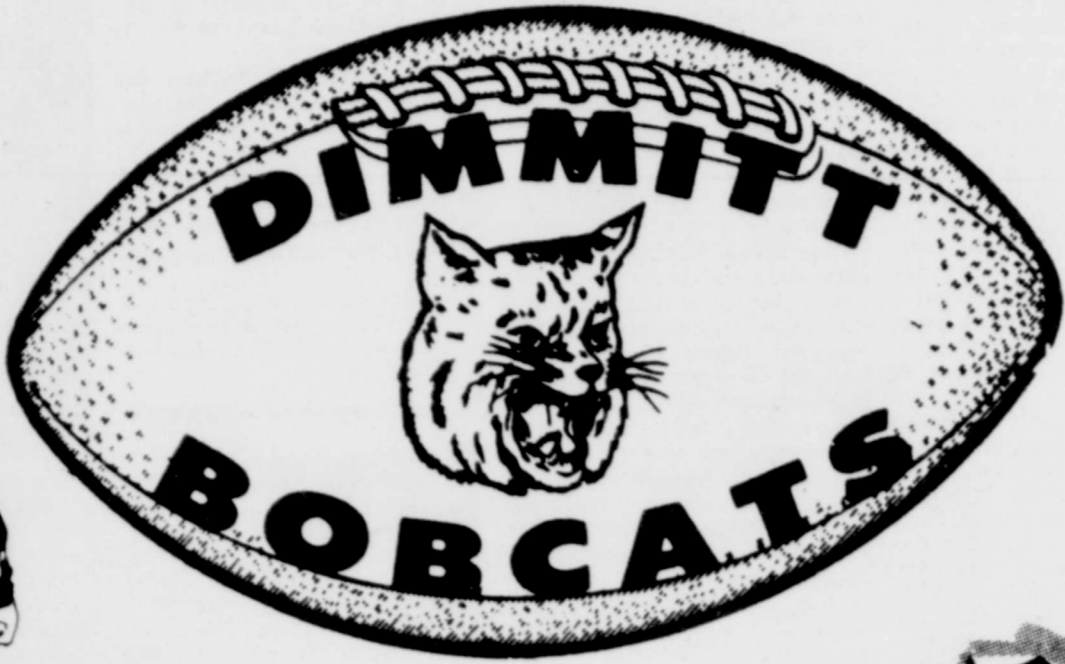

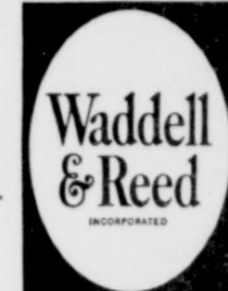
#### SADDEST SIGHT

Pictured above is one of the saddest sight in the District, in trying to "clean" the land this farmer has cleaned his own pockets. If he bought cotton burs to replace the organic matter contained in 4,000 lbs. of sorghum stubble it would cost \$5.00 per acre. Burning destroys all the nitrogen (about 20 lbs. per acre for the residue), and this would cost at least \$1.50 per acre to replace

with fertilizer. Phosphate is still present in the ash, but has been made less usable for crops due to burning. To replace this would cost another 75¢ to \$1.00 per acre. Potash loss would be similar to phosphate losses. The total loss: at least \$7.00 per acre, and even greater losses from killing microbial activity in the soils and leaving land bare for erosion forces to wash and blow it away.

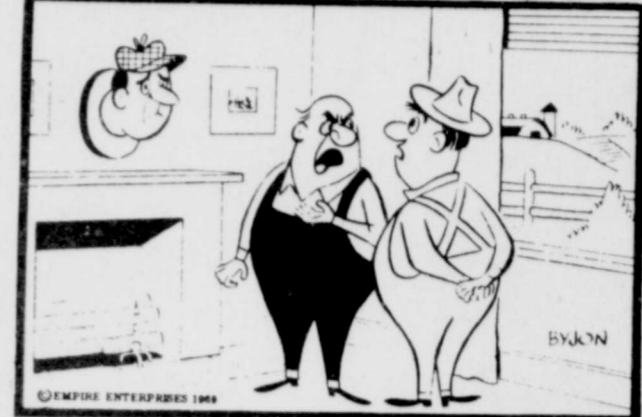

From The Desk of the City Manager

Many phases of City Government receive a lot of attention and are fairly familiar to all of us. We know there are certain things that we must do or not do and generally we act accordingly. Two thirds of the people in our city recognized that the 3% discount for paying their taxes three months early was a real bargain and they took advantage of it. I have no idea how this compares to previous years, but we would hazard a guess that this is a good percentage to have already in the till at this point. One thing for sure, it gives us a wonderful feeling to know that we have this backlog to work with instead of a deficit. Don't you just feel proud to be a part of Beautiful Abernathy with all its peace and tranquility and brotherly love when you get the news and hear some of the reports from our neighbors I never let a day or an hour go by without being thankful for your kindness, thoughtfulness and especially for you letting us come and be a part of this.

Then there are some phases of our city that are not so well known, and sometimes we wonder why some things are done or left undone for what seems to us like no apparent reason. It would be so easy to do some things that would improve our block or our street or our section of town and all would benefit from it. At least that is the way it seems to us. But unfortunately at least for us, it just doesn't work out that way. Ultimately when the chips are down and we look at the situation calmly and coolly and can see how it would really affect the City as a whole we realize that "No" was the proper answer.

Our Municipal Airport is one facility that we own that few people know or understand or for that matter even know exists. At one time, everyone thought the airports and private plane business was going to boom into orbit and we all rushed into getting the surplus airports such as ours under City control. We just knew that this was going to be the solution to our industrial locations and serve hundreds of private planes that would be begging us to lease them facilities and sell them fuel.

Well for some unknown reason all this explosion has just not happened. Sure we have some activity at the airport and a few private planes use the facility, but not anywhere near what had been expected. We are among the group that believes that airports are still a good investment and could easily be the deciding factor in us getting some additional business or industry. We want to keep our airport in operating condition and ready to function up to its potential when and if the need arises.

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One phase of the operating that is not common knowledge is that the money that we take in from leasing the facilities or land or from Oil leases or any money made in any other way out there must be spent on the airport. It cannot be spent in town or anywhere except on the airport. The lights that will be installed soon on the runways are possible because we leased the land for oil. The seal coating on the runways was possible because we lease the land for farming. Sometimes we will have money to spend out there when it may seem that the money could be better spent elsewhere, but when we remember that we signed a contract years ago that we would spend all money earned at the airport on the airport, and we remember all the good fringe benefits like our water that is so vital to us, then the airport light shines through as the wonderful bargain that it is. Then we all should brush the cobwebs off our memories and thank the fine sighted citizens like Mr. Andy Reid and Mrs. Arno Struve who donate all their time and probably some of their own money to make it possible for us to have this facility as one of our greatest assets.

Visit and use your airport every chance you get. It is a fine installation and you will enjoy knowing it is yours.

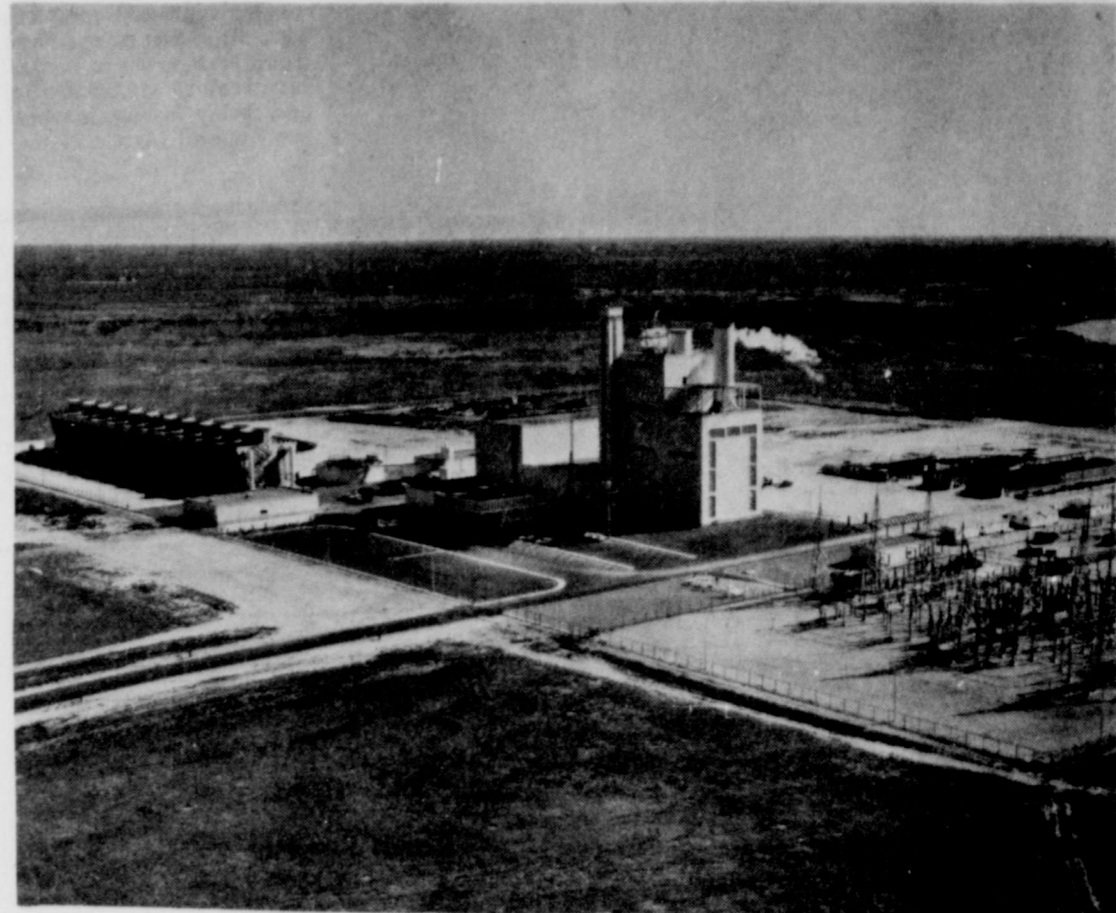

## Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 17  
RELATING TO ITINERANT VENDORS  
PASSED August 23, 1971

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND REGULATING ITINERANT VENDORS, ITINERANT VENDORS, PERSONS AND PERSONS TAKING ORDERS FOR OR OFFERING FOR SALE, GOODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE, SERVICES, PHOTOGRAPHS, NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES, OR SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEWSPAPERS OR MAGAZINES; PROVIDING FOR LICENSE AND LICENSE FEE; PROHIBITING SELLING OR SOLICITING WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING SUCH LICENSE; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH LICENSE; PROVIDING FOR THE DISCLOSURE OF ALL MATTERS PERTAINING TO SUCH ACTIVITY; ISSUING A BOND; EXEMPTING THOSE ENGAGED IN INTERSTATE COMMERCE FROM LICENSE FEE AND BOND BUT REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS TO REGISTER WITH THE CITY SECRETARY AND SUBMIT ALL INFORMATION PERTAINING TO SUCH ACTIVITY; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, INCLUDING A FINE NOT EXCEEDING FIFTY DOLLARS PER DAY FOR EACH OFFENSE AND DETERMINING WHAT SHALL CONSTITUTE A SEPARATE OFFENSE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, Texas:

SECTION 1: This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the Town of New Deal, for the public safety, comfort, convenience, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

SECTION 2: That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, without having first obtained for and obtained a license so to do from the City Secretary of said Town. It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said Town as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling.

SECTION 3: That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of said Town for a license to do so, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents, and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said Town.

SECTION 4: The applicant mentioned in Section 3 shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, signed by applicant and by the City Secretary of said Town, authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to delivery and also conditioned to indemnify any and all purchasers of customers for any and all damages in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer within 30 days after delivery, and which bond shall be for the use and benefit of all persons, firms or corporations that may make any purchase or give any order to the principal on said bond, or to an agent or employee of the principal.

Provided that in case applicant is a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaging in any activity mentioned in paragraph two hereof through one or more agents or employees, such persons, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall be required to enter into only one bond, in the sum of \$1,000.00 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.

SECTION 5: That an itinerant merchant or an itinerant vendor as the terms are in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 6: That the license fee for an itinerant merchant or itinerant vendor shall be \$10.00. Provided, however, when any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation, or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall, in addition to said \$10.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$5.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which license shall be paid within one year from the date of their issuance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of said licenses.

SECTION 7: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales made to dealers by commercial travelers or sales agents in the usual course of business, nor to sales made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products.

SECTION 8: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged in interstate commerce as that term is herein defined, provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place to place in the Town of New Deal without having with them a registration card by the Secretary of said Town giving the following information:

- (a) Name, home address, and local address, if any, of registrant.
- (b) Name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
- (c) Nature of the articles or things which are to be solicited.
- (d) Whether registrant, upon sale or order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
- (e) Period of time which registrant wishes to solicit or sell in said Town.

The registrant at the time of the registration, as herein provided for, shall submit for inspection of the City Clerk or City Secretary written proof of his identity which may be in the form of an automobile operator's license, identification letter of said State to be registered by the person, firm or corporation for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.

The term "Interstate Commerce" means soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, photographs, newspapers or magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines which, at the time the order is taken, are in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or introduced into this city in the fulfillment of such orders.

SECTION 9: Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance or failing to observe any provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$100.00 and each year in addition or fraction of day during which this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be violated, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 10: Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.
