Besides combining of water, the draining of the other two lakes provide Lovelace with extra acreage for grazing cattle. "The more severe this water problem gets, the more we are going to have to diversify and raise more cattle," he stated.

He estimates that his playa lake furnished water for 160 acres last year.

Other soil and water conservation practices Lovelace uses include terracing sloping hillsides. "We are planning more terraces and would like much more grass for cover, especially on the slopes. I also believe that crop rotation pays big dividends," he said.

Top Conservation Lovelace farms a section in Hale County, 850 acres in Lub-bock County and in partnership with Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, farms an additional 1, 500 acres.


