Mrs. Sandra McCFerrin of Levelland, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Fortenberry of New Deal, returned August 13 following a ten-week study tour of Austria and Germany. She participated in an Institute sponsored by the University of Northern Iowa along with twenty German teachers from throughout the United States. The purpose of the program was to assist the teachers in improving their teaching techniques by exposing them to the everyday use of the German language and culture of the countries. The group spoke the native language throughout their stay. This opened many doors and tended ready acceptance.

Four weeks were spent in study at Pädagogische Akademie in Klagenfurt, Austria. The group lived in Austrian homes with Mrs. McCFerrin staying with the Manfred Reitter family. A reception in the home of the United States Ambassador to Austria, John Hulm, honored the group. There was also a meeting with the mayor of Klagenfurt. On the July 4 weekend Sandra was able to make a side trip to Venice, Italy and into Yugoslavia where she swam in the Adriatic Sea.

Study continued four additional weeks at the University of Vienna with native instructors teaching students from all over the world. While in Vienna the group attended many operas and plays, toured points of interest, and made a boat trip on the Danube River. The trip was climaxed with a two-week tour through Germany. This included Frankfurt, Munich and Berlin. One of the highlights was a boat trip down the Rhine River past the legendary Loreley.

Another unique experience was visit "behind the wall" in Germany. "Actually we made two trips into East Berlin—crossing once on foot and the other time on bus," she said. A marked difference was observed in the attitude of the people as compared to those in West Germany. In East Germany the people shunned the visitors, shrugging their shoulders without comment to questions. Many large, modern buildings with occupants were seen. There was little choice of goods in the shops and those available were of poor quality. Lack of prosperity, neglected farms, armed guards in the depots was noted. The group felt somewhat uneasy when the guards at the Wall spent so much time in examination of their passports. Passing back through West Germany the group enjoyed the friendliness and courtesy of the people.

Sandra, whose husband Jim McCFerrin is a teacher and coach in Levelland, is now a teaching assistant at Texas Tech University where she plans to complete her M.S. degree in German. She previously taught German two years in Plainview High School. She is a graduate of New Deal High School and West Texas State University.

## Football

After two weeks of workouts the Antelope football players were anxious to have a chance to work against someone besides their own teammates and showed their desire in a controlled scrimmage against Ralls last Friday night at Antelope Stadium. With each team running 50 plays on offense, the Lopes varsity came out on the long end of the session, scoring two touchdowns while keeping the visiting Jackrabbits from crossing their goal line.

Showing mid-season form quarterbacks Dave Davenport and Steve Riley completed 9 of 13 passes for 213 yards. Ken Snodgrass was the top receiver with four catches for 75 yards, followed by Bruce Kinast with 2 for 38, Bobby Cuevas with 2 for 42 and Dane Vickers with one for 13 yards.

In the rushing department Bobby Rogers led the carries with 83 yards in 22 carries. Johnny Hemphill picked up 33 yds on 6 carries, Bob Cuevas 44 on 4 carries, Earnest Johnson 29 on 6, and Mike Cuevas with 9 on 2 carries. "Good blocking, fine pass catching, hard running, and pin point passing by the Lopes was pretty evident throughout the scrimmage," head coach Luke Nickerson stated. "I was pleased and proud of our overall effort on offense. Our passing game was as good as you could expect this early in the year all phases (blocking, passing, receiving)," Nickerson added.

Defensive wise the Antelopes came up with several big plays to thwart all Ralls efforts to cross the goal line. Three pass interceptions (2 by Bobby Cuevas, one by Mike Cuevas) and three recovered fumbles kept the Rabbits from mounting any serious scoring threat. First assistant, Max Kennedy, who is in charge of the Antelope defense expressed pleasure with his defensive unit. "Our experienced players played very well, and we were especially pleased with the showing of our younger boys on defense—Dick Rogers, Mike Cuevas, Dane Vickers, Kent Snodgrass and Larry Lutrick," Kennedy said. "Over all the scrimmage showed us the things we can do and the things we need to work on," Nickerson said. The Lopes will host the top rated Mustangs from Denver City next Friday night in another scrimmage and will open the season Petersburg, Sept. 10.

Others who saw action for the varsity in the Ralls scrimmage are Steve Phillips, Jackie McLaugh, Jesse Webb, David Loveiace, Runway Struve, Joe Evans, Manuel Trevino, and Danny Barrera. The Jr. Varsity also came out on top in their scrimmage against Ralls, scoring three tries while holding Ralls scoreless. The J.V. of coach Carl Irbeck scored on a pass from Ray Martin to David McCiendon, a run by Bobby Johnson and a keeper by Martin. The rest of the J.V. includes: Albert Dominique, Artur Beaucour, Darrell Blevins, Eddie Sepeda, Ruben Rodriguez, Mark Hobgood, Mike Odom, Dwight Hardin, L.C. Love, Mike Lambert, Gary Lambert, Donald Bridges and Mike Dunn.

## SMITH ATTENDS PETROLEUM SCHOOL IN K.C.

Joe Dean Smith, of Consumers Fuel, Association, Abernathy, Tex., attended Petroleum 100, Aug. 23-27, at Farmland Industries School in Kansas City, Missouri. Farmland Industries School is the center of training for employees of local cooperatives from throughout Mid-America. Students are selected by local managers and sent to the center, where they are trained to better serve the members of the local cooperatives that own Farmland Industries. The school is a modern facility situated on a 24-acre wooded campus about ten miles north of downtown Kansas City. Forty different subjects are taught at the school, involving nearly 2,000 students per year. Instructors for the classes are specialists in feed, fertilizer, petroleum, farm supplies and other product areas from Farmland's headquarters office in Kansas City.

## From The Desk of the City Manager

We are always rooting for the home team and more especially for the home merchants. They are the ones who get rapped for every good cause that comes along. They are the ones that collect and pay the taxes that make all things possible. They are the ones who make up the Civil Defense units that help protect us during stormy weather. They are the ones that serve on the Church Boards that give our lives spiritual. They are the ones who serve on the School Board that is the hub around which our community revolves. They are the members of the Chamber of Commerce, the Lions Club and all other worthwhile organizations in our City. We look to them for everything from money to service to merchandise. Knowing all this is full well we are making some effort to give them needed protection at the market place.

Our City Ordinance No. 177 that can be found in its entirety in this issue of the Review was designed, written and passed with this in mind. We want everyone who profits by selling their wares or services to help pay the bills. We want them to appreciate the things and people here enough to share in the expense of getting and keeping them. We think the small fee for local residents to sell, what in many cases is the same wares, foods merchandise and services as our established merchants do, is little enough to ask to them.

We will make every effort to make this as painless as possible for Abernathy residents. We are more interested in protecting our good merchants from those groups that swarm down on us for one or two days. Take undue advantage of some folks and then are gone with our money and we never hear from them or our money again. We urge every Citizen who has someone call on them to try to sell them any products or service to ask to see their permit. Look at the picture that will be attached if they are out of towners. Be sure the permit is valid. Call the City Hall immediately if there is the least doubt in your mind about the person or their permit.

We have never seen a regulation that didn't work at least a partial hardship on someone; so we have really tried to make this as fair and equitable as possible. We urge everyone who will be selling door to door to get their permit immediately after September 1st. The permit will be good for one year from the date it is issued. If there is any doubt in your mind as to whether or not you need a permit check with us at City Hall. As you will note in section 15 of the ordinance there are exceptions from the ordinance. If you are clearly in one of these categories then you will not need a permit. But be sure to avoid future problems if you are in doubt.

We trust that everyone will read this important piece of legislation. It is always hard for the Mayor and City Councilmen to pass this sort of regulation because there are bound to be many cases that want to be classified as exemptions. But this is the one sure way to kill any law. Once the gate is opened the floods will surely come and wash away all the good work that has been done. So we will be expecting every one to help us by getting the permit if you are selling and by notifying us if some one is trying to sell to you without one. Let's all pay our fair share and then see to it that others do the same.

# Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 177

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING, REGULATING AND LICENSING PEDDLERS AND SOLICITORS, AND REGULATING SALES OF GOODS, WARES AND MERCHANDISE ON PUBLIC STREETS AND SIDEWALKS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY:

**SECTION 1:** PURPOSE AND CONSTRUCTION OF ORDINANCE. This entire Ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the state and of the city for the public safety, comfort, convenience and protection of the city and the citizens thereof, and all of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

**SECTION 2:** DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this Ordinance, a "peddler" or "solicitor" is any person who goes from house to house or from place to place in the city soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs or magazines.

As used in this Ordinance, the term "Permit Board" shall mean the board created by Section 3.

**SECTION 3:** ESTABLISHMENT, COMPOSITION AND GENERAL DUTIES OF PERMIT BOARD. There is hereby established the Permit Board of the city, the official name of which shall be "The Permit Board of the City of Abernathy". The permit board shall be composed of the City Administrator, who shall be Chairman of the board, the Chief of Police, and the City Secretary. The Permit Board shall perform all duties incumbent upon it under the terms of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 4:** PERMIT REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for any peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity mentioned in Section 2 without having first applied for and obtained a permit so to do from the city.

**SECTION 5:** APPLICATION - GENERALLY. Any person desiring a permit required by this Ordinance shall make written application therefore to the City Secretary which application shall show the following:

- 1] The full name and post office address of the applicant.
- 2] The state, county, town or city in which the applicant permanently resides.
- 3] The age, height, weight, complexion, color of hair and color of the eyes of the applicant.
- 4] The occupation in which the applicant desires to engage and for which he desires a permit.
- 5] A full and complete description of the goods, wares and merchandise or other articles or tokens which applicant desires to sell, which description shall give in detail the grade and character of the property to be sold. Further description as to grade and quality may be required by the Permit Board.

6] Whether the applicant has ever been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude.

**SECTION 6:** APPLICATION - ATTACHMENTS. There shall be attached to each application under this Ordinance the following:

- 1] Two (2) recent photographic likenesses of the applicant's face, which photographs shall not exceed one inch (1") square in size.
- 2] A certificate or letter from the president, a vice-president, general manager, sales manager, assistant sales manager or district or area manager of the company for which the applicant works, sells or solicits, stating that the applicant is an employee and/or agent of such company.
- 3] A reference to a recognized financial rating publication, which reference shall show the page on which the company's or firm's financial standing can be found; or a letter or a certificate from an association or organization which has as its purpose the protection of citizens of the United States against illegal or unsavory business practices stating that the firm or company is a member in good standing of such association or organization.

In the event that the applicant is an individual who is not working, selling or soliciting for any firm or company, letters of recommendation from two (2) citizens of the applicant's permanent residence shall be submitted.

**SECTION 7:** APPLICATION-CONSIDERATION BY PERMIT BOARD. Upon the filing of an application for a permit under this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the City Secretary to retain the application until time for the Permit Board to consider the same. The Permit Board shall meet each Monday at 9:00 A.M. All applications filed with the City Secretary prior to the preceding Wednesday shall be considered by the Permit Board on the next succeeding Monday. Applications filed between Wednesday morning and Saturday shall be considered by the permit board on the second Monday after filing.

**SECTION 8:** FEE. Each applicant for a permit under this Ordinance who resides in the city and furnishes local references shall be charged an investigation fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00). Each such applicant who resides outside of the city shall be charged an investigation fee of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00).

**SECTION 9:** ISSUANCE. If, upon hearing, it shall appear to the Permit Board, or a majority thereof, that the statements contained in an application for a permit under this Ordinance are true, and that the applicant has the right, under the Constitution and laws of this state and under the ordinances of this city, to engage in business, and that the applicant has not been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, the permit board shall issue such permit to the applicant.

**SECTION 10:** CONSENTS. Each permit issued under this Ordinance shall contain the following:

- 1] The name of the applicant and his address.
- 2] A physical description of the applicant.

## LEGAL NOTICE (Continued)

[3] A photographic likeness furnished with the application.

[4] The date the permit was issued.

**SECTION 11:** TO BE CARRIED ON PERSON. It shall be unlawful for any peddler or solicitor to engage in any activity for which a permit is required by this Ordinance, unless he carries such permit on his person while so engaged.

**SECTION 12:** DURATION. All permits issued under this Ordinance shall be valid from the date shown thereon for a period of one (1) year, unless sooner revoked as provided in this Ordinance.

**SECTION 13:** REVOCATION. If, after the permit provided for in this Ordinance has been issued, the Permit Board or other agency or official of the city finds that the permit was obtained by false representation in the application, such permit may be revoked by the Permit Board. Such permit may also be revoked, if it shall appear to the Permit Board that the holder of such permit has violated any ordinance of the city or any law of the state in connection with any soliciting by such holder or in connection with the collection, or attempted collection, of any account due to such permit holder or his employer, or in connection with the repossession or attempted repossession of goods sold by such permit holder or any other person employed by the employer of such permit holder.

**SECTION 14:** APPEALS FROM DECISIONS OF PERMIT BOARD. If the applicant for a permit under this Ordinance, or the holder of such a permit, is dissatisfied with any holding or finding of the Permit Board, he shall have the right to appeal to the City Council by filing a written notice of such appeal with the Permit Board within ten (10) days from the making and filing of such decision of the Permit Board. Upon the filing of such notice of appeal, the application for the permit and all papers possessed by the Permit Board in connection with such application and such permit shall be delivered to the City Council and such matters as may be in controversy shall be heard by the Council at its next regular meeting after the filing of the notice of appeal. The City Council shall have the same powers and authority as such hearing on such appeal as is vested in the Permit Board by this article.

**SECTION 15:** EXEMPTIONS FROM ORDINANCE. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the sale or soliciting of orders for the sale of milk, dairy products, bakery products, vegetables, poultry, eggs, or other farm and garden products which have been raised or produced by the vendor; daily deliveries of milk and bakery and other food products; newspaper distribution when headquarters are maintained in the City of Abernathy; sales made to dealers by commercial travelers or sales agents in the usual course of business; or sales made under authority and by order of law.

**SECTION 16:** UNLAWFUL USE OF STREETS. No peddler nor any other person or corporation or association or organization shall have or maintain structure on any public street or alley in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting, or soliciting orders for any goods, wares or merchandise, or cold drinks, hot drinks or food, nor for the purpose of exhibiting any kind of exhibit.

**SECTION 17:** UNLAWFUL TO SELL ON SIDEWALKS. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any of the goods or articles mentioned in Section 2 of this Ordinance on the sidewalks of the City of Abernathy unless such goods are offered for sale or sold by a person owning, occupying or controlling the premises adjoining or adjacent to the sidewalk, and then such goods shall be exposed and sold in the usual course of trade in accordance with all ordinances of the City of Abernathy and the statutes of the State of Texas.

**SECTION 18:** UNLAWFUL PARKING ON STREETS. It shall be unlawful for any person to stop, stand or park any motor vehicle, truck, trailer or vehicle of any kind on any public street or alley in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting or soliciting orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, cold drinks, hot drinks, or food, for a longer period than ten (10) minutes.

**SECTION 19:** UNLAWFUL PARKING NEAR SCHOOLS. It shall be unlawful for any person to stand, stop or park any motor vehicle, truck, trailer or vehicle of any kind at any place on any public street or alley located within six hundred feet (600') of any public school in the City of Abernathy for the purpose of selling, exhibiting or soliciting orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, cold drinks, hot drinks, or food.

**SECTION 20:** BOND. Every applicant for a permit to solicit or take orders for or attempt to take orders for the sale of goods, wares or merchandise or personal property of any nature whatsoever for future delivery or for services to be furnished or performed in the future, not a resident of the City of Abernathy, shall file with the City Secretary a surety bond, running to the City in the amount of \$1,000.00 with surety, acceptable to and approved by the City Administrator, conditioned that the said applicant shall comply fully with all the provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Abernathy and the statutes of the State of Texas, regulating and concerning the business of soliciting and guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy that all money paid as a down payment will be accounted for and applied according to the representations of the solicitor and further guaranteeing to any citizen of the City of Abernathy doing business with said solicitor that the property purchased will be delivered according to the representations of said solicitor. Action on such bond may be brought in the name of the City for the use and benefit of the aggrieved person.

**SECTION 21:** PENALTY. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), and each and every day this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

**SECTION 22:** SEVERANCE CLAUSE. The provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of this Ordinance, but they shall remain in effect, it being the legislative intent that this Ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

**SECTION 23:** EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after its publication as provided by law.

**SECTION 24:** REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. Ordinance No. 107 and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances of the City of Abernathy inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
