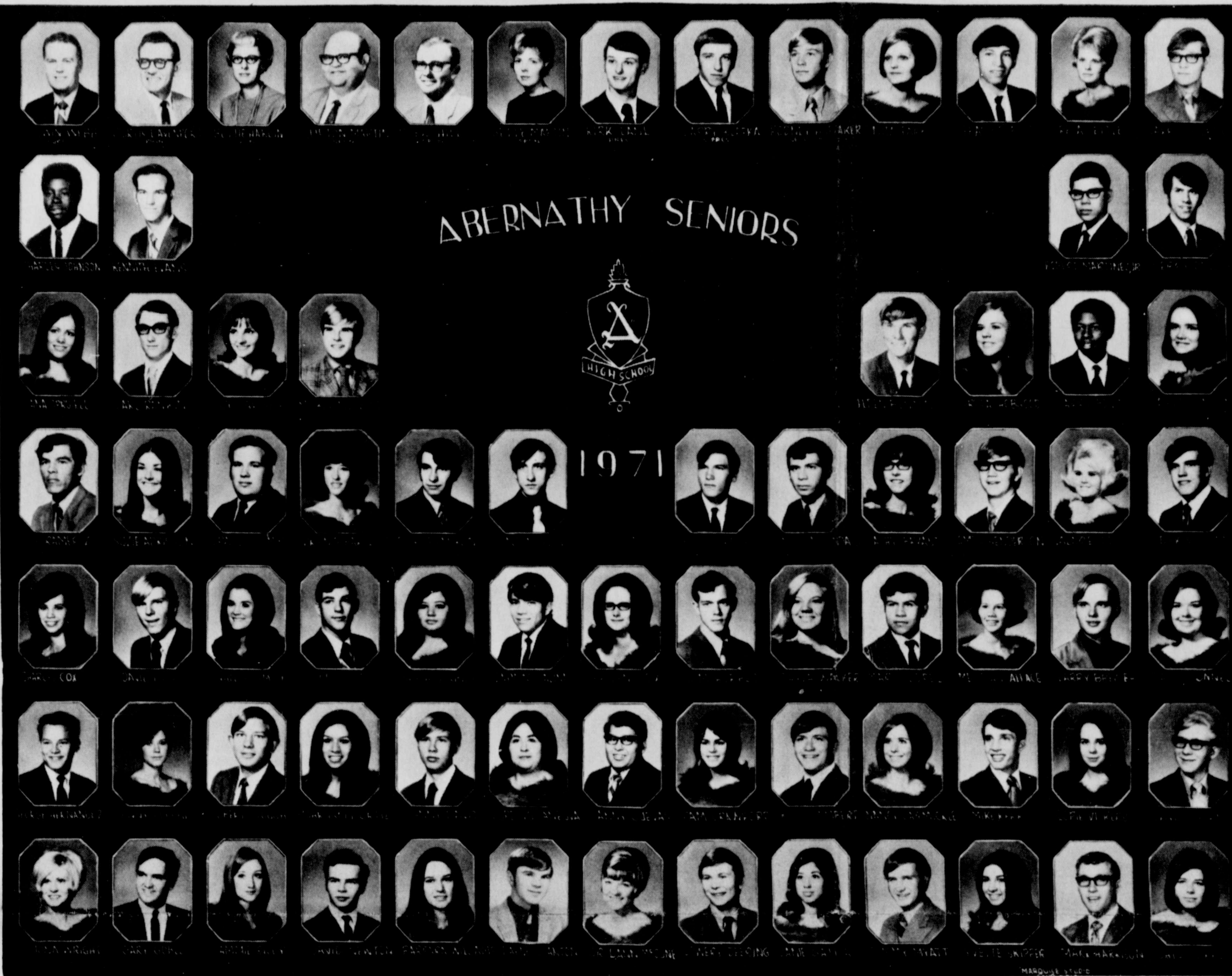

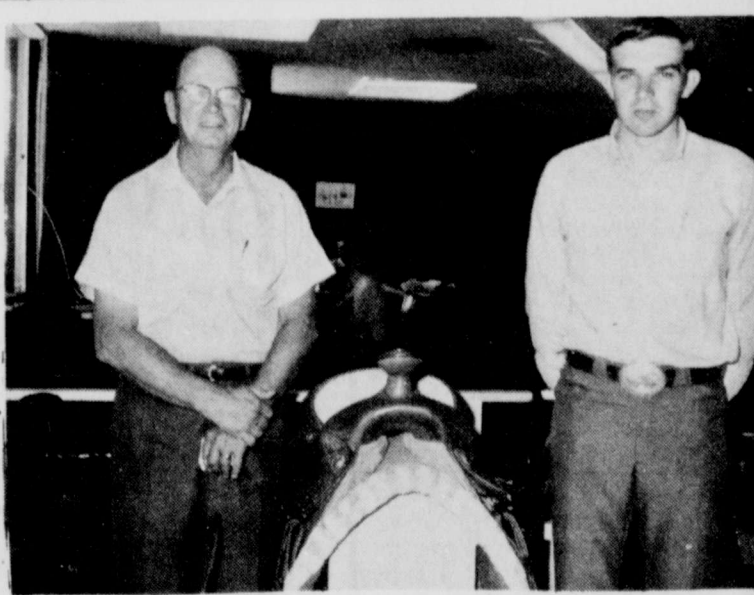

From The Desk of the City Manager

We attended a meeting of Tax Assessors and Collectors in Amarillo last Friday, and like everything else we have witnessed since we arrived here, we were amazed at the warmth, and genuine hospitality exhibited there. This is the only evidence that most of you will see of the meeting; but there are a few people who for some reason have not paid their city taxes, who will be hearing from us in the very near future.

We will be wearing many hats here and one of the most vital and important, in addition to being City Manager, will be Tax Assessor and Collector. It looks to me like you have already received full value for every dollar spent in the past and we will certainly do our best to do as well in the future. Taxes are not the most desirable things in the world but they are not so distasteful if everyone pays their share. You decide, or have decided, what you want in the way of services and improvement. Now it is our job to collect the money to pay for them. Naturally there are extenuating circumstances that may cause some payments to be delayed. But by and large we are from the old school on such things. "If you owe a bill no matter whether it is for groceries or city taxes you should pay it before you buy anything else."

We love everybody and we are going to go the second and third mile with everyone. However this must not be misinterpreted as a sign of weakness. We want to have good public relations and we are going to have them if possible. We are going to make every effort to see that values are equal and equitable. We have a good system of internal control. It is not completely foolproof, mistakes are possible and we will jump through hoops correcting any that are pointed out to us. If they are correct we insist on them being paid. We really excited about the many avenues to serve and learn that are opening for us here in Abernathy. Now if we could

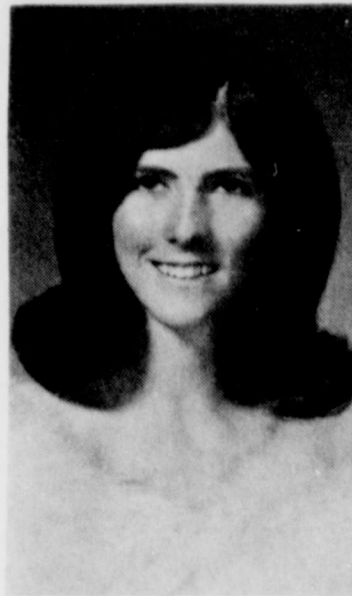

Power Mechanics Program

One of Abernathy School System's newest programs, the Power Mechanics Division of Vocational Agriculture, will soon end its first year of classroom and shop-work.

The program, taught by Speck Cox, has thirteen students. To qualify for the program, the student must be of junior or senior academic level and exhibit an interest in the field of industrial and farm mechanics.

The Power Mechanics Shop, located at the north end of the Antelope Football Stadium, is fully equipped with hand tools and electrical test equipment. There are five separate stations, with complete hand tool sets at each station, plus a tool and supply room for test equipment, valve conditioning equipment, other tools and equipment.

The program is designed to familiarize the student with the theory and practice of the internal combustion engine, through classroom lecture and demonstration, then applying the theory in the shop.

Special emphasis is placed on industrial engines, such as irrigation well engines, and tractor engines. Local farmers and implement dealers supply the program with engines to be reconditioned.

The engines are first thoroughly

cleaned by means of a high pressure washer, then placed at a station where two or three students are responsible for reconditioning and maintenance, under Mr. Cox's supervision.

Pre dis-assembly checks are made, then the engine is disassembled. All necessary measuring and diagnosis are recorded for future reference. All parts are reconditioned, or replaced when necessary.

A typical re-conditioning job would include: thorough cleaning interior and exterior, recondition valves, valve seats, replace rings, main bearings, rod bearings, cam bearings, and seals, plus additional service required.

Actual mechanics classes didn't begin until Jan. 15, due to building preparation, but the class had to process the following: two 230 Chevrolet well engines, two 233 Chevrolet well engines, two 223 Ford well engines, one Chrysler slant six well engine, one International truck, and one Jeep engine.

All parts are to be furnished by the owner, and a small fee is charged to cover supplies expense.

The Power Mechanics curriculum does not "make" a mechanic out of the student; it does strive to prepare the student for employment as a mechanic, and give him the proper background experience.

Mr. Cox stated the program has been a great success, and is looking forward to next year's program.

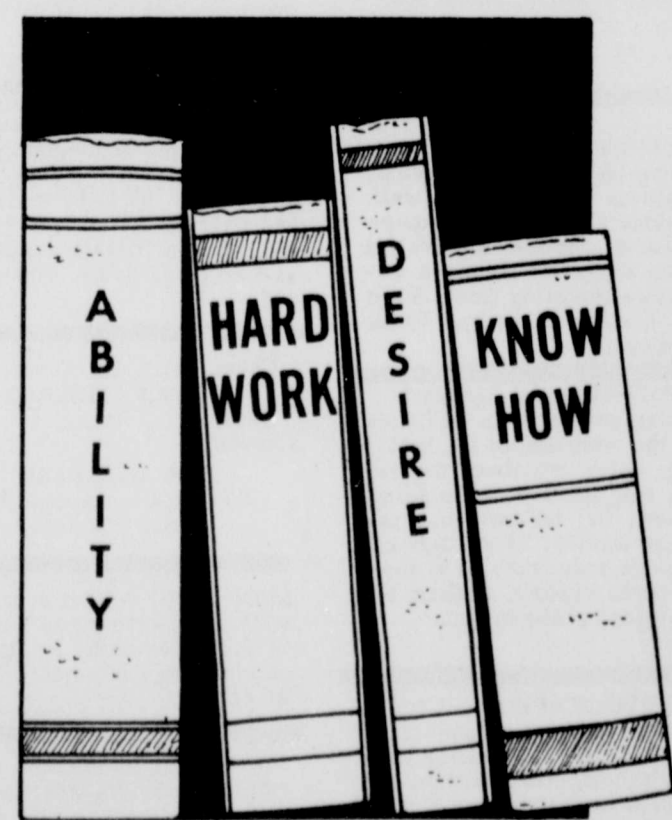

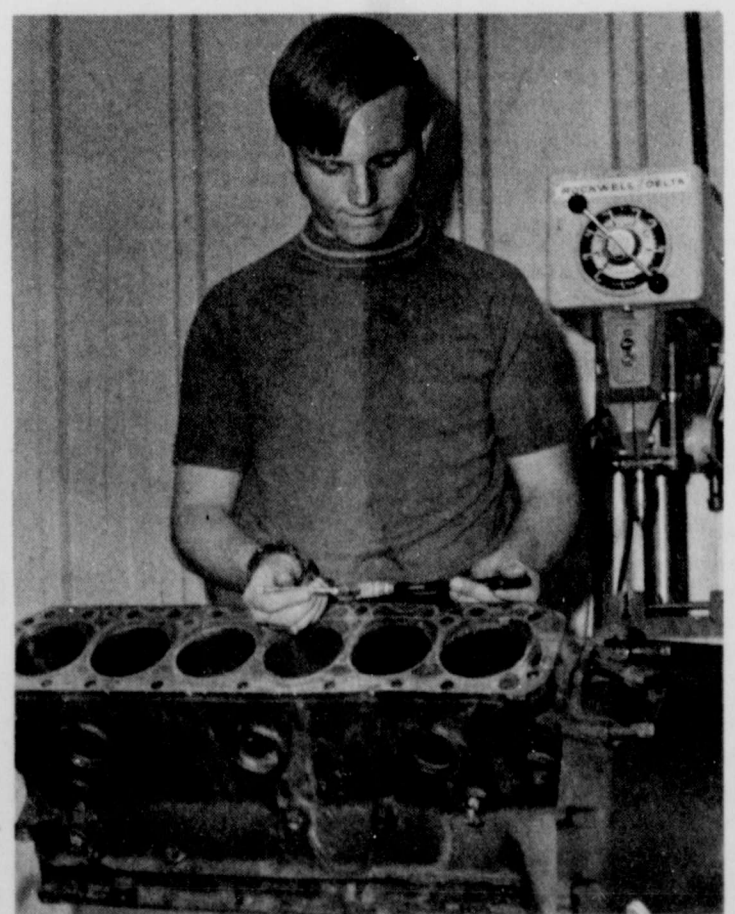
