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## Abernathy Shades Morton

### AHS ANTELOPES GO TO LOCKNEY FOR GAME FRIDAY NIGHT

With the wind to their backs the Antelopes kicked off to the Morton Indians who promptly returned the kick 87 yards and the Lopes found themselves behind for the first time this year. Trailing 7-0 the Lopes drove to the 10 yard line and a 4th down pass went incomplete in the end zone. Forcing the Indians to punt, the Lopes again drove into scoring position. O. B. Dave Davenport was injured as he was tackled on the sideline after picking up 6 yards on an end run. Jr. Steve Riley replaced Davenport and headed the ball as Joe Evans kicked a 32 yard field goal.

With the defense continually forcing the Indians to give up the ball, the Lopes dominated the rest of the game. Late in the second quarter, Davenport picked off a Morton pass to inspire the offense to a go ahead touchdown. With Riley directing the offense, the Lopes drove 60 yards for a T-D with 36 seconds left in the half. The score came on a three yard run by Bobby Rogers. Evans kicked the point.

In the second half neither team could score, but the Lopes stayed in Indian territory most of the time while keeping the Indians out of their end of the field. Again it was the defense that drew the praise of the coaches. Coach Max Kennedy said, "Our defense was extra tough against the running game. Our linemen, our linebackers, and our secondary all played their positions very well. We relaxed on our kick-off coverage and just didn't cover good at all. I was especially pleased with the play of our defensive line. Dick Rogers, Ruwayne Struve, Jesse Webb, and Bruce Kinast, an Larry Lutrick made some hard tackles in the secondary." Mike Cuevas and Dick Rogers were both in on 17 tackles.

On the offensive side of the statistics, Bobby Rogers led the rushing with 130 yards on 27 carries. This is Rogers second straight game to go over the century mark in rushing. Bobby Cuevas was the second leading carrier with 45 yards on 13 carries. Riley completed 4 of 9 passes for 67 yards. Coach Luke Nickerson praised the blocking of Steve Phillips and Bruce Kinast as they helped open up good holes

Mr. and Mrs. Ben G. Haney will be honored from 3 to 5 p. m. Sunday, October 10, in observance of their 63rd wedding anniversary.

Friends of the couple are invited to come by their home at 1405 Avenue H, during that time, to visit with them and offer their congratulations.

The former Ama Foster and Haney were married October 11, 1908, in her parents home near DeLeon in Comanche County. At the time of their marriage, Mrs. Haney was 18 and he lacked four days being 17.

When Mr. Haney asked for Ama's hand in marriage, Mr. Foster said he would consent if Ben would promise to stay in that area as long as he (Mr. Foster) was alive. Mr. Haney remarked that he told Mr. Foster he was asking a lot, but he made the promise and he kept that promise.

The newly-weds lived near the Oliver Springs community where they raised peanuts for two bits a bushel. "Mr. Haney stated, "We never did make much, but we farmed."

Having been born and reared in Comanche County, Mrs. Haney was one of six girls in a family of eight children. Mr. Haney had three brothers (including a twin) and two sisters. He had moved from Mississippi to Comanche County with his folks in 1865, at the age of five.

To this union were born four children: Berniece, Ila Mae Orbie Lee and Eora Pearl, in that order. Of the four, Orbie Lee, who lives between Seagraves and Plains, is the only surviving child. All three girls passed away within the past 14 months.

Ila Mae was the wife of Bill Holleman and the other two girls lived with their parents.

In January 1931, Mrs. Haney was ill and her doctor told Mr. Haney that unless he moved her to a higher country she would not live more than two or three days. So they "packed-up" and moved to the Abernathy area the 23rd of that month.

Recalling the time of that move, Mrs. Haney exclaimed, "When it cold then, I he immediately added, "Yeah, my feet got so cold they didn't warm up until August."

Evidently, the climate here was good for Mrs. Haney's health as she celebrated her 81st birthday the 13th of last month. "Uncle Ben," as he is affectionately called by many, will celebrate his 80th birthday the 15th of this month. The couple are the only surviving children in their respective families.

After moving here, they farm-

ed until 1936, and then Mr. Haney "thired out for wages" until they moved to town, at which time he then served as a concrete worker until the time of his retirement.

The Haney's have nine grandchildren and 7- great grandchildren, several of whom live in Abernathy.

In reminiscing, the Haney's recalled that they have been through some rough times when in 1918 when they and all four of their children had the flu at the same time. They sent for his twin brother who went to their home, lived with them for two weeks and took care of them and doing all the cooking and milking. "While he was there, he ate up all our chickens and I was afraid he was going to eat my milk cow," Mr. Haney laughed.

Also that year all their children had the measles at the same time, then all four had the whooping cough at the same time. Mrs. Haney said, it took four hands to attend them.

Mrs. Haney stated, "We've been through some rough times, but we are still here for a purpose, and only the Lord knows why."

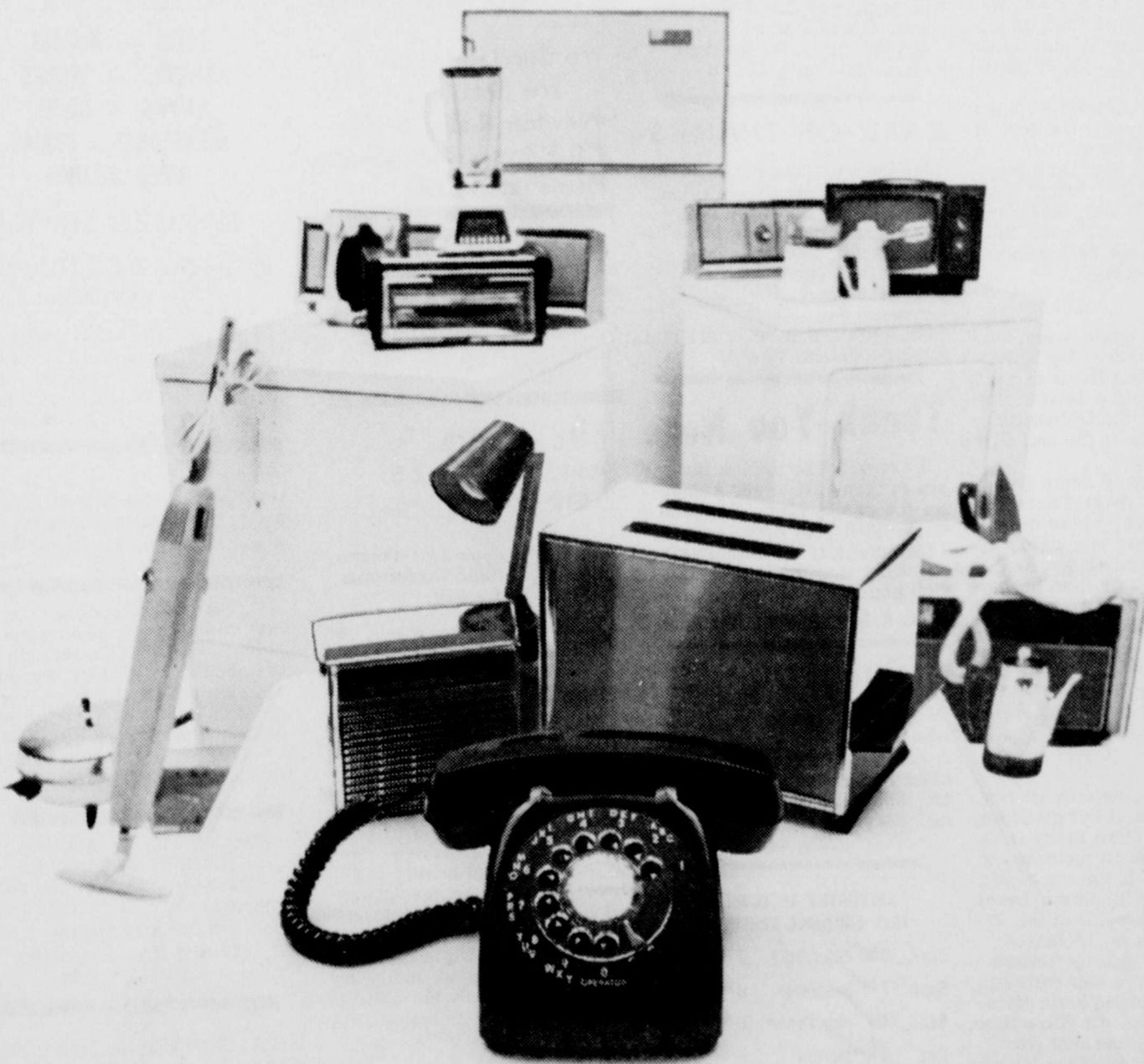
