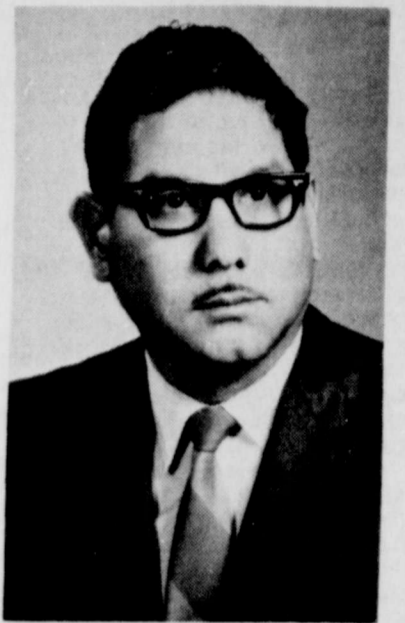

Notice to Parents and Students

Dear Parents or Students:

Texas now has a new law that requires immunizations for all students enrolled in schools and institutions of higher learning, as shown below:

Table with columns: VACCINES, Doses Required, Last Dose, GRADES SIX AND ABOVE, Dose Required, Last Dose. Rows include POLIO (Oral), DIPHTHERIA TETANUS (DTP or Td), MEASLES (Rubeola), RUBELLA (3-day or German Measles), SMALLPOX.

*None required age 13 and above. If the number of doses required have been received, but last dose was before time stated, then an additional dose of POLIO, DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS or SMALLPOX is required.

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered. However, if this is not possible, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the Summer and Fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-1972 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the Summer 1972 Semester, after which validation of new records is required.

A new, standard Certificate of Immunization form is being developed; however, compatible documents will always be acceptable.

If you have any questions, contact your family physician or local health department. We suggest that you take this letter with you if you contact them in person.

Junior leaders, who are senior members of the Halfway 4-H Club were in charge of planning and conducting the two day camp. Rebecca Baumgardner, Council member and chairman of the camp, maintained the camp and kept activities on schedule.

4-H clubs in charge of the activities were as follows: Halfway — skating, swimming, singing, assemblies; Hale Center — crafts; Edmondson — refreshments; Abernathy — planned recreation; Plainview — party and folk games; Prairieview — quiet games; Cotton Center — registration; and Petersburg — vespers.

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The Struves' 5-Month Trip

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve were on a five-month trip late last year and early this year. Their travels took them to the Orient, South Pacific, Australia, New Zealand and other interesting places. The Review requested a series of stories on their trip.)

The commercial tours around Adelaide are very inexpensive but nonetheless interesting. They go up to the high areas to view the city both by day and by night, through the parks and out into the country areas where there are fields of wheat grown on dryland where there are very productive vineyards and wineries. On one of these sidetrips we visited the famed tasting of the wine and was a pleasant experience but we didn't care to make any wine purchase. Two young women from Germany were on this particular tour and we enjoyed the visit with them. It was a little difficult for me to communicate with them in German but I like to make the attempt. The Barossa Valley is largely populated by people of German descent, and seems to be a prosperous place.

Another tour we took out of Adelaide was south to Victor Harbor. This one was made in a dilapidated old bus, which could hardly make it up some of the hills and then on the other side we were literally scared by the breakneck free roll down hill. It was a wild ride, Victor Harbor was supposed to be a resort area

of some special interest but we never found what was good about it. And the flies swarmed on us by the millions. It was one tour that we could have done without.

On Sunday afternoon in Adelaide we were taking a random walk and by chance passed the townhill auditorium as a crowd of people were entering. Upon inquiry we learned that there was to be a musical concert performed by the students of the Adelaide College of Music so we joined the crowd. Some of it was very good. After the concert we took a stroller to the beach. It was so windy and cool that the bathers were not in the water much. There were some fishermen throwing in lines from the pier but weren't catching much. It was a very pretty beach. Later the same day we listened to a Salvation Army Band playing in a park in the city. It was an all brass group and they made the sweetest all brass music I have ever heard, it had been quite a musical day and all for free too.

Minnie's toothache that had given her trouble in Sydney returned and she was forced to visit another dentist in Adelaide the next morning. However, when her anaesthetic wore off her tooth hurt just as much as ever. What should we do? Postpone our tour and see the dentist again or go on as planned and chance seeing another dentist. She decided the latter would suit her better.

The itinerary around the west half of Australia went as follows: Alice Springs, Darwin, Kununura, Derby, Port Hedland, Perth and back to Adelaide. The first leg took us over checker-board farmlands, long

curved mountain ranges (the Flinders Range), arid country with huge dry salt basins, the Simpson Desert with its long ridges of sand dunes and finally to the center of the continent to Alice Springs. The mountain ridges running east west center of the continent to Alice Springs. The mountain ridges running east and west in this area are called the McDougal Range. In this range there is little grass but evidently much more than is immediately apparent for it supports many kangaroo and emu besides the cattle that are produced. Of course it takes many many acres per animal but there is no shortage of acres.

The Todd River basin splits Alice Springs. It rarely has water in it but before we left we saw the Todd flow. There is a saying there that if you ever see the Todd River run you will come back to Alice Springs. In our case its very doubtful that the adage will hold if for no other reason than the billions of flies that are there. You have to constantly fight them off by the use of a small branch of leaves or some other similar means.

At Alice Springs we saw our first aborigines in any quantity. They are quite friendly and give intelligent answers when questioned about anything. When they talk to each other in their own language it sounds very harsh, almost as if they were constantly quarreling with each other. And maybe they are! We surreptitiously photographed them but don't really think they minded having their pictures taken.

The temperature was "only" 100 degrees when we arrived at Alice Springs. This was our introduction to what was to come during the next several days of our journey.

The first order of business in Alice Springs was to find a dentist. She was lucky enough in this small town to get in to see the only dentist in town. Double lucky because he was about to leave the next day or so on an extended "holiday". The term "holiday" in Australia is the equivalent of our word "vacation". He put in a temporary filling in place of the very poor filling that was applied in Sydney. This effectively stopped her toothache and got her by until we got back home.

There are several hills in and around the town that make good lookouts for viewing the area. The Alice Springs Lions Club had built a path to the top of one of them for the convenience of climbers. It was an excellent place to take pictures of the town. Every town and city in Australia and New Zealand has a monument to the war dead. Alice Springs was no exception in this having installed theirs at the top of this particular rise. It is a very effective location for such a memorial. We have found that by such memorials much more than we do in America. Perhaps this shows sacrifices others have made for us.

General Assistance Office Being Closed

Hale County's General Assistance Office will be no more after Aug. 31, according to County Judge Henry Heck.

Heck said the County Commissioners' Court has decided to close the office in the face of rising administrative costs and decreasing services. Emergency assistance needs will be handled through the judge's office after the county welfare unit is shut down. The court had discussed the office during a regular session Monday, then met again Thursday for further study on the 1972 county budget. During the budget study, Heck said, the decision was made to eliminate the assistance program.

The general assistance program originally was set up as an emergency office to pick up where no other agency could act. Both Hale County and the City of Plainview participated in the program until the latter part of 1970 when Plainview city officials decided to drop out of the program. An emergency food program was discontinued in early 1971, with that part of the office's operation being switched to a special program administered by the Central Plains Community Action Program.

At the Monday meeting, the judge said so many programs had been dropped from general assistance that administrative costs of keeping the office open were costing more than services provided.

Most of the money provided by the office in recent months has been for medicine, transportation to medical facilities and other similar services.

Heck said the Community Action food program will expire on April 1, 1972 and so far hasn't been renewed. If the project isn't funded again, he said the county may have to

TAX MAN SAM SEZ---Unfortunately the drought has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drought. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided you invest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Service in exceptional cases. Publication 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drought sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40. Local county agents and Internal Revenue Service offices have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide available for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drought sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in advance.
