SECTION 3: That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the Town of New Deal, Texas, to sell or solocit orders for goods, wares, merchan-dise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of said Town for a license to do so, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said Town.



That an itinerant merchant or an itinerant SECTION 5: vendor as the terms are used in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, cor-noration or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.'

SECTION 6: That the license fee for an itinerant merchant or Itinerant vendor shall be \$10.00. Provided, however, when any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation, or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees such berson, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall, in addition to said \$10.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$5.00 for each agent or emoloyee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one year from the date of their issurance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of said licenses.

<u>SECTION 7</u>: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales made to dealers by commercial travellers or sales arents in the usual course of business, nor to sales made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products.

SECTION 8: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons encaged interstate commerce as that term is herein defined; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place in the Town of New Deal without having first registered with the City Secretary of said Town giving the followin; information:

 (b) Name and address of the person, firm, or corporation, if any, that he or she represents of for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
 (c) Nature of the articles or things which are to be solicited.
 (d) Whether registrant, upon sale or order ahl demand or receive or accept payment or
- shall demand or receive or accept payment or de-posit of money in advance of final delivery. Period of time which registrant wishes to solicit or sell in said Town.

The registrant at the time of the registra-tion, as herein provided for, shall submit for inspec-tion of the City Clerk or City Secretary written proof of his identity which may be in the form of an automobile operator's license, identification letter of card issued to registrant by the person, firm or corporation for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared cleared.

The term "Interstate Commerce" means soliciting, selling, or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, notographs, newspapers or magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines which, at the time the order is taken, are in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or introduced into this city in the fulfillment of such orders.

SECTION 9: Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance or failing to observe any provisions hereof shall be deemed quilty of a mis-demeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$100.00 and each and every day or fraction of a day during which this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be violated, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION 10: Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the Town of New Deal, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not immair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid partion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby

SECTION 11: This ordinance shall take effect and be In force from and after its passare and publication as provided by law.
