Antelopes Down Dimmitt; Go To Floydada

Bouncing back from their losses to Littlefield, the Abernathy Antelopes defeated the Dimmitt Bobcats 14-0 last Friday night. The win over the Bobcats, coupled with a Littlefield win over Floydada, left the Antelopes alive in the district race although the odds are against it, the Lopes can tie for the Championship by beating Floydada and by Morton taking the Littlefield team. The chances are very slim that these combination of things will happen, Coach Luke Nickerson said. But we are going to do our part and hope that Morton can do theirs. The win over Dimmitt was the first victory for the Lopes over the Bobcats in several years. With a 6-2-1 record the Lopes go into the Floydada game hoping to improve on this record and keep their title hopes alive.

Receiving the opening kick-off the Lopes drove 65 yards for their first score, with the T.D. coming on a two yard blast by Bobby Rogers. Joe Evans kicked the extra point and that was all the scoring for the first half. The Lopes did not threaten again in the half, but had to hold off a desperate Dimmitt scoring try just as the half ended. With the help of an interference call in the end zone the Bobcats were on the one yard line as time ran out, but because of the penalty were given another try. The Antelope goal line defense stormed into the Bobcat backfield and forced a fumble to stop the Dimmitt try for a score. Lovelace got the T-D on a three yard burst and Evans again kicked the point. Dimmitt, unable to get a drive going against the tough Antelope defense never threatened in the second half. The Lopes came close to another score in the 4th quarter but two pass tries were no good. Defensively, the Lopes were led by linebacker Johnny Hemphill with 13. Steve Phillips was in on 9 tackles and Joe Evans accounted for 12.

Offensively the Lopes were led by Rogers who rushed for 122 yards on 28 carries and Lovelace who picked up 69 yards on 11 carries. Q.B. Steve Riley completed three of 10 passes for 30 yards. Kent Snodgrass caught one pass for 17 yards and Bruce Kinast had one reception for 11 yards.

In Floydada, the Lopes face an explosive football team. Paced by two fast halfbacks and a hard running fullback, the whirlwind offense has bowled over seven opponents while losing only two games. The Wind defense is led by line backer Kim Rose who rates at one of the top college prospects on the South Plains. "The Lopes have played Floydada as close or any team the past two years and we know our men will be ready for this one," coach Kennedy stated.

County Road Work Approved

The Texas Highway Commission has approved development of 3.7 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Hale County as part of the 1971 Texas Farm to Market Road Program. The section is from FM 84 south to FM 587, about seven miles west of Abernathy. District Highway Engineer Oscar L. Crain of the Texas Highway Department in Lubbock said the estimated cost of the work is \$171,000.

The work authorized is part of 304.3 miles of new construction and additional financing for 177.1 miles of FM and RM Roads previously designated and constructed in stages. Estimated cost of the program statewide is \$29.9 million.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved secondary roads under State-maintenance in the Farm to Market system.

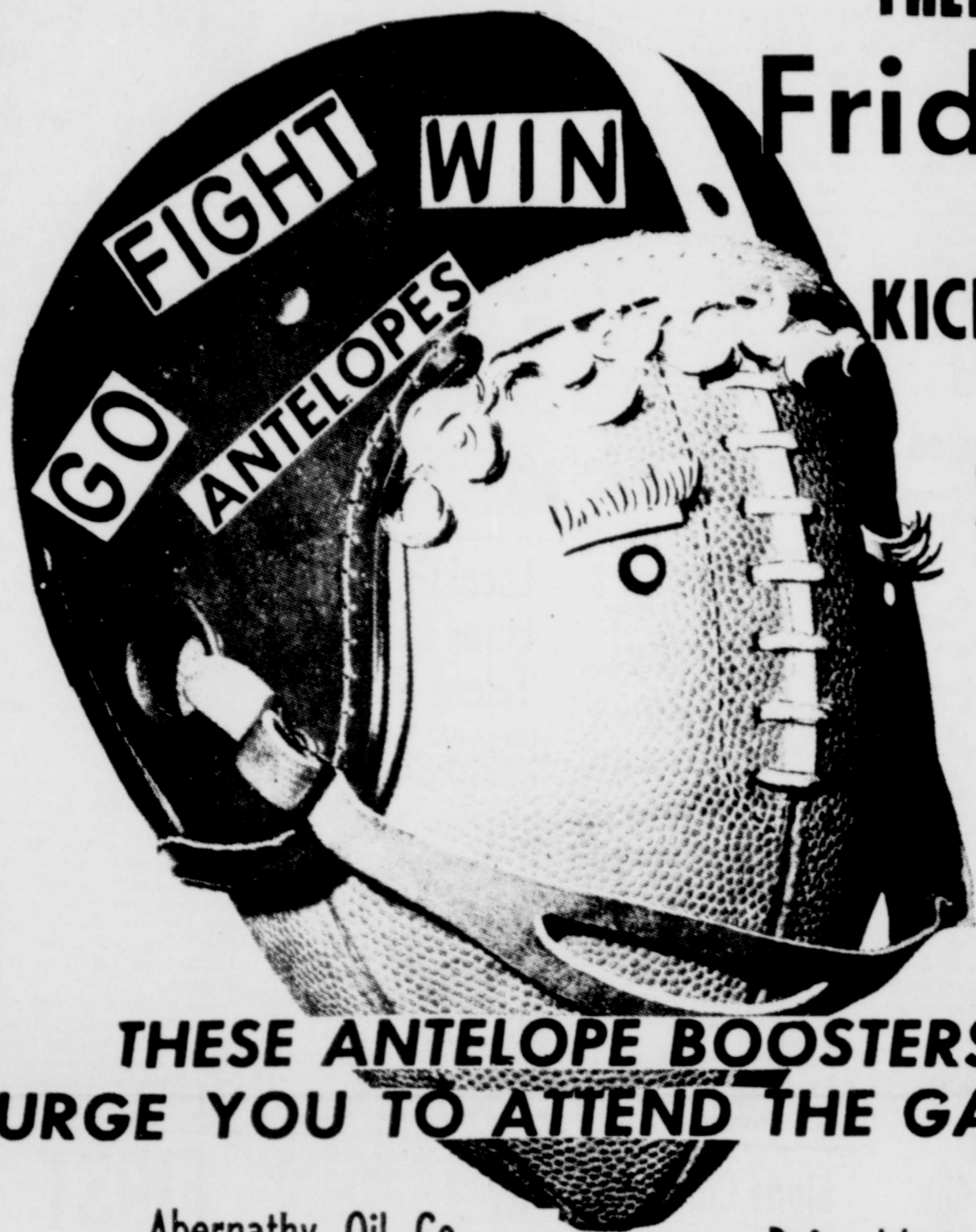
FIRST BALE GINNED

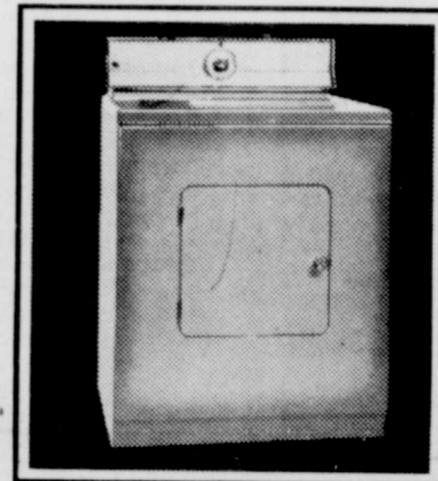

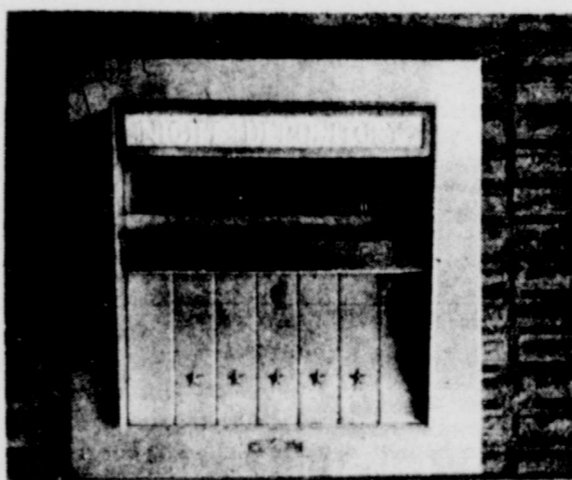

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 17
 Pertaining to FEEDERS
 PASSED: August 23, 1971

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND REGULATING ITINERANT MERCHANTS, ITINERANT VENDORS, PEDDLERS, AND PERSONS TAKING ORDERS FOR OR OFFERING FOR SALE, GOODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE, SERVICES, PHOTOGRAPHS, NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES, OR SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEWSPAPERS OR MAGAZINES; PROVIDING FOR LICENSES AND LICENSE FEES; PROHIBITING SELLING OR SOLICITING WITHOUT THEN CARRYING SUCH LICENSE WHILE SO ENGAGED; REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS OR PERSONS TO MAKE APPLICATION FOR LICENSE; PROVIDING FOR THE DISCLOSURE OF ALL MATTERS PERTINENT TO SUCH ACTIVITY; REQUIRING A BOND; EXEMPTING THOSE ENGAGED IN INTERSTATE COMMERCE FROM LICENSE FEES AND BOND BUT REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS TO REGISTER WITH THE CITY SECRETARY AND SUBMIT ALL INFORMATION PERTINENT TO SUCH ACTIVITY; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, INCLUDING A FINE NOT LESS THAN \$10.00 NOR MORE THAN \$100.00 FOR EACH OFFENSE AND DEPRIVING WHAT SHALL CONSTITUTE A SEPARATE OFFENSE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, Texas:

SECTION 1: This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the Town of New Deal, for the public safety, comfort, convenience, and protection of the Town and citizens of said Town, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of its purpose.

SECTION 2: That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, without having first applied for and obtained a license so to do from the City Secretary of said Town. It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said Town as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling.

SECTION 3: That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of said Town for a license to do so, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said Town.

SECTION 4: The applicant mentioned in Section 3 shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, signed by applicant and signed, as surety, by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, magazines and newspapers in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to delivery and also conditioned to indemnify any and all purchasers of customers for any and all defects in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer within 30 days after delivery, and which bond shall be for the use and benefit of all persons, firms or corporations that may make any purchase or give any order to the principal, on said bond, or to an agent or employee of the principal.

Provided that in case applicant is a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaging in any activity mentioned in paragraph two hereof through one or more agents or employees, such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall be required to enter into only one bond, in the sum of \$1,000.000 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.

SECTION 5: That an itinerant merchant or an itinerant vendor as the terms are used in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 6: That the license fee for an itinerant merchant or itinerant vendor shall be \$10.00. Provided, however, when any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation, or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall, in addition to said \$10.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$5.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one year from the date of their issuance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of said licenses.

SECTION 7: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales made to dealers by commercial travellers or sales agents in the usual course of business, nor to vendors made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products.

SECTION 8: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged in interstate commerce as that term is herein defined; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place to place in the Town of New Deal without having first registered with the City Secretary of said Town giving the following information:

- (a) Name, home address, and local address, if any, of registrant.
- (b) Name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents or for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
- (c) Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
- (d) Whether registrant, upon sale or order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
- (e) Period of time which registrant wishes to solicit or sell in said Town.

The registrant at the time of the registration, as herein provided for, shall submit for inspection of the City Clerk or City Secretary written proof of his identity which may be in the form of an automobile operator's license, identification letter of card issued to registrant by the person, firm or corporation for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.

The term "interstate commerce" means soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers or magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines which, at the time the order is taken, are in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or introduced into this city in the fulfillment of such orders.

SECTION 9: Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance or failing to observe any provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$100.00 and each and every day or fraction of a day during which this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be violated, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 10: Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

From the Desk of the City Manager

This past week we were privileged to attend a Water Utility Supervisory Management Course sponsored by the Texas Quality Water Board and presented by the A & M University Engineering Extension Service. It was held at the Lubbock Water Reclamation Plant, east of the city where they have all the latest and best equipment that is available throughout the Cities from this area were represented and contributed to

the success of the school. Probably more knowledge was exchanged between students than between teacher and student, although it would be grossly unfair to fault the instructors, but with 128 years of experience, it is unlikely that you could link of any problem that someone there had not already experienced and solved. It is our considered opinion that formal training such as this is what keeps the achievers ahead of the pack, producing for their cities.

Then Saturday we were the guests of Southwest Public Service Co. at their wonderful new generating plant dedicated as Clifford B. Jones Station.

One must be impressed by this new Electric generating facility. What seemed like miles and miles of stainless steel for the occasion, it's turbine control system is the first of its kind to be installed in the world. It conserves the fresh water for cooling and, experimentally, for making the steam to drive the steam to drive the turbine.

This gets back to the fact that our school was held at the reclamation plant that provides the plant 3,500,000 gallons of water per day. This saves exactly this amount of fresh water that is then available to the citizens of this area for domestic use. Anything or

anyone who can accomplish this kind of results and not use precious fresh water is bound to win a lot of Brownie points. But this is not where this dearest of all commodities, namely water, ends its good work for mankind in our area. After it goes through the plant it is released and used for irrigation on adjacent farms. There it helps grow the lush crops for which this area is so famous. Thus it completes the cycle and after serving many fine causes, it goes back to the earth from whence it came.

As a City Employee where we have water and waste water facilities that are considered adequate in every way

for our needs we were almost awestruck by the elaborate facilities at both these installations that already are such vital parts of our overall economy. There is no way and no intent on our part to say which is greater or more important. But it goes a long way toward showing one and all what can be accomplished when Municipalities and Private Industry put their know-how and will together. We are proud that we have been privileged to learn more about them. It would be difficult to say how much we have improved our skills in doing so but certainly it is considerable.
