ORDINANCE NO. // Pertaining to PEDDLERS PASSED: August 23, 1971

AN ORDINANCE DEPINING AND REGULATING ITINERANT MERCHANTS, ITINERANT VENDORS, PEDDLERS, AND PERSONS TAKING ORDERS FOR OR OFFERING FOR SALE, COODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE, SERVICES, PHOTOGRAPHS, NEWSPAPERS, MATAZINES, OR SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEWS-PAPERS OR MAGAZINES; PROVIDING FOR LICENSE AND LICENSE FEE; PROHIBITING SELLING OR SOLICITING WITHOUT THEN CARRYING SUCH LICENSE WHILE SO ENGAGED; RECUIRING SUCH PERSON OR PERSONS TO MAKE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE, THEREIN MAKING FULL DISCLOSURE OF ALL MATTERS PERTINENT TO SUCH ACTIVITY; RECUIRING A BOND; EXEMPTING THOSE ENGAGED IN INTERSTATE COMMITTED FROM LICENSE FEE AND BOND BUT REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS TO RETISTER WITH THE CITY SECRETARY AND SUBMIT ALL INFORMATION PORTINENT TO SUCH ACTIVITY; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, INCLUDING A SIVE NOT LESS THAN \$10.00 NOR MORE THAN \$10.00 FOR EACH OFFENSE AND DEFINING WHAT SHALL CONSTITUTE A SEPARATE OFFENSE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, Texas:

SECTION 1: This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the Town of New Deal, for the public safety, comfort, convenience, and protection of the Town and citizens of said Town, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

SECTION 2: That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to clace in the Town of New Deal, Texas, soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to sell of take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, ohotographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, without having first applied for and obtained a license so to do from the City Secretary of said Town It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said Town as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling.

SECTION 3: That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, to sell or solocit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of said Town for a license to do so, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said Town.

shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, signed by applicant and signed, as surety, by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, magazines and newspapers in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to delivery and also conditioned to indemnify any and all purchasers of customers for any and all defects in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer within 30 days after delivery, and which bond shall be for the use and benefit of all persond, firms or corporations that may make any purchase of give any order to the principal. The applicant mentioned in Section

Provided that in case applicant is a person, Provided that in case applicant is a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaging in any activity mentioned in paragraph two hereof through one or more agents or employees, such persons, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall be required to enter into only one bond, in the sum of \$1,000,000 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.

That an itinerant merchant or an itinerant wendor as the terms are used in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.'

SECTION 6: That the license fee for an itinerant merchant or itinerant vendor shall be \$10.00. Provided, however, when any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation, or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall, in addition to said \$10.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$5.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one year from the date of their issurance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of said licenses.

SECTION 7: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales made to dealers by commercial travellers or sales agents in the usual course of business, nor to sales made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products.

SECTION 8: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged interstate commerce as that term is herein defined; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place to place in the Town of New Deal without having first registered with the City Secretary of said Town giving the following information:

- (a) Name, home address, and local address, if any, (a) Name, home address, and local address, if a of registrant.
 (b) Name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents of for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
 (c) Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
 (d) Whether registrant, woon sale or order
- solicited.

 (d) Whether registrant, upon sale or order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.

 (e) Period of time which registrant wishes to solicit or sell in said Town.

The registrant at the time of the registration, as herein provided for, shall submit for inspection of the City Clerk or City Secretary written proof of his identity which may be in the form of an automobile operator's license, identification letter of card issued to registrant by the person, firm or corporation for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.

The term "Interstate Commerce" means soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, photographs, newspapers or magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines which, at the time the order is taken, are in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or introduced into this city in the

SECTION 9: Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance or failing to observe any provisions hereof shall be deemed quilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$100.00 and each and every day or fraction of a day during which this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be violated, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 10: Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid partion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby recealed.

SECTION 11: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.
