



TOUR THURSDAY A number of local tarmers

and business men made a field trip by chartered TNM&O bus Thursday. The project was sp-onsored by Abernathy Chamber of Commerce, with Leland Phillips, agriculture chairman. and Y.F. Snodgrass, president

in charge. First stop was at Missouri Beef Packers plant north of Plainview, where the group was escorted on a complete tour of the huge facility. Next stop was at a sorghum field on Highway 70 west of Plainview, where Ollie Liner, Hale County Agriculture Agent, and Snodgrass described certain tests being made. Liner described truck farming and vegetable packing process in the Mayfield area. Grover Phillips, manager, escorted the group on a tour of cattle feedlots and facilities at the PGC's Mayfield Cattle Feeding complex. Of interest to the group was the automated, computerized feed-micing mill that turns out special rations for the cattle being fed there. Grover Phillips is a nephew of Leland Phillips. Last stop was the grape experiment project on Abernathy's Municir 1 Airport section. The Extension Service men in charge of the project described the operation and aims of the experiment to the group and showed the various varities of grapes in the experimental vineyard. This project is sponsored by Abernathy Chamber of Commerce. A sampling of the grapes may be sold here later, and cuttings for local residents to buy and set out at their homes may be available here nest spring. The group had lunch at the Congress Inn in Plainview, and Mrs. Leland Phillips and Mrs. A.C. Harris Jr., served refreshments to the group at the Co-op Gin office here before the tour started and after it was completed.





ORDINANCE NO. 177

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING, REGULATING AND LICENSING PEDDLERS AND SOLICITORS, AND REGULATING SALES OF GOODS, WARES AND MERCHANDISE ON PUBLIC STREETS AND SIDEWALKS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY:

PURPOSE AND CONSTRUCTION OF ORDINANCE. This SECTION 1: entire Ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the state and of the city for the public safety, comfort, convenience and protection of the city and the citizens thereof, and all of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this Ordinance, a "peddler" or "solicitor" is any person who goes from house to house or from place to place in the city soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs or magazines.

As used in this Ordinance, the term "Permit Board" shall mean the board created by Section 3.

SECTION 3: ESTABLISHMENT, COMPOSITION AND GENERAL DUTIES OF PERMIT BOARD. There is hereby established the Permit Board of the city, the official name of which shall be "The Permit Board of the City of Abernathy". The permit board shall be composed of the City Administrator, who shall be Chairman of the board, the Chief of Police, and the City Secretary. The Permit Board shall perform all duties incumbent upon it under the terms of this Ordinance.

PERMIT REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for any SECTION 4: peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity mentioned in Section 2 without having first applied for and obtained a permit so to do from the city.

SECTION 5: APPLICATION - GENERALLY. Any person desiring a permit required by this Ordinance shall make written application therefor to the City Secretary which application shall show the following

[1] The full name and post office address of the applicant.

[2] The state, county, town or city in which the applicant permanently resides.

[3] The age, height, weight, complexion, color of hair and color of the eyes of the applicant

[4] The occupation in which the applicant desires to engage and for which he desires a permit.

[5] A full and complete description of the goods, wares and merchan dise or other articles or tokens which applicant desires to sell, which description shall give in detail the grade and character of the property to be sold. Further description as to grade and quality may be required by the Permit Board.

### LEGAL NOTICE (Continued)

[3] A photographic likeness furnished with the application.

[4] The date the permit was issued.

SECTION 11: TO BE CARRIED ON PERSON. It shall be unlawful for

any peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity for which a permit is required by this Ordinance, unless he carries such permit on his person while so engaged

DURATION. All permits issued under this Ordinance SECTION 12: shall be valid from the date shown thereon for a period of one (1)

year, unless sooner revoked as provided in this Ordinance.

REVOCATION. If, after the permit provided for SECTION 13: in this Ordinance has been issued, the Permit Board or other agency or official of the city finds that the permit was obtained by false representation in the application, such permit may be revoked by the Permit Board. Such permit may also be revoked, if it shall appear to the Permit Board that the holder of such permit has violated any ordinance of the city or any law of the state in connection with any soliciting by such holder or in connection with the collection, or attempted collection, of any account due to such permit holder or his employer, or in connection with the repossession or attempted repossession of goods sold by such permit holder or any other person employed by the employer of such permit holder.

APPEALS FROM DECISIONS OF PERMIT BOARD. If the SECTION 14:

applicant for a permit under this Ordinance, or the holder of such a permit, is dissatisfied with any holding or finding of the Permit Board, he shall have the right to appeal to the City Council by filing a written notice of such appeal with the Permit Board within ten (10) days from the making and filing of such decision of the Permit Board! Upon the filing of such notice of appeal, the application for the permit and all papers possessed by the Permit Board in connection with such application and such permit shall be delivered to the City Council and such matters as may be in controversy shall be heard by the Council at its next regular meeting after the filing of the notice of appeal. The City Council shall have the same powers and authority at such hearing on such appeal as is vested in the Permit Board by this article.

EXEMPTIONS FROM ORDINANCE. The provisions of this SECTION 15: Ordinance shall not apply to the sale or soliciting of orders for the sale of milk, dairy products, bakery products, vegetables, poultry, ed by her mother Mrs. G.W.Steggs, or other farm and garden products which have been raised or produced by the vendor; daily deliveries of milk and bakery and other food products; newspaper distribution when headquarters are - maintained in the City of Abernathy; sales made to dealers by rcial travelers or sales agents in the usual course of business;

or sales made under authority and by order of law UNLAWFUL USE OF STREETS. No peddler nor any SECTION 16: other person or corporation or association or organization shall have or maintain structure on any public street or alley in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting, or soliciting orders for any goods, wares or merchandise, or cold drinks, hot drinks or food, nor for the purpose of exhibiting any kind of exhibit. UNLAWFUL TO SELL ON SIDEWALKS. It shall SECTION 17:

be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any of the goods or articles mentioned in Section 2 of this Ordinance on the sidewalks of the City of Abernathy unless such goods

SECTION 6: APPLICATION - ATTACHMENTS. There shall be attached to each application under this Ordinance the following:

 Two (2) recent photographic likenesses of the applicant's face, which photographs shall not exceed one inch (1") square in size

[2] A certificate or letter from the president, a vice-president, general manager, sales manager, assistant sales manager or district or area manager of the company for which the applicant works, sells or solicits, stating that the applicant is an employee and/or agent of such company

[3] A reference to a recognized financial rating publication, which reference shall show the page on which the company's or firm's financial standing can be found; or a letter or a certificate from an association or organization which has as its purpose the protection of citizens of the United States against illegal or unsavory business practices stating that the firm or company is a member in good standing of such association or organization

In the event that the applicant is an individual who is not working, selling or soliciting for any firm or company, letters of reconviendation from two (2) citizens of the applicant's permanent residence shall be submitted.

APPLICATION-CONSIDERATION BY PERMIT BOARD. Upon SECTION 7: the filing of an application for a permit under this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the City Secretary to retain the application until time for the Permit Board to consider the same. The Permit Board shall meet each Monday at 9:00 A.M. All applications filed with the City Secretary prior to the preceding Wednesday shall be considered by the Permit Board on the next succeeding Monday. Applications filed between Wednesday morning and Saturday shall be considered by the permit Board on the second Monday after filing.

FEE. Each applicant for a permit under this Ordinance SECTION 8: who resides in the city and furnishes local references shall be charged an investigation fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). Each such applicant who resides outside of the city shall be charged an investigation fee of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00)

ISSUANCE. If, upon hearing, it shall appear to SECTION 9: the Permit Board, or a majority thereof, that the statements contained in an application for a permit under this Ordinance are true, and that the applicant has the right, under the Constitution and laws of this state and under the ordinances of this city, to engage in business, and that the applicant has not been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, the permit board shall issue such permit to the applicant

SECTION 10: CONTENTS. Each permit issued under this Ordinance shall contain the following

SECTION 19: UNLAWFUL PARKING NEAR SCHOOLS. It shall be unlawful for any person to stand, stop or park any motor vehicle, truck, trailer or vehicle of any kind at any place on any public street or alley located within six hundred feet (600') of any public school in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting or soliciting orders for any goods, wares, merchandise,

cold drinks, hot drinks, or food. SECTION 20: BOND. Every applicant for a permit to solicit or take orders for or attempt to take orders for the sale of goods, wares or merchandise or personal property of any nature whatsoever for future delivery or for services to be furnished or performed in the future, not a resident of the City of Abernathy, shall file with the City Secretary a surety bond, running to the City in the amount of \$1,000.00 with surety acceptable to and approved by the City Administrator, conditioned that the said applicant shall comply fully with all the provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Abernathy and the statutes of the State of Texas, regulating and concerning the business of soliciting and guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy that all money paid as a down payment will be accounted for and applied according to the representations of the solicitor and further guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy doing business with said solicitor that the property purchased will be delivered according to the representations of said solicitor. Action on such bond may be brought in the name of the City for the use and benefit of the aggrieved person SECTION 21: PENALTY. Any person violating any of the provisions The second most

of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars ( \$200.00), and each and every day this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense. SEVERANCE CLAUSE. The provisions of this Ordinance SECTION 22: are declared to be severable and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid
