Elementary Registration Is Scheduled

Jerry Moorhead, principal of Abernathy Elementary School, announced that students will register for the 1971-72 school year Tuesday, August 24 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. After registering that day, students will be free to leave. The new school term starts Wednesday morning, August 25, at 8:45 o'clock.

Mr. Moorhead gave the following places of registration by grades: First grade students will register in Rooms 21, 23 and 25, in the elementary school building. They must be six years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1971, and must have a certified birth certificate and a smallpox vaccination certificate to register. Second grade students will register in Rooms 16 and 17.

Third graders will register in Rooms 10 and 11. Fourth grade registration will be in Rooms 5 and 6. Those in the fifth grade will register in Rooms 1 and 2. Special Education registration will be in Room 15.

City Council Has Meeting

The August meeting of the City Council was action filled and saw several important features become a reality or pushed toward completion. Heading the list was an ordinance (which will be published in the Review,) defining and regulating itinerant merchants, peddlers, and persons taking orders for wares, merchandise, services, magazine subscriptions, etc. It has been felt for some time that the City should provide better protection for the tax paying local merchants and local citizen groups who are here year around to provide services and support all local activities.

An ordinance on junk cars or abandoned vehicles was delayed until the September meeting since a new State law regulating these same situations goes into effect August 30th. It was felt that the local rules should correspond with this new law.

Bids for the Oil Lease on the airport section, were opened. Amoco Production Co. were the high bidders at \$10.10 per acre bonus plus \$1.00 per acre per year for five years. All income from the airport property must be spent on the facility. Several projects are under consideration including lights for the runway.

The firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss were employed to make the Annual audit this year. This is the same firm that has made the report for the past several years. Mr. Jack Moss, a member of the firm, is well known in the Abernathy area and handles the City work.

Mr. Oscar Crain, the District Engineer for the Texas Highway Department, has assured the City Manager that the "Blind" stop sign at the corner of Avenue D and Farm 00 Market Road 597 adjacent to Thompson Equipment Co. will be improved so that drivers unfamiliar with the situation will be able to stop. It is believed this will do a great deal to cut down on accidents at this corner.

Council members, and the Mayor were given copies of the budget for the year starting October, 1971 and ending September 30, 1972. The City Budget will be in the vicinity of \$300,000.00. This is an increase of about 6% over the current budget. Anticipated revenues are also up so tax rates and other charges are expected to remain, basically the same. Income from the City Sales tax has made many improvements for the present and future possible. The Budget will be set at the September meeting.

The Fire Insurance Key rate for the city were discussed in detail. Most items that could lower the rate are not feasible or economically possible. Some were thought to have merit and will be investigated further.

A request for City Water to serve several rural homes north of town was discussed at great length with the final decision being delayed until September meeting. Everyone was sympathetic toward the people in need for water but they were also keenly aware that the taxpayers inside the City Limits built the Waterplant, lines and tower and of necessity must be their prime concern. The line would also serve the Cities sewage disposal plant.

Meeting of School Board is Held

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on August 9, 1971, in the board room of the high school.

In official action, the board amended the 1970-71 budget and conducted a public hearing for the 1971-72 budget. After the hearing, a tax rate of \$2.08 per \$100 evaluation was set for the coming year. This is a reduction of 2¢ per \$100 evaluation over the previous year.

In other routine reports, the board approved the bills for the month and heard a tax report which revealed that 98.38 % of the taxes for 1971 had been collected. Discussed at length was Federal Court Action #5281 concerning desegregation of Texas Public Schools. Also discussed was Senate Bill 74 of the 62nd legislature concerning policies specifying the duties of professional personnel.

In other action, the board approved a new school lunch program with guide lines as set forth by the United States Department of Agriculture. The gasoline bid was awarded to Consumer Fuel Association for the 1971-72 school year and the milk bid to Borden for the same period.

The student insurance program for 1971-72 was awarded to the Heritage Insurance Company of San Antonio, Texas. Forms will be given to each child upon registration to be completed by the parents if they desire school insurance.

Resignations were accepted from Ann Hedges and Jane Thomas. New teachers employed in the meeting were Cathy Adkins, second grade, Kathy Terrazas, high school English, and Jay Wilson, basketball coach. This completes the staff for the 1971-72 school year.

The next regular session of the board meeting will be September 6 at 8:00 p.m. Those in attendance for this meeting were L.J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice-president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; Lon Carmickle, David Pinson, Joe Oswalt, Bob Riley, Others in attendance were Earl Carter, business manager, and Delwin Webb, superintendent.

Southwestern Public Service Celebrates 'Golden Year'

How does a company decide when it is going to celebrate its 50th anniversary year?

In the case of Southwestern Public Service Company, the decision was made late last year by the simple expedient of impressing the corporate seal on a piece of plain white paper.

When the resulting impression read, "Incorporated, 1921", 1971 became the electric company's golden anniversary year.

Up until that decision-making moment, five different years could make some kind of a case for being the birth year, with one of them going all the way back to 1894. The others were 1904, 1925 and 1942, and the winner, 1921.

1921 won the battle because, in addition to being the year that came up on the seal, it was also the year of organization of the company which, four years later, took on the name of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The 1921 company which became today's Southwestern, was the Roswell Public Service Company. Among its incorporators was H. Dow, well-known New Mexico pioneer and a director and general counsel for Southwestern Public Service Company until his death in 1969.

The name change to Southwestern Public Service Company came in 1925, which was also the year that expansion began with the purchase of electric systems in Artesia and Carlsbad.

1925 was also the year the company first began operations in Texas, with the purchase of the electric systems in Amarillo, Pampa and Panhandle.

The 1920's are the most interesting years in the electrical development of this region.

The region was then, basically, a cluster of small towns, each of which had its own inadequate, and usually antiquated, electric supply.

There were few, if any interconnections, with other communities or electric systems. Most of the towns were only large enough to be served by a single circuit, and if something happened the whole town was out of power until it was repaired.

This was an era which also brought some communities electric service for the first time. In late 1926, for example, Southwestern built a transmission line from Amarillo to Pampa and brought electric service to White Deer, for the first time - on Christmas Eve.

There was still considerable fragmentation insofar as electric service was concerned and parts of seven companies, each of them a subsidiary of at least one holding company - were serving throughout the area.

It was apparent, then, that the electric service needs of the area could be met even more efficiently and economically if it were served by a single, independent, operating company, devoid of holding company ties, locally managed and immediately responsive to area needs.

In short, the region, which had fairly common agricultural and business bonds, lent itself to integration, in the electrical sense of that word.

The Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1935 and co-operation between government and business made this integration possible.

The holding company subsidiaries which had been serving the region were merged into a single entity, Southwestern Public Service Company, an independent, integrated operating company. It was the first such company, incidentally, to result from the application of the Holding Company Act.

Thus it was, as the area embarked on the most rapid period of its growth - immediately following World War II, it was served by a single electric supplier prepared to meet the electric service needs that growth brought on.

Southwestern serves a 45,000 square mile area which starts in the southwest corner of Kansas, crosses the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, moves down into the South Plains of the Lone Star state and then moves westward to include the Pecos Valley and Clovis-Portales regions of New Mexico.

There haven't been any power shortages in this area in the past and the folks at Southwestern don't envision any in the future. To make their visions become reality, the company is adding to its investment at an average annual rate of \$20 million. The total investment will pass the 500-million dollar mark in the early 70's. Incidentally, it was 39-million dollars, the total investment, that is, when the company took its present form in 1942.

The ecological and environmental problems that have haunted some utilities have not yet interfered with Southwestern's progress, and, assuming a reasonable approach to the environment and ecology, they shouldn't in the future, either.

Insofar as air pollution is concerned, sulfur dioxide, in particular, the least efficient plant on Southwestern's system is discharging into the atmosphere only one-tenth of the sulfur dioxide that is accepted as o. k.

Southwestern doesn't make much of a contribution to thermal pollution of water, either, inasmuch as it uses cooling towers rather than discharging hot water into rivers or streams. There's one exception to that broad statement at the Carlsbad, N. M., power plant where the condensing water is discharged into the Pecos River, but the temperature increase is within the limits of the state law. The Carlsbad residents who use the beach or fish close to the plant location

seem to feel that the warmer water improves rather than hurts their recreational activities.

At the other plants, with their cooling towers, the discharge that you see in the air on a cold day is nothing more than water vapor, and isn't polluting the air one bit.

Actually, with a tongue-in-cheek approach, you could say that the air which flows over the cooling towers is better because it gets a little moisture added and also gets washed. But, it's not really a large percentage of the atmosphere in the region.

Southwestern is working to retain the fresh water resources of the region, and at two of its power plants, Nichols Station, near Amarillo, and Jones Station, Southeast of Lubbock, uses reclaimed sewage effluent as cooling water. This conservation practice saves 6,000,000 gallons of freshwater a day and that's enough to meet the needs of a city in the 20,000 range population bracket.

The oceans of the world will provide the fuel source for electric generation in the future, if research in which Southwestern is participating comes to fruition.

This would be thermonuclear fusion, the fusion of light atoms into heavier elements, and a child's pail of seawater would provide enough fuel to generate the electricity for the average home for a year.

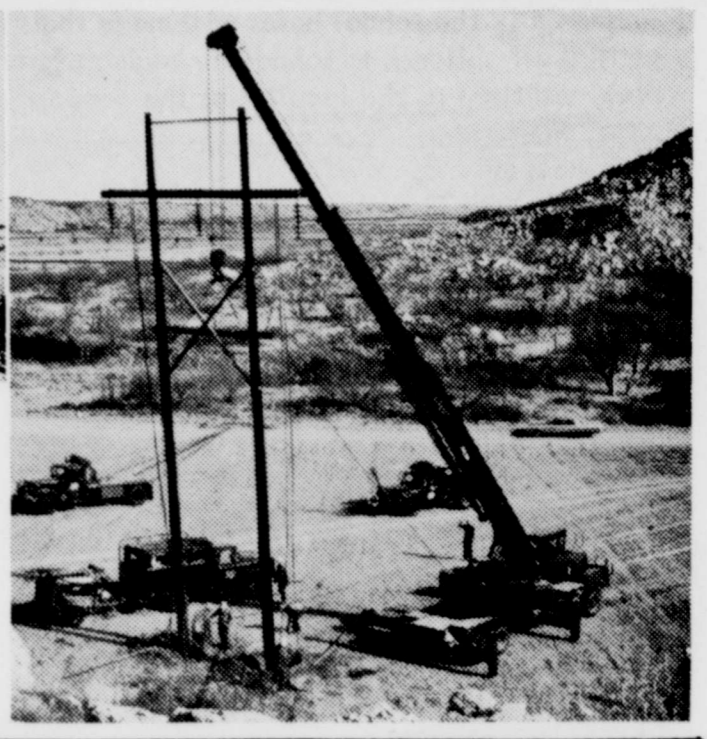
There is, incidentally, more energy available from the hydrogen atoms in 7 1/2 square miles of seawater than from all of the fossil fuel reserves in the world, and that, in itself, makes the research exciting.

But the excitement of thermonuclear research goes far beyond its potential as a source of electric power.

The fusion process for making electricity will require ionized gases at temperatures of millions of degrees. These ionized gases - they're known as plasma - may be used as a fusion torch to vaporize waste materials of all kinds, turning them into electrified particles

The Struves' 5-Month Trip

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve were on a five-month trip late last year and early this year. Their travels took them to the Orient, South Pacific, Australia, New Zealand and other interesting places. The Review requested a series of stories on their trip.

We went south from Darwin down the highway that parallels the railway. In fact its only direction one can go out of Darwin by land. The highway goes all the way to Adelaide but the railway only about a hundred miles or so. About twenty miles out we turned east toward a big river. The approach to the river are low lying and swampy. There were dozens of wild water buffalo grazing this region. The sun was out for the afternoon and so we were able to get good pictures of the wildlife. It took a telescopic lens to bring the water buffalo into picture range. In this general area we passed near a place called Humpty Dog which is associated with a project that Art Linkletter and others promoted to produce rice. It was an economic failure because

se the magpie geese and other birds came in huge swarms and ate nearly all the rice they could produce. The Linkletter group just "walked away and left everything". The Australian government has taken the project over to try to work out something practical. On the road we saw carcasses of two wallabies which were almost certainly killed by automobiles the night before. A wallaby is a small variety of Kangaroo.

We left the highway after about another twenty miles and drove out into the "bush". The Landrover was equipped with four-wheel drive - otherwise it would have been impossible to travel into the wild country. It was very wet and we had to turn back several times in some areas. At first we saw only a few wild animals: spoonbill, plover, magpie geese, wallaby and wallaroo, and we got pretty close to some water buffalo that didn't look too friendly! We saw kookaburra, galahs by the hundreds and in the distance a large of lorakeets. Later in the day when it got cooler we saw more kangaroos as they came out to feed. It was difficult to get close enough they had had plenty of warning that we were coming. But we did capture some of them on film.

In these rough riding circumstances we soon learned to appreciate the humors for their consideration and good humor. We were fortunate to have crossed paths with them.

On the return trip to Darwin we made a short run southward on the main highway to where there were some of the huge anthills close to the road. One of them was about fifteen to twenty feet high. It was about five feet in diameter. The anthills are more like ant-towers. These ants exist in many parts of Australia but only in the hot north do they build such huge towers.

When we got back to the motel I walked the half mile or so downtown Darwin to purchase a newspaper, to get some cookies to have breakfast with the coffee in our room, and to get some exercise after sitting in the Landrover so many hours. Along the way I picked up some fragrant blossoms that had fallen off the trees that were in beautiful full bloom. The fragrance from these blossoms was so rich and sweet that I knew Minnie would like to have some of them.

We went to sleep early in air conditioned comfort there being absolutely no need for our cradle to be rocked! The information we had obtained was that we would have to stay in Darwin two more days

before there would be a flight in the direction we wanted to go but on the chance that we might get out sooner I called the airline and learned that we could leave at 4 p.m. the next day. The Hulmes were leaving the same day we were but were going eastward as we went westward. This gave us several hours to kill in Darwin. We checked out of the motel in the

morning that day and had the pleasure of spending the time waiting for plane time with the Hulmes. By this time we felt we were well acquainted with them. They invited us to come and visit them when we passed through Sydney on our way home. Our stay in Darwin was at an

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Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 177

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING, REGULATING AND LICENSING PEDDLERS AND SOLICITORS, AND REGULATING SALES OF GOODS, WARES AND MERCHANDISE ON PUBLIC STREETS AND SIDEWALKS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY:

SECTION 1: PURPOSE AND CONSTRUCTION OF ORDINANCE. This entire Ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the state and of the city for the public safety, comfort, convenience and protection of the city and the citizens thereof, and all of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this Ordinance, a "peddler" or "solicitor" is any person who goes from house to house or from place to place in the city soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs or negatives.

As used in this Ordinance, the term "Permit Board" shall mean the board created by Section 3.

SECTION 3: ESTABLISHMENT, COMPOSITION AND GENERAL DUTIES OF PERMIT BOARD. There is hereby established the Permit Board of the City of Abernathy. The permit board shall be composed of the City Administrator, who shall be Chairman of the board, the Chief of Police, and the City Secretary. The Permit Board shall perform all duties incumbent upon it under the terms of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: PERMIT REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for any peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity mentioned in Section 2 without having first applied for and obtained a permit so to do from the city.

SECTION 5: APPLICATION - GENERALLY. Any person desiring a permit required by this Ordinance shall make written application therefor to the City Secretary which application shall show the following:

- The full name and post office address of the applicant.
- The state, county, town or city in which the applicant permanently resides.
- The age, height, weight, complexion, color of hair and color of the eyes of the applicant.
- The occupation in which the applicant desires to engage and for which he desires a permit.
- A full and complete description of the goods, wares and merchandise and other articles or tokens which applicant desires to sell, which description shall give in detail the grade and character of the property to be sold. Further description as to grade and quality may be required by the Permit Board.
- Whether the applicant has ever been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude.
- SECTION 6:** APPLICATION - ATTACHMENTS. There shall be attached to each application under this Ordinance the following:
 - Two (2) recent photographic likenesses of the applicant's face, which photographs shall not exceed one inch (1") square in size.
 - A certificate or letter from the president, a vice-president, general manager, sales manager, assistant sales manager or district or area manager of the company for which the applicant works, sells or solicits, stating that the applicant is an employee and/or agent of such company.
 - A reference to a recognized financial rating publication, which reference shall show the page on which the company's or firm's financial standing can be found; or a letter or a certificate from an association or organization which has as its purpose the protection of citizens of the United States against illegal or unsavory business practices stating that the firm or company is a member in good standing of such association or organization.

In the event that the applicant is an individual who is not working, selling or soliciting for any firm or company, letters of recommendation from two (2) citizens of the applicant's permanent residence shall be submitted.

SECTION 7: APPLICATION-CONSIDERATION BY PERMIT BOARD. Upon the filing of an application for a permit under this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the City Secretary to retain the application until time for the Permit Board to consider the same. The Permit Board shall meet each Monday at 9:00 A.M. All applications filed with the City Secretary prior to the preceding Wednesday shall be considered by the Permit Board on the next succeeding Monday. Applications filed between Wednesday morning and Saturday shall be considered by the permit Board on the second Monday after filing.

SECTION 8: FEE. Each applicant for a permit under this Ordinance who resides in the city and furnishes local references shall be charged an investigation fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). Each such applicant who resides outside of the city shall be charged an investigation fee of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00).

SECTION 9: ISSUANCE. If, upon hearing, it shall appear to the Permit Board, or a majority thereof, that the statements contained in an application for a permit under this Ordinance are true, and that the applicant has the right, under the Constitution and laws of this state and under the ordinances of this city, to engage in business, and that the applicant has not been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, the permit board shall issue such permit to the applicant.

SECTION 10: CONTENTS. Each permit issued under this Ordinance shall contain the following:

- The name of the applicant and his address.
- A physical description of the applicant.

LEGAL NOTICE (Continued)

(3) A photographic likeness furnished with the application.

(4) The date the permit was issued.
SECTION 11: TO BE CARRIED ON PERSON. It shall be unlawful for any peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity for which a permit is required by this Ordinance, unless he carries such permit on his person while so engaged.

SECTION 12: DURATION. All permits issued under this Ordinance shall be valid from the date shown thereon for a period of one (1) year, unless sooner revoked as provided in this Ordinance.

SECTION 13: REVOCATION. If, after the permit provided for in this Ordinance has been issued, the Permit Board or other agency or official of the city finds that the permit was obtained by false representation in the application, such permit may be revoked by the Permit Board. Such permit may also be revoked, if it shall appear to the Permit Board that the holder of such permit has violated any ordinance of the city or any law of the state in connection with any soliciting by such holder or in connection with the collection, or attempted collection, of any account due to such permit holder or his employer, or in connection with the repossession or attempted repossession of goods sold by such permit holder or any other person employed by the employer of such permit holder.

SECTION 14: APPEALS FROM DECISIONS OF PERMIT BOARD. If the applicant for a permit under this Ordinance, or the holder of such a permit, is dissatisfied with any holding or finding of the Permit Board, he shall have the right to appeal to the City Council by filing a written notice of such appeal with the Permit Board within ten (10) days from the making and filing of such decision of the Permit Board. Upon the filing of such notice of appeal, the application for the permit and all papers possessed by the Permit Board in connection with such application and such permit shall be delivered to the City Council and such matters as may be in controversy shall be heard by the Council at its next regular meeting after the filing of the notice of appeal. The City Council shall have the same powers and authority at such hearing on such appeal as is vested in the Permit Board by this article.

SECTION 15: EXEMPTIONS FROM ORDINANCE. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the sale or soliciting of orders for the sale of milk, dairy products, bakery products, vegetables, poultry, eggs, or other farm and garden products which have been raised or produced by the vendor; daily deliveries of milk and bakery and other food products; newspaper distribution when headquarters are maintained in the City of Abernathy; sales made to dealers by commercial travelers or sales agents in the usual course of business; or sales made under authority and by order of law.

SECTION 16: UNLAWFUL USE OF STREETS. No peddler nor any other person or corporation or association or organization shall have or maintain structure on any public street or alley in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting, or soliciting orders for any goods, wares or merchandise, or cold drinks, hot drinks or food, nor for the purpose of exhibiting any kind of exhibit.

SECTION 17: UNLAWFUL TO SELL ON SIDEWALKS. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any of the goods or articles mentioned in Section 2 of this Ordinance on the sidewalks of the City of Abernathy unless such goods are offered for sale or sold by a person owning, occupying or controlling the premises adjoining or adjacent to the sidewalk, and then such goods shall be exposed and sold in the usual course of trade in accordance with all ordinances of the City of Abernathy and the statutes of the State of Texas.

SECTION 18: UNLAWFUL PARKING ON STREETS. It shall be unlawful for any person to stop, stand or park any motor vehicle, truck, trailer or vehicle of any kind on any public street or alley in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting or soliciting orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, cold drinks, hot drinks, or food, for a longer period than ten (10) minutes.

SECTION 19: UNLAWFUL PARKING NEAR SCHOOLS. It shall be unlawful for any person to stand, stop or park any motor vehicle, truck, trailer or vehicle of any kind at any place on any public street or alley located within six hundred feet (600') of any public school in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting or soliciting orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, cold drinks, hot drinks, or food.

SECTION 20: BOND. Every applicant for a permit to solicit or take orders for or attempt to take orders for the sale of goods, wares or merchandise or personal property of any nature whatsoever for future delivery or for services to be furnished or performed in the future, not a resident of the City of Abernathy, shall file with the City Secretary a surety bond, running to the City in the amount of \$1,000.00 with surety acceptable to and approved by the City Administrator, conditioned that the said applicant shall comply fully with all the provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Abernathy and the statutes of the State of Texas, regulating and concerning the business of soliciting and guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy that all money paid as a down payment will be accounted for and applied according to the representations of the solicitor and further guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy doing business with said solicitor that the property purchased will be delivered according to the representations of said solicitor. Action on such bond may be brought in the name of the City for the use and benefit of the aggrieved person.

SECTION 21: PENALTY. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), and each and every day this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 22: SEVERANCE CLAUSE. The provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of this Ordinance, but they shall remain in effect, it being the legislative intent that this Ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

SECTION 23: EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its publication as provided by law.

SECTION 24: REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. Ordinance No. 107 and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances of the City of Abernathy inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

(Cont'd from page 3) and, our last experience there being the observation of the activity around the international airport. A Pan-American Clipper landed while we were there on an interim stop between Sydney and Saigon. The passengers who disembarked were mostly American service men on their way back to Vietnam. I circulated through the crowd of fellows on the off chance that there might be somebody in the group whom we knew. Their faces were rather grim as might be expected. Another interesting sight at the airport was a group of native blacks sitting on the floor of the waiting room. There were ample comfortable chairs but the, preferred the hard concrete floor.

Soon we were on board the F28 Friendship enroute to Kununurra about 270 miles to the southwest. Below us was a vast network of watery channels. Huge rivers with thousands of tributaries make up a tremendous flow of water to the north during the wet season. Of course this is in striking contrast to the barren spaces just a few hundred miles to the south. In the wet country the greenness is altogether different from the huge red center.

As we took off in this very fast medium sized jet airplane the stewardesses started serving "tea" at once. By the time we were served we had to eat our cookies and drink our tea rather quickly to be finished by the time we got to Kununurra.

Our purpose in stopping at Kununurra was to see the irrigation project that is in operation there as well as the development of a much larger "scheme" that is being built for use of the Ord River. They use the word "scheme" in the same way that we use the word project and it does not have the somewhat bad connotation that it has with us.

The Kununurra area is very dry and hot in contrast to the country we had just left. I would emphasize the description not. We called a taxi from the airport at Kununurra and again we were fortunate in having a driver who was ready and willing to show us the country. He first got us located in the only motel there. There is also a hotel there but we have learned to by-pass these "hotel" wherever possible because in Australia the pubs (bars) are invariably connected with the hotels. The peculiar laws in Australia governing the operation of public drinking places, give an advantage to hotel bars as to permitted hours of operation and as a consequence most saloons are run in conjunction with a hotel. Sometimes, even the hotel will have enough rooms to qualify as a hotel but will not actually rent rooms, actually operating the business strictly as a bar.

Airconditioning was an absolute necessity. Evaporative cooling would work wonderfully but doesn't seem to be as common there as here.

The taxi driver and I had come to an agreement about the cost of his driving us to see the points of interest in the Kununurra area. We were to go out that same afternoon to see the irrigation project that was in operation. After we had had a chance to cool off and rest a bit the taxi man came to pick us up. He was entrepreneur of several business ventures. His wife ran a little general store which we looked through while we waited for him to get some odds and ends done. The store had a small stock of groceries that obviously hadn't turned in some time.
