At Petersburg

Antelopes Meet Buffs Friday Night Competition Strong

IN DISTRICT 3-AA FOOTBALL

(By Guest Sports Writer)

In their final pre-season scrimmage the Antelopes came out second best to the Denver City Mustangs last Friday night. Lacking consistency on offense, the Lopes had to depend on the defense for their only score a 35 yard return of a pass interception by Joe Evans. The defense also kept the Mustangs from scoring until the two teams squared

off on their goal line offense and defense for 20 plays. In this season the visitors from Denver City scored four times while the Lopes scored none. The only spark in the offensive game was through the passing route. The Lopez quarterback passed for 165 yards on six completions. "Our receivers all ran good pass routes and caught the ball well, and our Q.B.'s three good, but our protection was not as good as it was last week against Falls," coach Nickerson stated. "Also, we were very slow and indecisive on our blocking," he added.

Defensively, the Antelopes intercepted three passes and recovered one Mustang fumble to stop the visitors in their attempts to score from the field.

"Our defense was tough, better gang tackling and pursuit than last week, and we came up with several big plays on defense," Coach Kennedy said. "On the goal-line we were simply not played, but we will improve this - this week," he observed. And this week is Beat Petersburg week in the Antelope ca-

mp. Still remembering the loss to the eventual quarter-final champions in the season opener last year, the Lopes are busy preparing for this year's kick-off against the Buffaloes. Petersburg has defeated two class AA ballclubs, Post and Lockney, in scrimmages and look as if they are ready to continue their visit to the play-offs this year. They depend upon speed in the backfield and size in the line.

"Their backs are quick and hard to bring down, their Q.B. is a good passer, and their receivers catch the ball good," Nickerson stated, and then added, "So we know we are facing a very talented offensive football team."

On defense the Buffs run the po-

pular monster 5-2 and depend on their quickness to stunt a lot. With several starters, returning the defensive unit that held five opponents scoreless last year, the Antelope offense will be going against a very tough and stingy defense.

In the Antelope camp, sports are high and all players reported to be in good condition with no injuries to keep anyone out of the contest. "We have had four weeks of workouts and two scrimmages and our football players are ready to play a game," Nickerson stated. The Lopes will go into the first game with Dane Vickers and Bruce Kinast at ends, Steve Phillips and Jackie McGaugh at tackles, David Lovelace and Ruyayne Struve the guards and Jesse Webb at center. Kent Snodgrass, who has looked good as a receiver in the first two games will see action at one of the end spots. Joe Evans and Dick Rogers will also be ready to play at one of the offensive line positions. In the backfield Q.B. Dave Davenport will have in his backfield Bobby Rogers and Bobby Cuevas at the H.B. position and Johnny Hemphill at fullback. Mike Cuevas, Manuel Trevino, Steve Rulley, and Earnest Johnson furnish depth in the backfield.

On the defensive side, McGaugh and Kinast are the ends. Struve and Dick Rogers the tackles, Hemphill, Lovelace, and Bobby Rogers the linebackers, and Davenport, B. Cuevas, Vickers, and Larry Lutrick in the secondary. Evans, Phillips, Davie Barrera, and Mike Cuevas, and Kim Hughes will see action on the defensive unit.

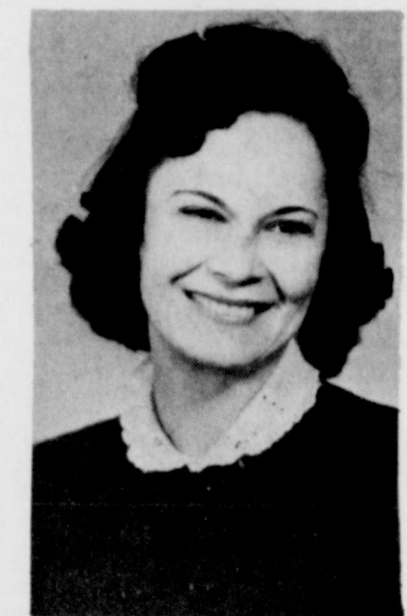

S. H. Lebow Dies

Abernathy paid its last respects to one of its Senior Citizens Thursday. He was a man who dedicated his life to working for the safety of others. As a section foreman for the Santa Fe he kept the rails, ties, spikes and road bed in good condition to protect the lives of those on trains passing over the miles of rail line entrusted to his care. After serving his time with the Santa Fe, he retired from the section foreman job many years ago. He was employed by the City of Abernathy to work the crosswalk across the highway between city hall and Pfnson's. During some 14 years in that position he escorted school children and adults across the busy street with no injury being suffered by any of his charges during that time. He performed this important duty during the noon hour Tuesday, August 31, then returned to his home where he died of a heart attack at about 3:30 p.m. that day. He was physically active and mentally alert to the time of his death. He was 82. He was S.H. Lebow.

Funeral rites for S.H. Lebow, 82, were conducted at 3 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 2, in Abernathy First Baptist Church with the Rev. Murray L. Brewer, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Marvin Patterson, Jim Bob Smith, J.L. Miller, Jr., and Morris Steves, L.G. Derringer, and Billy Shipman.

Mr. Lebow died about 3:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 31, after an apparent heart attack at his home here.

A native of Cairo, Ill., he settled in Bosque County, Texas, in 1902, and moved to Lubbock in 1913, where he worked as a section foreman. He was working out of Abernathy as a section foreman when he retired from the Santa Fe Railroad.

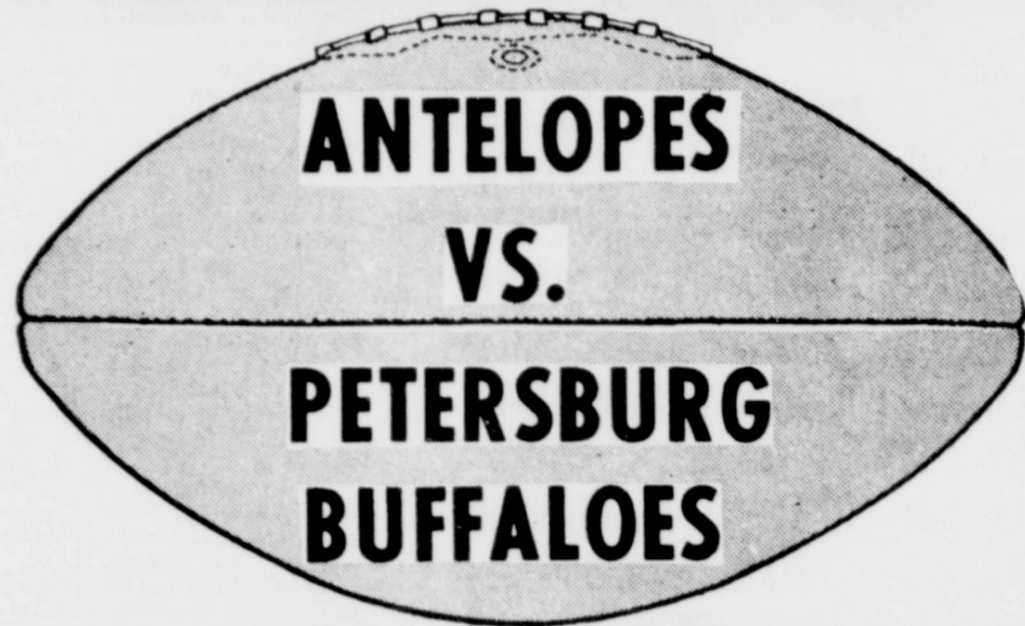
Following his retirement in 1951, Lebow worked for the Abernathy Police Department as a school crossing guard for 14 years.

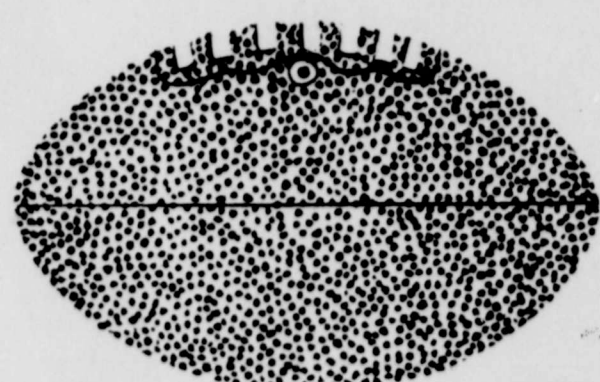
