Vandalism Discussed By Police

VANDALISM:
During the last few months in Abernathy is on the increase. The police department realizes that only a small number of people is responsible. One way to help prevent vandalism and malicious mischief is to prevent loitering. In order to prevent loitering the police department must rely upon state law V.P.C. 482a Section 3 paragraph 4. This law states that no person or persons shall congregate upon a parking lot or loiter upon a parking lot after he has been notified to leave by the owner or his agent. The police department is willing to act as agent for the owners of parking lots. Under this law it is necessary that the police be specifically instructed by the owner to keep his lot clear of loiterers. This is the way the law reads. In other words, unless the loiterers are violating a law at the time, the police dept. must have permission to control the loitering. Anyone who would like to read this may do so at the Police Dept.

If you have a parking lot and you do not wish for people to congregate upon it, please advise the police chief in order that this law can be enforced. Anyone who after having been notified by the owner or his agent to refuse to vacate, is subject to a fine up to \$200.00.

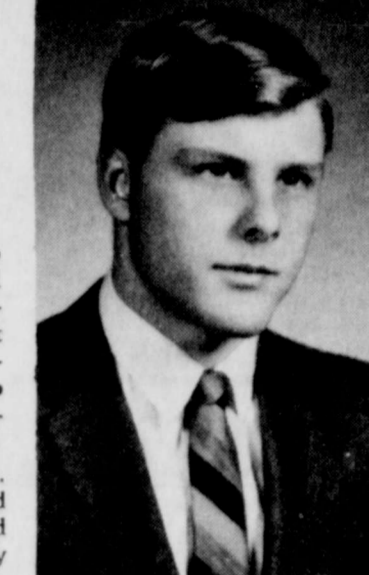

From The Desk of the City Manager

We attended a water utilities school at the University of Texas at Arlington for three days this past week and it was a most enlightening experience. We are a great believer in the theory that most people get hard headed only when they stop putting something in it. So we always try to keep ourselves and our employees as up to date as possible so that we can give our customers the latest and best in services. Our water is the most precious of all our natural resources. Without water there would be no life as we know it. It is our responsibility to provide everyone water which is safe to drink, suitable for all uses and ample for all purposes without interruption. Each of us must watch for and call attention to any condition or impaired condition that might threaten the quality of our water or a condition on which would bring about an interruption of service of any part of our water system. Furthermore, we must render this service as economically as possible without impacting the quality of water or services. We must avoid waste of materials, labor and water. We must seek means of doing a better job at the lowest possible cost. To this end we must attend every school and training course that is feasible to make. We are small and have a limited staff but the name of Marvin Patterson is well known and respected at Texas A & M University and at the State Health Department in Austin. He is well versed in the new methods and devices that are coming into general use. He keeps his operators trained and kept aware of new developments. We are certainly fortunate to have a man of his stature and we feel that this training will make us more appreciative of him and also better able to compliment his service with good management practices.

In many countries, including some of our close neighbors the people shun water because they know their water causes disease. They turn to other beverages—wine, beer, ale, and tea, depending on their likes and the customs of their country. As late as thirty years ago we had 539 deaths in Texas from typhoid alone. Now, mainly because of improvements in our drinking water systems and facilities, typhoid has almost disappeared from our state. The same is true for other diseases that may be transmitted by unsafe water such as Baratythoid, types A and B; Bacillary dysentery; Amoebic dysentery and Cholera. There is available to treat water for individual homes that have their own wells. In our enlightened age no one should drink untreated water. If you have in the past and haven't caught any undetectable bugs, be thankful but do not do it again. If you are doing it now—Stop! Water is wonderful and as we said it is essential to life. Why not drink "safe water" like we enjoy in "Beautiful Abernathy" and assure yourself of at least a chance at a long life.

Heart Attack? Facts Presented Here May Save Your Life

It may occur while you're driving an automobile, eating a meal, mowing the lawn, watching television, sleeping or in countless other situations:

- You feel a prolonged oppressive pain or discomfort in the center of your chest, just behind the breastbone.
- The pain may radiate to a shoulder, arm, neck or jaw.
- The pain or discomfort is often accompanied by sweating.
- Nausea, vomiting and shortness of breath may also occur.
- The symptoms may subside, then return.
- Symptoms vary but there are the usual warning signs of heart attack.

If these things happen to you, you may be suffering a heart attack. And, if this is the case, the next 72 hours may be the most critical in your whole life.

The first four hours are especially perilous. Although your heart may be literally "too good to die," having suffered relatively minor heart muscle damage, the chances of your incurring a severe and ordinarily fatal change in heart rhythm (ventricular fibrillation) are about 25 times as great during the first four hours than during the next 24.

Instant recognition of heart attack symptoms, and immediate medical assistance, may well represent the difference between life and death insofar as you are concerned.

Minutes and seconds count. The first thing for you to remember is minimize physical exertion. Then, immediately, you should call a doctor—or, preferably, have someone do it for you. If for any reason you can't reach him, do not delay but get by the speediest means to the emergency room of the nearest hospital with the hope of getting "wired for sound" at the earliest possible moment. Get there in an ambulance, automobile or taxi. But get there—and fast!

Ideally, within minutes you will be in a coronary care unit with electrodes touching your skin as a part of a complex system which continuously monitors the heart's electrical activity.

If there is any change in heart rhythm or rate above or below a preset range, an alarm will sound and within seconds skilled personnel will act to forestall or correct whatever is wrong—most often an irregularly or rapidly beating heart, shock or total cessation of circulatory functions.

Despite the fact that the first hours are the most critical, one group of researchers found that the average "decision time"—that is, the time intervening between the onset of symptoms and lifting the phone off the cradle—is three or more hours.

On the average, it is believed, about eight hours elapse between the start of

warning signs and one's admission to a hospital emergency room. The decision to seek medical assistance is far too serious to be entrusted to the patient himself. It is a responsibility that must be accepted by the wife, husband, relative, or friend.
