Celebration Draws Crowd Here July 3

The "Spirit of '76" prevailed in Abernathy Saturday, July 3, as the town was engaged in a Independence Day Celebration. Through the efforts of the Lions Club, City Officials and the Chamber of Commerce, the activities were held. Y.F. Snodgrass, President of the C. of C. was enthusiastic after the celebration, "This is a tremendous start toward an annual event. We appreciate the cooperation of all the people, the enthusiasm that was shown, and the way the people responded," he remarked.

A colorful parade, which included a color guard, the Abernathy High School Band, floats with boy and girls scouts aboard, decorated bicycles, Miss Shanna Toler-Car Little Miss and the Lions Club Sweetheart, Yvette Skipper was held. Local and area Riding Clubs also participated.

A flag ceremony by the Boy Scouts followed the parade. Patriotic music echoed through-out the city during the day from a sound truck furnished by Baldrige Bakery of Lubbock.

Next on the agenda was the pie cake auction by the girl scouts. Gerald Amerson and Paul Zuber were the auctioneer's for the event.

Action around the popular "dunking Pond" began after the auction. Local Beauties, athletes, and city officials and civic leaders and whoever else that wished to be targets on the pond. A regular series of splashes, screams, and... only a quarter for three throws, were heard through out the day. The dunking pond was sponsored by the Lions Club.

A bar-b-que lunch was served by the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department from 11:30 a.m. until around 12:45 p.m.

After lunch, portions of 1,500 persons, that attended the days activities, gathered in front of city hall and watched the sky for an airplane that dropped 500 ping-pong balls, numbered for prizes. After the drop, it was discovered that 100 of the balls landed in the backyard of Sammy Hunley's home. Hoppy Toler later said laughingly, "next year we will know to drop only 50 balls at a time."

Not only were the targets on the dunking board getting wet. The Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department staged a game of water polo. The object of the game was to move a large ball suspended on a wire with a fire hose spraying water, to the opponent's side. A group of local high school boys agreed to battle three firemen and the results were wet and wild but funny.

After the water polo, the fire department performed a foaming and hose spraying demonstration, (much to the delight of the younger children).

From fire trucks to horses, the scheduled events continued. The new Riding club arena was the scene for barrel and stake races, sponsored by the Abernathy Riding Club. Winners in the barrel races, Pee Wee division, Rusty Powell, Jr., Julie Wheeler, Intermediate-Gary Goble, and Sr. barrels-Glenda White. In the stake race the winners were, Pee Wee-Rusty Powell, Jr., Vicci Shadden, Intermediate-Gary Goble and in the Sr. division of the stake race, Arlene Shadden was the winner.

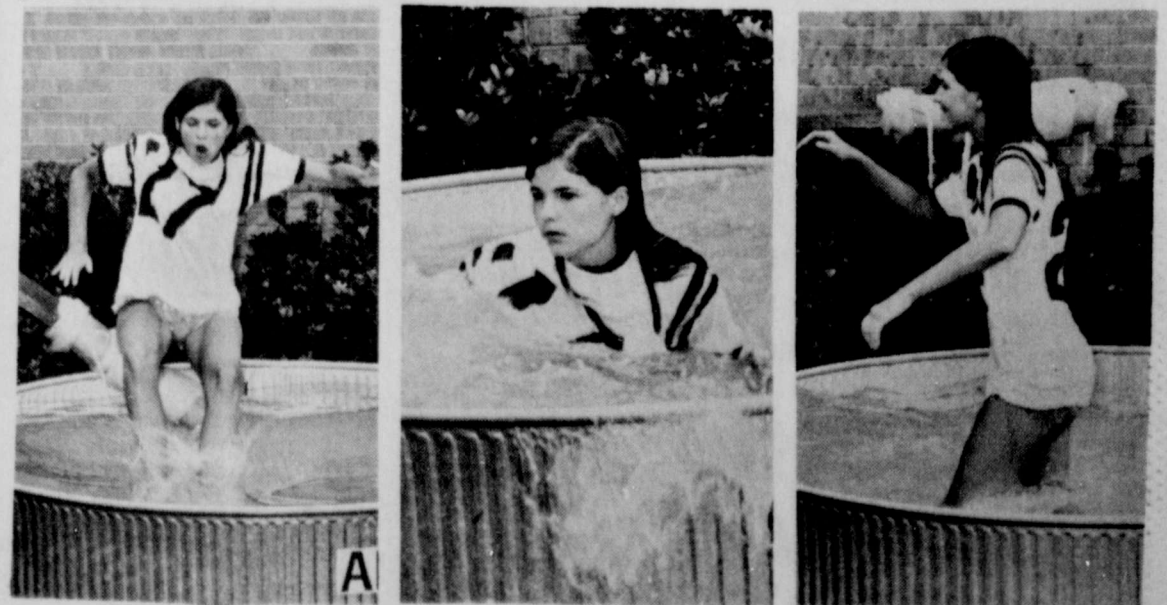

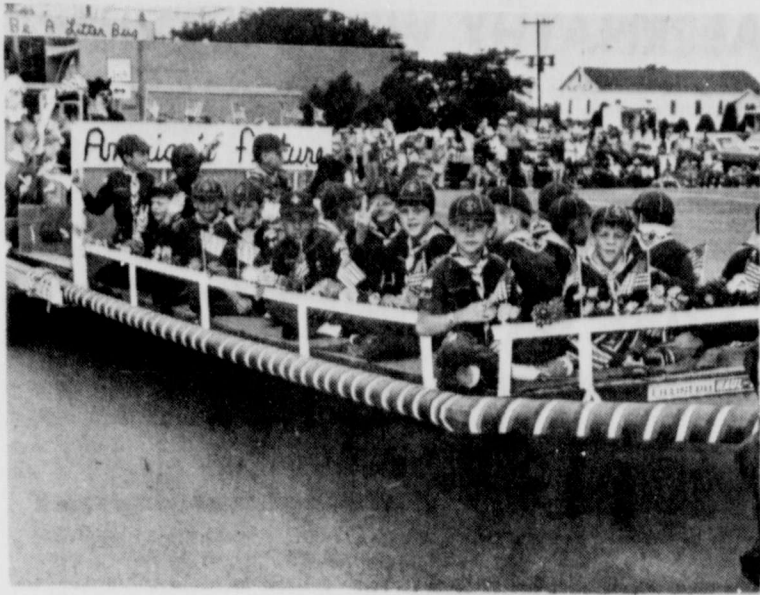

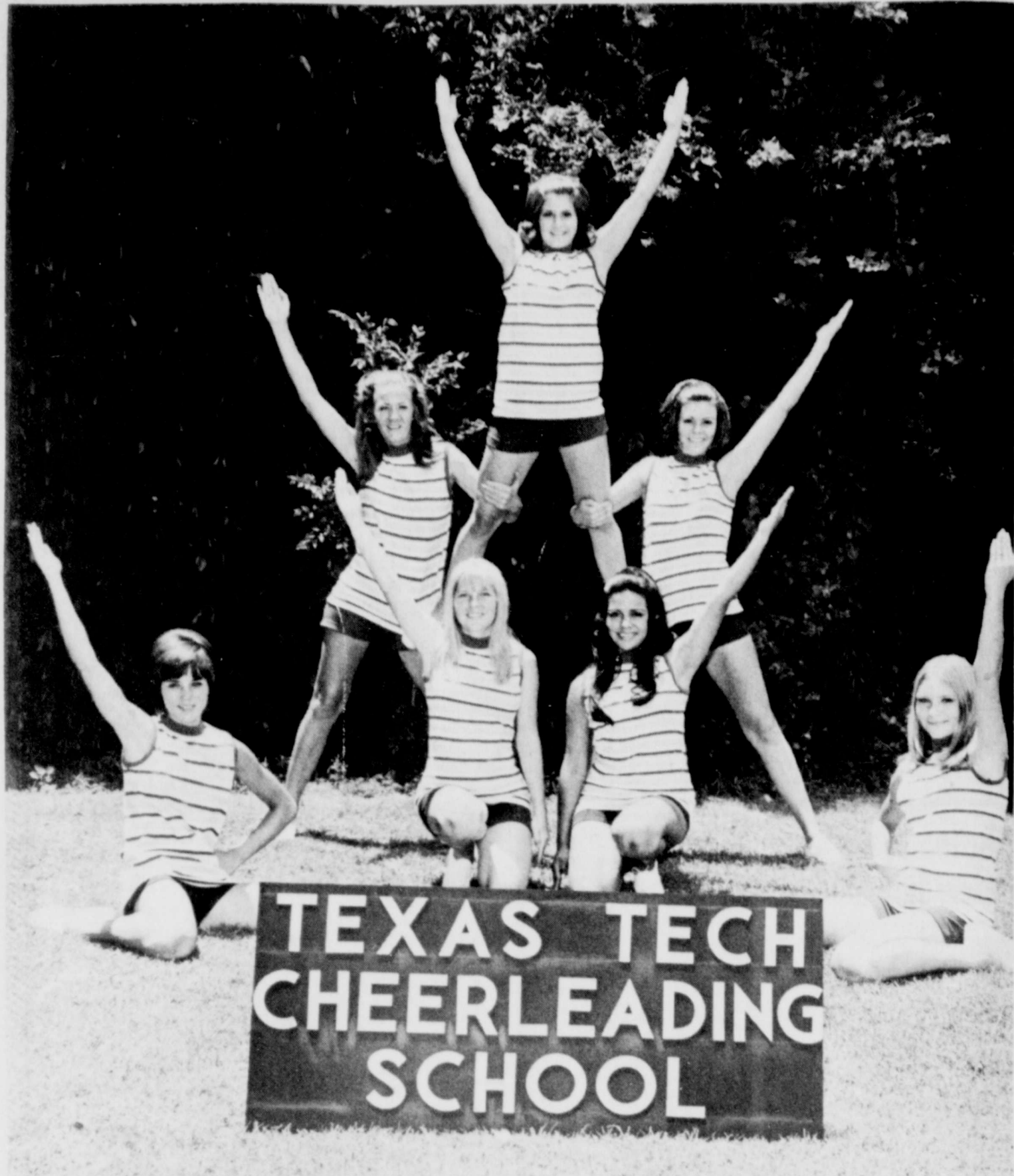
