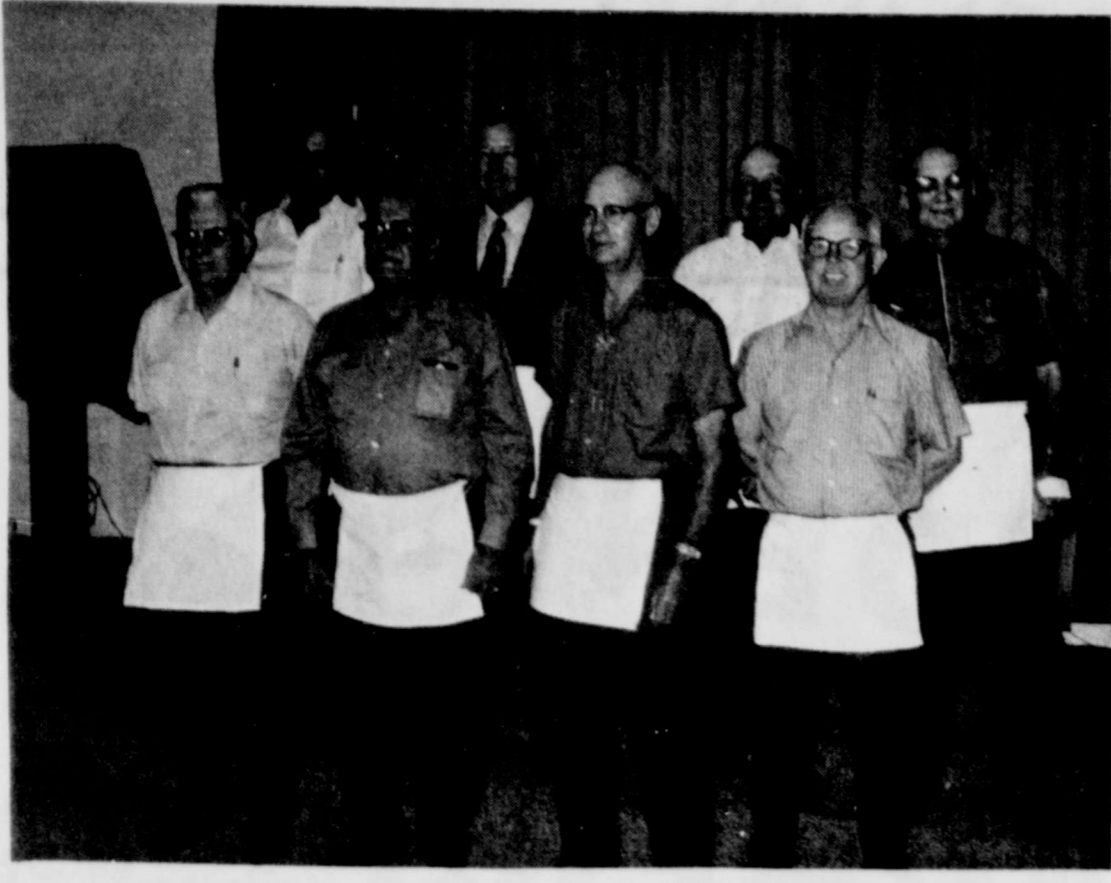

From The Desk of the City Manager

Last week we were concerned about the mud in the alleys. The rains are still falling but there is no way to get a guy who went through the "Dust Bowl" days and has been a little dry ever since to complain about the excess water. There are some folks in the City though who are understandably concerned. Those who live in unpaved streets are about to get muddied in again until it dries up a bit.

The sad part of their plight is that in most cases there is nothing we can do to permanently help their situation. All the paving that we have designed with the thought in mind that all streets would be paved. All drainage plans were designed to carry the water in a curb and gutter system. This means that the unpaved streets that have paving on two or more sides of them have no place and no way to dump the water that falls on them. It is just dammed in and is going to stay that way as long as they are unpaved.

We can grade out the deep ruts that develop and this we do as time permits. Unfortunately we have just enough men to operate on a normal type situation. This means that during inclement weather we get behind in the sanitation department, so the first thing we must do when it clears up is get that little chore caught up. Our fine Hale County Commissioner Mr. Jack Eason and his good men are able to get on the dirt roads around the City as soon as it gets dry enough. This is great and wonderful and much appreciated since they do all of theirs and even a little of ours. Sometimes our folks have a hard time understanding why they can get to their two or three days before we do the City Streets.

As we explained above our men have to wear several hats and the sanitation department must come first so if it gets dry enough on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday when regular sanitation pickups are made then we must wait on the streets. All in all though we trust that we are able to keep things under control as much as possible and keep everyone out of the mud when ever we can.

The only possible solution to most of the muddy streets is to get curb and gutter and paving installed. No we are quick to admit that this is easy to say and hard for many to pay. For some it is just not possible. We have asked the Mayor and City Council to Budget money to pay the City Portion of the paving cost and we feel sure it will be approved. Paving projects are just not something you decide to do on the spur of the moment. So it will not be practical to attempt any at this late date in this year.

We will be back on this subject early next spring. We will be doing all possible to get interested parties to get petitions signed and to the City Council so we can get these projects set up and completed early next summer. If anyone has questions as to procedure approximate costs, time schedules, etc. please feel free to come by our office and we will give you full details first hand. One thing sure and for certain; any money spent for paving is a good investment. There is almost no way it can fall to increase the value of the property more than the cost of the paving.

In the mean time we realize more than anyone that you are still in the mud. We know you need relief. We are going to do what ever we can on a temporary basis to ease the problem. But anything we do will be a delaying action at best and will be totally lost the next time it rains which we hope is often. So of necessity the unpaved streets are going to be near impassable many times. Our only reason for existing is to serve the public. But we must give all the public certain basic services first such as water, sewer and sanitation. After that comes streets, airports, alleys, mowing, insect control and other duties.

Nystel was born and reared in Lubbock and was a graduate of Texas Tech. He moved to Dallas about eight years ago.

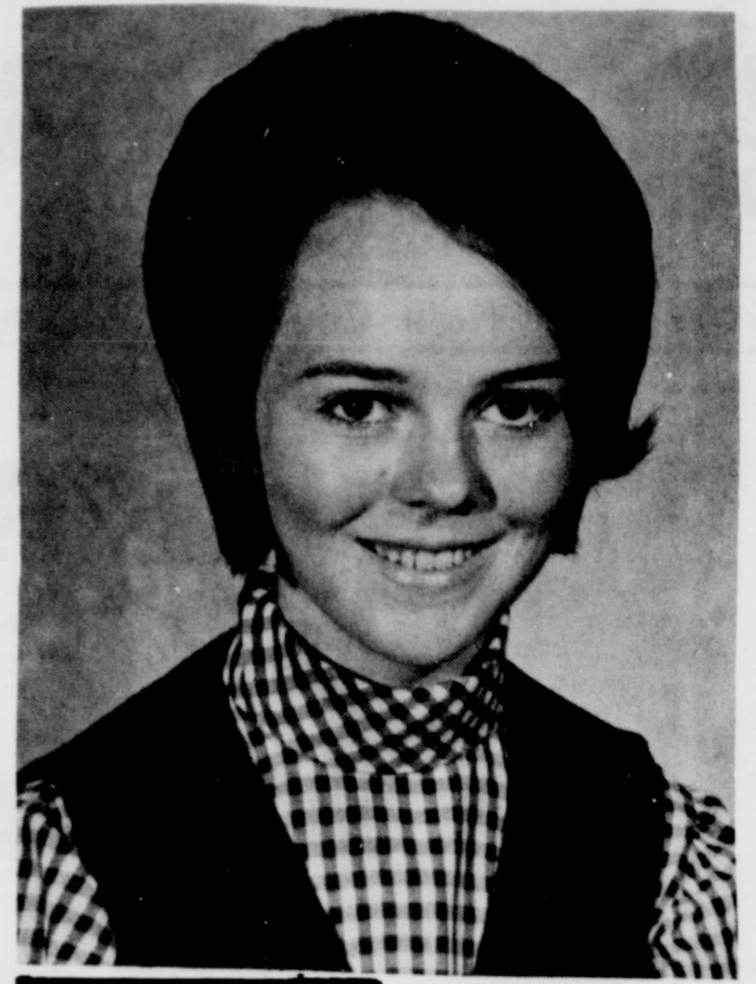
