4- Television Sets Taken In Burglary Here

Newton Radio & TV is planning an open house event at the new location, 310 Main Street in downtown Abernathy, Friday and Saturday, Feb. 25 and 26, and they plan to give away merchandise in the retail amount of \$451.82 in drawings Saturday. Originally planned as their first open house at 310 Main, the event this weekend will have to be tabbed as their second "open house." Burglars staged their own "open house" at Newton's about 11 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 16, by breaking out the glass door at the front of the building. The burglars' "prizes" were four new RCA portable television sets, one a color set, with a total retail value of \$735.10. The loss was not insured. Local police and the county sheriff department are investigating the case.

City Council Meeting Held

The City Council opened bids for proposed runway lighting at their regular February meeting. They received three bids on the project, all of which were more than double the amount allocated by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. It will be difficult to accomplish the project at this time if these bids represent a true cost figure. Action on the project has been tabled pending further investigation.

An ordinance to annex that section in the southeast corner of the City known as the East Davis, Graham's, Stoneham Oil Co., Mobil Station area was read and an ordinance passed setting the date of Tuesday, Feb. 29, at 7:30 p.m. for a public hearing on the proposal. The hearing will be held at the City Hall.

The Council was pleased to note that the City Tax collections stood at 93 1/2% for 1971. This figure is the highest in the last 15 years. This plus the fact that a very high percentage of the large past-due taxes has been collected has eased what could have been a financial bind that many cities in our area are experiencing.

The American Tank and Tower Co. will make an inspection of the water tower in the near future and will give the Council an estimate at that time as to the cost of painting the tower. This will be done if all the details can be worked out.

A report by the Texas State Department of Health relative to our Public Health Supply and our municipal disposal site were discussed and possible solutions and remedies of the discrepancies listed. None indicated that our facilities or water supply are below standards. Most were things that are under the category of updating and bringing up to present day standards.

It was decided to purchase a new police car. Bids will be received at the March Council meeting from the two local new car dealers.

The Council expressed a strong desire to have as much street paving done this next summer as is possible. They instructed the City Manager to contact as many interested citizens as possible and to assist in any possible way to get the work done. They agreed to pay that portion of the total cost that covered the entire intersection and in front of the alley. This represents more than 30% of the overall cost of a street. All interested parties are urged to contact the city manager and sign a petition asking the paving to be included in the next project.

The upcoming City Council election was discussed and the three members, M. S. Stevens, Billy Shipman, and J. L. Miller, Jr., were urged to consider running for re-election. They will make their intentions known in the not-too-distant future. The deadline for filing is March 1, 1972. Anyone interested in running may pick up the form necessary for filing at the City Hall.

Girl Scouts in the 18-County Council will be selling the cookies through March 11, and the price will be \$1.00 per box, but this year a new family-size box is being sold and the larger boxes will provide more Council profits for building and improving Camp Rio Blanco northeast of Crosbyton, the cookie chairman explained.

Profits from the sale are divided between the troops and the Council. Camp Rio Blanco is for the entire Council and summer sessions begin in June. 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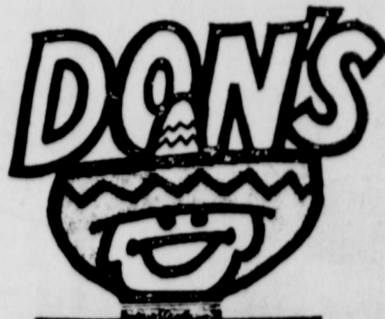

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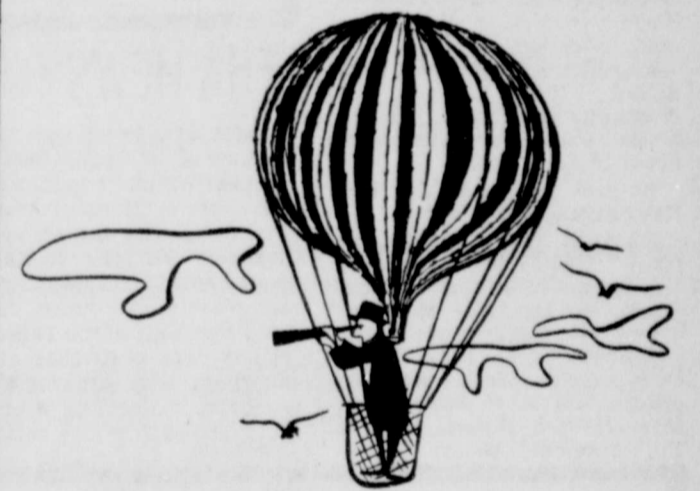
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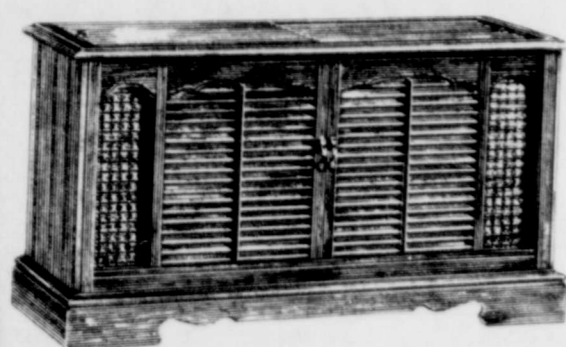

years, the lake has accumulated a lot of water during August and September that has carried us into the following season. We like to water early in the year in January and February. We feel that water applied this time of year shows us lots of results later in the season," he said.

Besides combining of water, the draining of the other two lakes provide Lovelace with extra acreage for grazing cattle. "The more severe this water problem gets, the more we are going to have to diversify and raise more cattle," he stated.

He estimates that his playa lake furnished water for 160 acres last year.

Other soil and water conservation practices Lovelace uses include terracing sloping hillsides. "We are planning more terraces and would like much more grass for cover, especially on the slopes. I also believe that crop rotation pays big dividends," he said.

Lovelace farms a section in Hale County, 850 acres in Lubbock County and in partnership with Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, farms an additional 1,500 acres.

Lovelace is a born farmer. His father moved to a farm west of Lubbock in 1925. They moved to the Abemathy area in 1937 and moved into Hale County in 1955.

He and his wife, Amy, have four children--Jo Ann, a school teacher in Hawaii; Gary, a farmer with his father; David, a senior at Abemathy High School; and Dorinda, 15, a freshman at AHS. They attend the Baptist church in which Lovelace is active as a lay minister.

He is a member of the Abemathy Masonic Lodge and has served as an Abemathy school trustee for 13 years.

Looking ahead, Lovelace said the days are past when a farmer could make it on a few chickens and cows. "Today it takes more management to make it go... and the weather --it's always the weather," he mused.

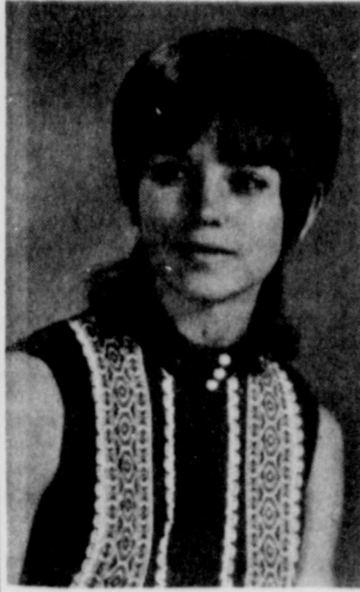
