City Council Holds Session

City Buys Electronic Alarm Unit

In a move to improve the city's ability to alert its volunteer firemen in case of a fire or the entire citizenry in case of foul weather or a Civil De-

fense alert, the city council purchased 20 electronic units for members of the Fire Department. The units will be tied into the city's regular radio system and will be operated by the same personnel that now operates the local unit. These units are portable and will be carried in the car or on the job or kept at home at night by the firemen. In this way they will always be alerted within a few seconds after an alarm is reported. City Fire Chief Ed Crow is very optimistic about the new equipment and the increased efficiency this will make possible. The Fire Department has agreed to pay 50% of the cost of the equipment out of their existing funds.

The state highway department requested an open forum type meeting for all interested citizens to discuss future plans for expressway 27 through the City. A date will be announced in next week's Review.

School Rooms, Auditorium Get "Coolers"

The Board of Education met in regular session May 3, 1971 at 8:00 p. m. in the board room. Mr. Billie Harrison and Mr. Lon Carmickle were given the oath of office for new 3-year terms. The board re-organized with the following officers elected: Mr. L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice president; Joe Lovelace, secretary.

The board approved the tax collection report showing 98.04 % of the current roll for taxes as having been collected. An itemized budget progress report was presented and approved.

Other routine reports included an enrollment report revealing 1149 students enrolled in grades 1-12. A monthly report from the school nurse and a report on the operation of the cafeteria for the month of April were given.

In other action the board approved payment for the new curtains recently installed in the auditorium. Also approved was the purchase of a complete science lab to be installed in the junior high school as soon as school is out.

Bids were accepted for window-type evaporative air conditioners for each of the 62 classrooms in the local schools. Authorization was given to investigate and proceed with installation of the evaporative type air conditioning for the auditorium.

The board voted to participate in the Region XVII Education Service Center for the school year 1971-72.

\$380,000 of callable bonds were issued at a lower percentage rate than the original issue in 1959. This will be a savings to the school of approximately \$4,500 during the next 5-year period when these bonds will be retired.

Bills before the legislature were discussed and the possible effect that some proposed legislation might have on the local school. Also discussed was the Attorney General's ruling concerning the purchase of Tort insurance with tax money.

The board briefly looked at the approval of Special Education Plan A which will be a cooperative venture between Hale Center, Petersburg, New Deal, and Abernathy and administered by the local schools. This program will not be effective until September 1972, therefore detail planning will come at a later date.

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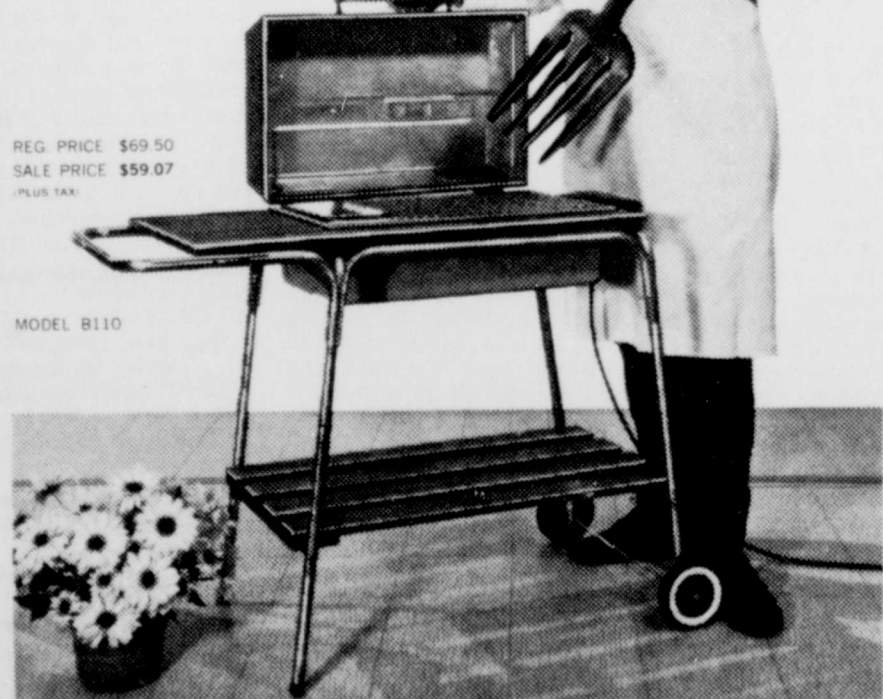
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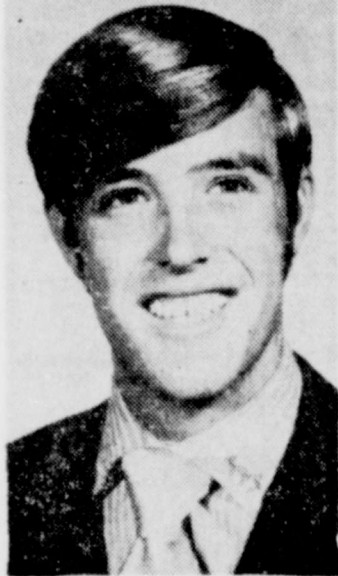

Facts About The Clean Water Amendment No. 4 on the Ballot, May 18 Voting:

1. WHAT ARE THE MAIN REASONS FOR THE CLEAN WATER AMENDMENT?

Briefly, **A. Financial:** to reduce the local tax burden in providing adequate sewage treatment facilities, to recover almost \$200 million in federal tax money for use in Texas. **B. Environmental:** to prevent improperly treated public sewage from ruining our rivers, streams, and lakes and endangering the fish and wildlife. **C. Conservation:** to help preserve one of our most precious natural resources—water. **D. Public Health:** to avoid serious health problems because of inadequate sewage treatment facilities.

2. WHAT WILL AMENDMENT #4 DO?

The amendment would authorize the sale by the state of \$100 million in general obligation bonds for a self-liquidating program with the specific purpose of constructing public sewage treatment facilities. In this way, payment for sewage treatment facilities may be paid over the extended life of the plant with no rise in state taxes. This removes the need for large state appropriations. Bonds would be issued at an interest rate not to exceed 6 percent. This rate would make the bonds marketable, and enhance the success of the program without a large state appropriation at considerable cost to the taxpayers.

Approval would allow the state to utilize a possible \$200 million in federal funds which would be brought back to Texas for the project. It is estimated that this activity in behalf of sewage treatment facilities for cleaner rivers, streams, and lakes, would benefit Texas workers economically with almost \$300 million in jobs. If the amendment does not pass it will mean a potential loss of millions of dollars to the state, as well as the loss of tremendous incentives to update our sewage treatment facilities.

3. NEED FOR THE CLEAN WATER AMENDMENT:

Disposal of improperly treated wastes by public sewage systems throughout Texas is causing a serious threat to the quality of our rivers, streams, and lakes. Local governments are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to continue providing new and improved adequate facilities under the present 67.33 percent local-federal matching program for construction of sewage treatment facilities.

4. WHAT WILL THE AMENDMENT MEAN TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS?

It means that instead of paying 67 percent of the costs of treatment facilities, local governments' share would drop to 45 percent, 25 percent of which will come from a low interest loan from the state.

5. WHO STANDS TO BENEFIT?

Every Texan will benefit—through the assistance to his city or town, and through cleaner rivers, streams, and lakes in the state.

6. WHAT PERCENT OF THE TEXAS POPULATION WILL BE DIRECTLY AFFECTED?

Approximately 80 percent of our population, or more than 8.5 million people, live in areas that either have or soon will have inadequate systems for disposing of their sewage.

7. IS PUBLIC HEALTH INVOLVED?

Yes. The amount of improperly treated sewage is growing as our population increases faster than treatment facilities can be provided. The amount of effluent increases with the population, but the amount of river water available to dilute the wastes remains constant. The result is an increasing water quality problem that can affect public health because of inadequate waste water treatment facilities.

8. WHAT ABOUT CONSERVATION AND THE ENVIRONMENT?

Concern for protecting our natural resources here in Texas indicates one of the greatest needs for the Clean Water Amendment. Adequate sewage treatment facilities can help avoid the fouling of our rivers, streams, and lakes in Texas by improperly treated sewage. Continued neglect of this problem could well endanger the wildlife in these rivers, as well as the waterways themselves.

9. WHAT ABOUT ENABLING LEGISLATION?

These specific points are resolved in the enabling legislation. **A.** The bond issue is dedicated exclusively to the construction of public waste water treatment facilities. **B.** Proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be loans to the entity and are to be paid back by the users of the facilities.

10. ARE NEW STATE TAXES INVOLVED?

No, because of the conditions stated in No. 9 B., the proceeds from these bonds will be in the form of loans to be paid back by the users.

11. IS ENVIRONMENTAL SAFETY ASSURED?

Yes, the Federal Environmental Protection Agency requires that, before a grant is made, an "environmental impact statement" be issued before each facility is authorized. This statement is an assessment of the effect each project will have on the environment. Projects that adversely affect the environment will not be funded.

12. WHAT PERCENTAGE OF WASTE WATER TREATMENT FACILITIES WILL NEED HELP?

In the next five years, an estimated 75 percent of all entities operating sewage treatment facilities will need new or expanded facilities.

13. COULD DAMS AND RESERVOIRS BE BUILT FROM THIS BOND ISSUE?

No.

14. WHAT ARE SPECIFIC SEWAGE DISPOSAL PROBLEMS?

A. Localized problems from lack of efficient centralized systems in small villages and improperly functioning septic tank systems. **B.** Water quality problems due to inadequate central sanitary sewage systems of small cities and towns with financial limitations. **C.** Coastal water quality problems from population growth outpacing sewage systems, and improperly functioning septic tanks. **D.** Incomplete coverage of sanitary sewage collection systems and small stream pollution. **E.** Lack of regional sanitary sewage systems and the proliferation of many small plants.

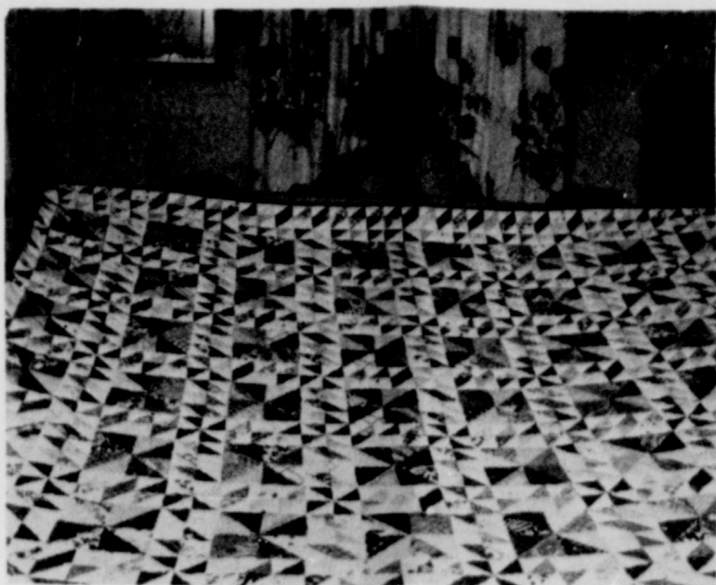

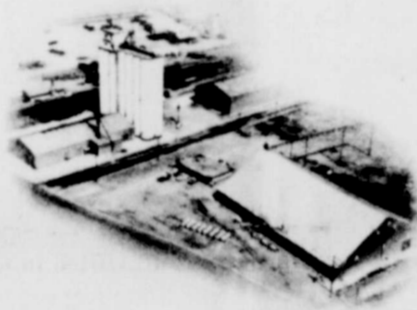

the new deputy, and said the deputy would be hired effective the date the car was delivered.

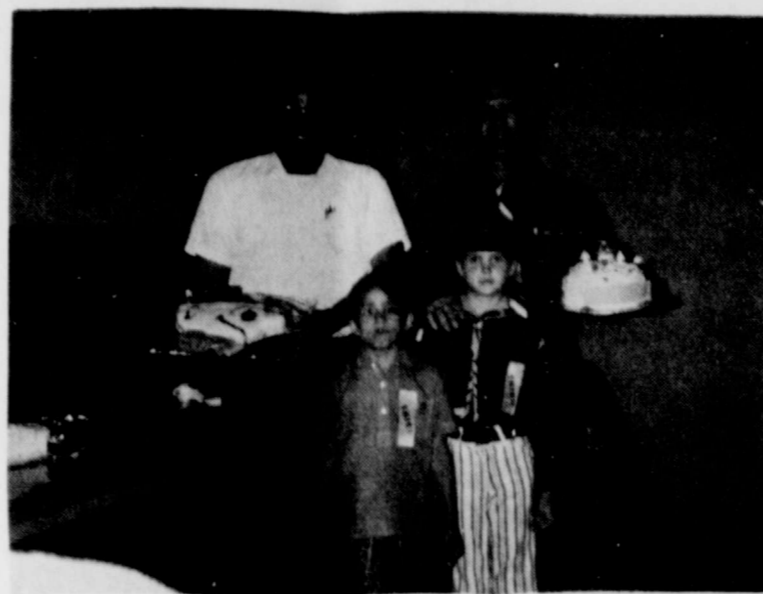
Porterfield said he would hire Dayton Marr, an Abernathy man to fill the position, and Commissioners set his salary at \$392.65 a month.

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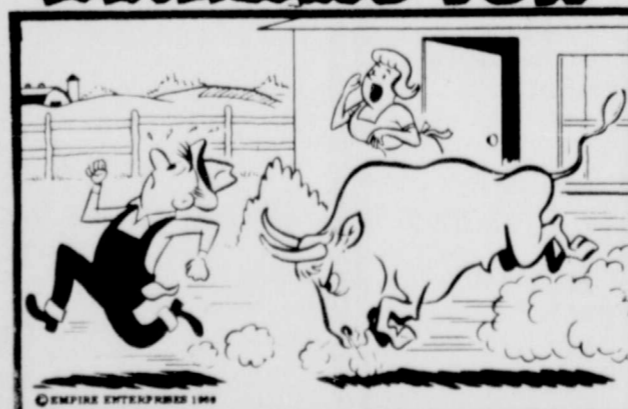
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
