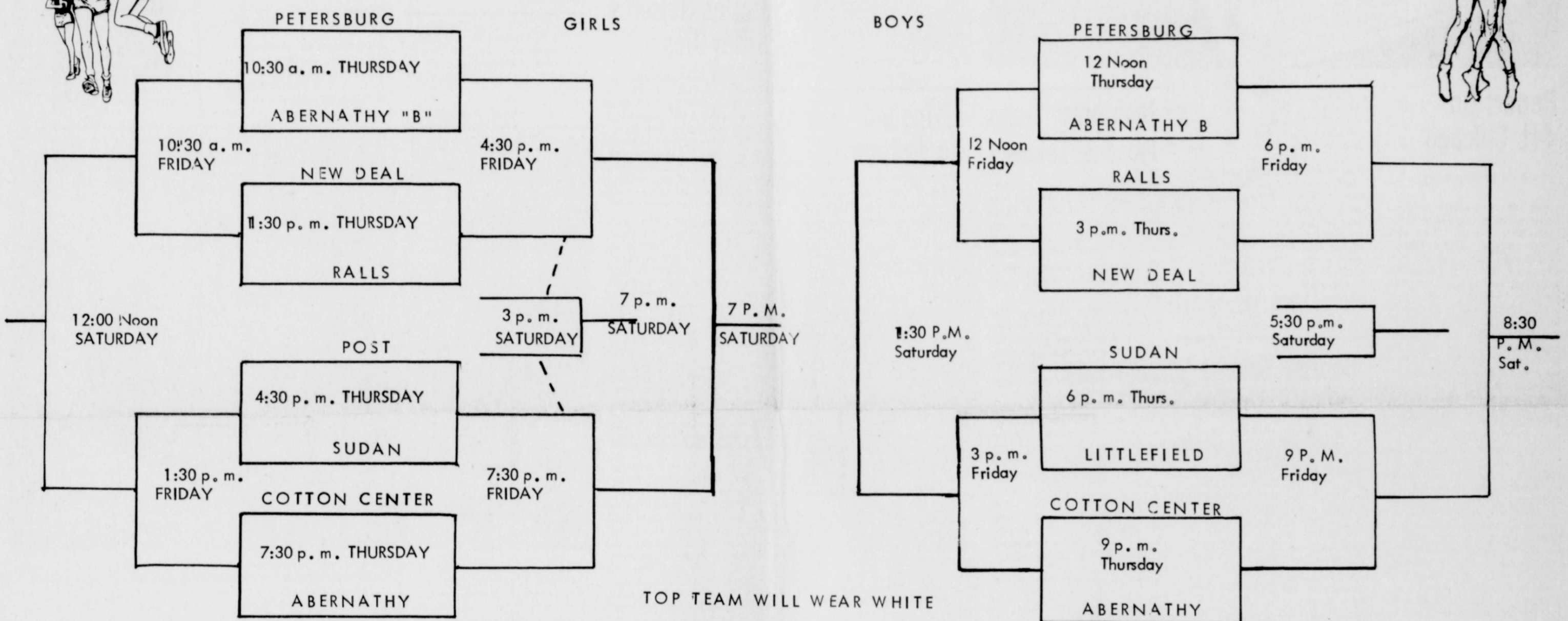

Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent of Abernathy Schools, announced that Christmas and New Year Holidays will begin at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 22, and end at 8:45 a.m. Monday, Jan. 3.

Abernathy post office and Abernathy First State Bank will be closed Dec. 24, for Christmas Holiday. There will be no rural or city mail delivery that day.

The Federal Government controls the post office holidays and a State of Texas banking law controls the bank holidays.

Christmas this year comes on Saturday, therefore postal workers must take the day before, Dec. 24, as their Christmas Holiday.

The state banking law demands that banks be closed Dec. 24 because Christmas comes on Saturday, a day banks are normally are closed.

New Year's Day comes on Saturday and the Federal and state banking laws demand that the post office and bank be closed on the day before, which will be Friday, Dec. 31.

There will be no city or rural mail delivery on these holidays.

Bank customers are reminded of the night depository unit at the southeast entrance to the bank building. Deposits may be made at that unit during long holiday weekends.

The Rev. H.W. Barnett, 86, a Methodist minister who served the South Plains for many years, died Saturday in Sterling, Colo. Services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in Abernathy's First Methodist Church with the Rev. Mark Williams, pastor of Plainview's First Methodist Church, officiating assisted by the Rev. H.B. Coggin, pastor of the Lakeview church.

Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery directed by Chambers Funeral Home.

Barnett had been living with his son, Loyd, in Peetz, Colo. Before moving to Colorado about two years ago he had pastored churches in several South Plains cities, including Abernathy, Earth, Denver City and Shallowater.

Survivors, other than the son, include four daughters, Mrs. Ralph Gossett of Big Spring, Mrs. J.W. Smith of Amarillo and Mrs. Elmer Tarbox and Mrs. Delaine Crawford, both of Lubbock; 19 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Grandsons were pallbearers.

The Rev. Mr. Barnett was born in Montague County and was reared in Wise County, Texas. He attended Clarendon College, and entered the ministry at the age of 33, a profession he followed for over 40 years. He was pastor of the Abernathy Church in the early 1930's.

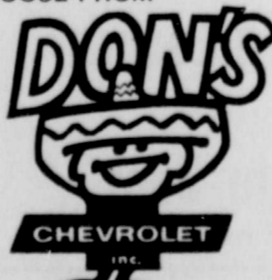

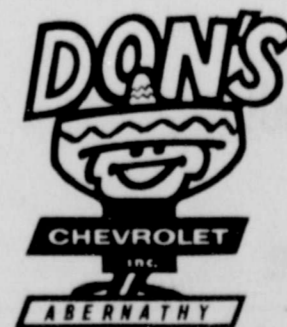

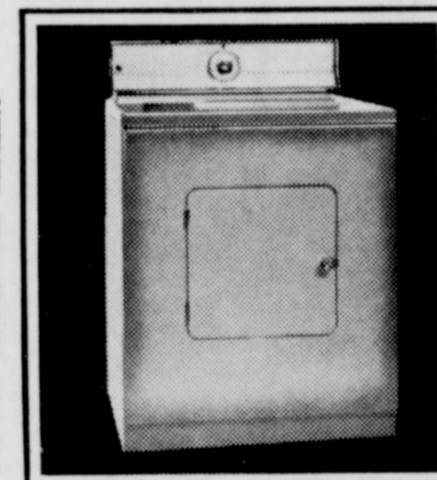

### Anderson Is Bee Keeper, Shipper

(By Morris Wilkes)

A "jack-of-all" trades with a firm positive attitude is C. O. Anderson of Abernathy. Mr. Anderson is currently most active in the bee and pheasant industry.

"I was born in a bee family," Mr. Anderson chuckled. His grandfather was the largest beekeeper in Texas and his father also handled bees. As Mr. Anderson puts it, "I was the only one in my family that gave a hoot about bees."

Selling a lumber business he owned in Abernathy, Mr. Anderson went into the bee business in 1952. Later his son, Olen, incorporated with him.

"I've always liked bees," Mr. Anderson said. "You've got to like bees to stay in the business."

All of the material used in a bee hive, except the combs are built by Mr. Anderson. A dove tailing machine, the only one like it in the world, designed by Mr. Anderson and built by the late John Duty is used in making portions of the hive.

Insecticide is a major problem encountered by Anderson in regard to his bees. "It has about put us out of the business. Insecticide has killed over 900 hives," Mr. Anderson said. "Unless insecticide puts me out of business, I'll always have bees as long as I can work them."

Mr. Anderson sells his cotton and pink weed honey wholesale to a firm in Michigan. Also he builds and sells hives and other equipment. This year Anderson's hives average 78 pounds of honey each. Production does depend on both the hive and bees he noted.

Along with bees, Mr. Anderson raises quail, chukkers and fancy pheasants. He sells both eggs and birds. Other fowl he raises includes dove, pigeons and turkeys.

Incubators for hatching eggs are built by Anderson. These incubators have some unique features such as double thermostats, and are in two sizes, 600 and 1200 egg. Portions of the 35 incubators constructed by Mr. Anderson have been sold in California, Arizona and Utah. Mr. Anderson also hatches his own birds.

In 1923, Anderson came to Abernathy. He was engaged in farming, mill and construction work for several years, along with his brother.

### The Struves' 5-Month Trip

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve were on a five-month trip late last year and early this year. Their travels took them to the Orient, South Pacific, Australia, New Zealand and other interesting places. The Review requested a series of stories on their trip.

We went with Wesley to the diversion dam across the Fitzroy about twenty-five miles up river from the headquarters. In traveling in this very hot sparsely settled country it is absolutely necessary to inform others where you are going and when you expect to return. It is imperative that plenty of extra water be taken along and there

should be two spare tires in the vehicle. We blew out a tire about half way to our destination and we considered turning back right there because we had to put on the only spare tire we had. With no two-way radio in the car and very little shade to be offered by the eucalyptus trees there was some question about the advisability of continuing on to our destination. A few miles further we ran into long stretches of flat muddy road. The road was only a tire track road that held any rain water that fell close by and if there was a low spot to traverse in the plain these mud holes could look rather difficult. We circled around some of them and had no actual difficulty but under the circumstances we took chances. When we finally got to the dam we were relieved to see the operating engineers working. Had we known

previously that they were there we would have had a great deal less trepidation. The engineers were erecting the barrage to divert the water. Actually they do not call it a dam they call it "The Barricade" and after seeing all the sediment flowing down the river I could understand why a concrete dam would not be practical. The barrage gates divert the water into a canal that connects to a creek that runs toward the irrigated land. This creek has another dam across it that impounds water until it is needed for irrigation.

After the irrigation season is over or perhaps when the river begins to go down the barrage gates are let down and any accumulated sediment is allowed to flush on downstream. There was a ware house at the river in which the men stored some of their equipment. It was of special interest because it was built up on steel eye-beams so that its floor was about ten feet from the ground level. This was necessary because of the frequent flooding of the river to considerable depth far beyond its usual banks.

On our return journey we went by the dam on the creek. This was several miles from the Barricade and by the time the water reaches it most of the sediment has settled out and the water is much clearer. Around this reservoir there is a dike several miles long that increases the water capacity of the lake. Just such a dike as this will be necessary around the whole project 56,000 acres to keep flood waters from the Fitzroy from destroying the crops.

It would be possible to irrigate this country from wells but the cost of drilling equipping such wells in this remote place would be about \$58,000 each and the production per well has been found to be less than 500 gallons per minute. This is why it is imperative for the company to build the larger dam across the Fitzroy.

We reached Liveringa house in time for a much appreciated dinner. The trip was hot and very tiring so we all decided to take a nap. When I awoke Wesley had long since gone to see about some of the work. The inactivity of the afternoon was welcome and restful.

The Roddys had decided that they would take us to Derby to catch our plane the following morning. Wesley was due to check on one of the stations beyond Derby and he said he had just as well do it that day as any other. One of the stations under his care is 350 miles from Liveringa. He was still using his pickup up to go from place to place but we have learned that since we were there he has obtained his Australian pilots license and is now able to fly from place to place when you consider the condition of most of the roads this must be a great relief to him.

On Friday nights the company sends a movie to Camballin for the entertainment of its personnel. The screen is out in the open and

everybody brings his own folding chair to sit on. There is only one projector so that there has to be a pause between reels for rewinding and re-loading for the next reel. This gives a little time for visiting and enjoying the rather balmy night air. The films are usually U.S. Films and the one we saw was a good many years old. We hadn't seen it and all in all it was a very pleasant experience out under the open Western Australian sky.

On Saturday morning we arose at 7:30 for it was necessary to arise in time to make the long drive into town by 9:30 a. m. plane departure time. Trudy got up and helped Wesley fix breakfast and we were able to visit with her a few minutes more. On the way into Derby we saw literally dozens and perhaps hundreds of kangaroos out in the coolness of the pre-dawn hours. I don't see how they can subsist on that very poor looking country but there they were and extremely healthy, too.

Wesley stayed with us at the airport until 6:30 and then went on to his distant station. We had a very interesting three days and very active ones they were. It was a privilege to have been able to see the country and we were most fortunate to have been able to visit the Roddys. We will never be able to repay them for their kind hospitality.

On first stop was the city of Broome. The damage of a recent windstorm was visible from the air as we came into land. We were not on the ground very long. Leaving Broome to the south we paralleled the coast for many miles. We flew over water for a long way and could see the beautiful white beach that is aptly called "Eighty Mile Beach." Art Linkletter has a station that fronts "Eighty Mile Beach" in its entirety and thus he can say he has the longest private beach in the world.

We made one more stop in the 1300 mile distance to Perth at Port Hedland which is a very active place because of the mining developments there. We considered staying there for a day or two but decided to go on to Perth.

Visibility was good and our altitude was not so great but that we could observe the terrain as we flew over the final hundreds of miles. We arrived at Perth just at noon. It was cloudy and quite cool, a very welcome change from the heat of the place we had just left.
