p.m. as the deadline. Judging will begin at 2 p.m. Tuesday with Gilts, Barrows, Lambs, and Steers, in that order. Minimum and maximum weights for each division are as follows:

Steers---750 - 1100 pounds Barrows---180-240 pounds Lambs---75 - 120 pounds Breeding Gilts---none

Gilts may be shown in the Barrow division or the Breeding Gilts division, but not in both. The maximum number of entries per contestant in each division are:

Steers---none Lambs---none Barrows---4 Breeding Gilts---5

Trophies, rosettes, ribbons and prize money will be presented in each division. Ten ribbons will be presented in each class, with rosettes going to each breed champion and reserve champion, except Lamb Trophies will be presented to Grand and Reserve Champion Steers, Gilts, and Barrows and the champion of the breed in the Lamb division. A rosette will be presented to the Reserve Champion Lamb.

Lambs will be judged in the following breeds: Fine Wool, Fine Wool Cross, Medium Wool, and Southdown.

The Chris Benn Award will be presented to the outstanding boy or girl, based on how well they keep their project during the show, and how well they exhibit their animals.

Showmanship Awards will be presented in the Swine, Sheep, and Steer divisions.

The Chamber of Commerce will present awards to the Champion and Reserve Champion of each division. These will be presented during the show.

The judges for this year's show will be Jess Holloway, head of the Agriculture Department at Lubbock Christian College, Mr. Holloway, a native of Abernathy, is a graduate of Texas Tech, and trains the livestock judging teams at L. C. C.

Cookie Sale Is Feb. 26-March 11

Girl Scouts of the Caprock Council will begin their annual cookie sale, Friday, February 26, announced Mrs. Robert Bushy, of Lubbock, Council Cookie Chairman. Girl Scouts in the 18-County Council will be selling the cookies through March 1. The price will be 25 cents per box. **New P. O. Form
Now Available**

The local post office has received application forms for postal patrons who wish to take advantage of a new law designed to protect persons from receiving sexually oriented advertisements in the mails.

Effective Feb. 1, 1971, the new law enables one to list his or her name with the Postal Service, stated that he or she wishes NOT to receive any sexually oriented advertisements through the mails. The form may list the names of children under 19 years old. The Postal Service will compile a reference list of such names and make the list available, at a fee, to mailers. The law prohibits commercial solicitation of names on the reference list.

Thirty days after a person's name has been added to the reference list, any mailer who sends that person a sexually oriented advertisement subjects himself to both civil and criminal legal action by the U. S. Government. For detailed information about the provisions of the new law or to file for protection under the new law, patrons are asked to check with local postal employees.

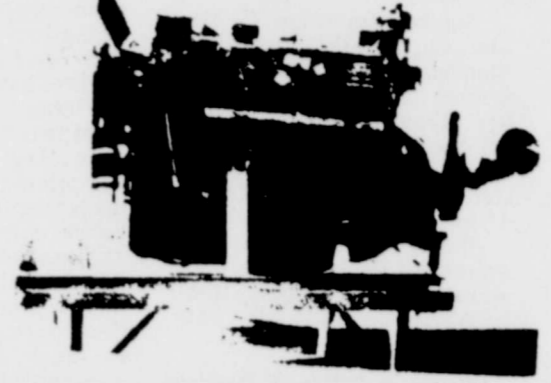

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 51 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

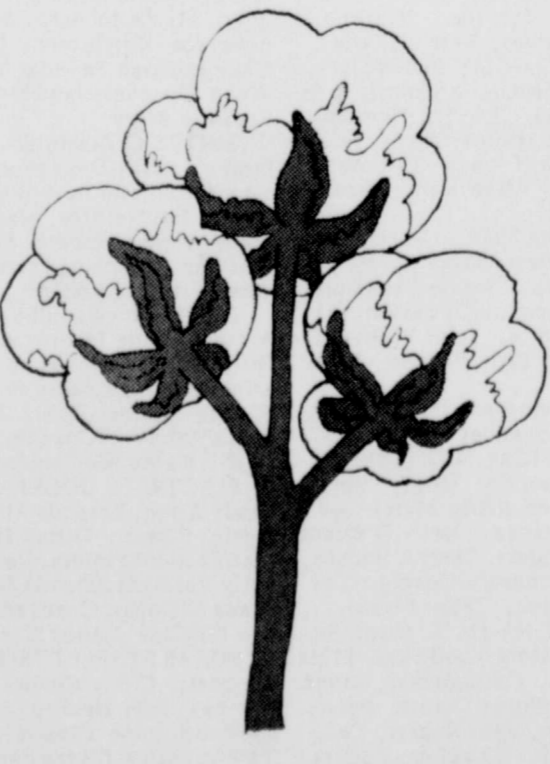
