Representative Jones formally announced that he has filed for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives from District #76, which includes all of Hale and Swisher counties and the east half of Lubbock county.

A 48 year old farmer, Jones owns land in Hale (21 years), Lamb (12 years), Hockley (8 years), and Lubbock (8 years) counties. He has his land rented out, and devotes full time to the job of State Representative. He is serving his 5th year as a member of the Board of Trustees for the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

Representative Jones is married to the former Rita Womack of Olton, Texas. They have two

children, a son, Lanny, age 21 and a daughter, Melodie, age 19. Both children are students at Texas Tech.

Jones is seeking his 5th term as member of the Legislature and is presently #38 in seniority in this body of 150. He has come to be recognized as "Mr. Agriculture" by his colleagues because of his dedicated interest in agricultural legislation. He is presently chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Southern Council of States Governments. This is an affiliation of Representatives from the Legislatures of 15 Southern states of the U.S. He was chosen "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" by the Progressive Farmer Publication in 1969. This honor was awarded because of his successful agricultural legislation which included:

- Cottonseed Breeders Rights--for the first time in our nation, a breeder of a new variety of cottonseed in Texas has protection similar to a patent;
- Commodity Assessment District--this permits farmers to assess themselves on the sales of certain commodities as a means of jointly funding research, promotion, disease and insect control, or predator control for the commodity assessed;
- Annual Statistical Data--provided for the publication of current statistical data related to Texas production and values of crops each year;
- Farm Tax Valuation--this Constitutional Amendment provides that farm land located in high commercial value areas shall be taxed at the farmland value so long as it is operated as a farm and is not subdivided for other uses;
- Textile Research Center at Texas Tech--the funding of this project was a major success of his second term in office;
- Swine Research Center at Texas Tech--this was accomplished under his leadership during his third term in office.

His other legislative accomplishments include authorship of the Texas Tech Medical School, funding the Law School and The State School for Retarded, authorization of the Hale County Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center of Plainview, creation of the 137th District Court of Lubbock, creation of the Criminal District Attorney's Office in Lubbock, author of the special \$60 per year LPG tax for farm pick-ups which eliminated the keeping of receipts in the vehicle.

He is presently serving as vice-chairman of the committee on school finance which is to resolve the problem created by the recent Federal Court ruling on School Ad Valorem taxes. He is chairman of the Redistricting Committee which must re-district the Texas Congressional Districts, and Texas House of Representatives Districts by July, 1973. He is a member of the following committees: Agriculture, Elections, Mental Health and Mental Retardation, and Governmental Affairs.

Representative Jones pledged to continue his full time representation of the people of District #76 in the Legislature if re-elected.

The Abernathy FFA-4H Project Show will be held March 6 and 7 at the Service Grain Company's south barn. Harvey Lutrick, General Superintendent, has set Saturday, March 6, as work day for barn cleaning and preparation.

Approximately 250 animals are expected for the two day event. Weigh-in activities will begin at 2 p.m. Monday, March 6, and continue until 7 p.m. Judging will begin at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, March 7, and follow this order: Gilts, Barrows, Lambs, and Steers. There will be a supper break prior to the steer judging.

The following rules and regulations will govern the show:

- I. OWNERSHIP:
 - A. All Swine and Beef Cattle breeding stock shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year.
 - B. All Swine and Lambs shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year.
 - C. All Steers must be owned prior to December 1 of each year.
- II. SIFTING: The General Superintendent and the division superintendent shall have the authority to sift any undesirable or questionable animals entered in the show.
- III. CLASSIFICATION: The superintendent of each division shall set up the classes in the manner that they wish, which will be for the betterment of the show.
- IV. LOSS OR INJURY TO EXHIBITOR OR ANIMALS: The Abernathy Project Show shall not be responsible for any injury or loss to Exhibitor or his animal/animals while incurred at the show.

- V. WEIGHTS:
 - Steers--750-1150 lbs.
 - Barrows--180-240 lbs. with 10 lb. tolerance.
 - Lambs--75-120 lbs. with 5 lb. tolerance.
 - Gilts--170 lbs. minimum
- VI. JUDGES: Jess Holloway, Livestock Coach, LCC. The Vocational Agriculture Teachers and County Agent shall select the judges and submit their names to Board of Directors for their acceptance.
- VII. NUMBER OF ENTRIES:
 - Steers--No limit
 - Lambs--No limit
 - Barrows--4 per exhibitor
 - Breeding Gilts--5 per exhibitor

Pete Laney Is Candidate For Representative

Hale County farmer James E. (Pete) Laney Wednesday announced he will be a candidate for state representative for District 76 in the May 6 Democratic primary.

Laney's announcement came a day after Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview said he would not seek re-election.

A lifelong resident of Hale County, Laney resigned his post as Hale County Democratic chairman shortly after his announcement.

Discussing his candidacy, he said, "By being located in a central part of the district and being a lifelong resident of Hale County, I believe I would be able to keep in close touch with the needs and wishes of residents in the area."

Laney lives about 14 miles southwest of Plainview. The 76th District now includes Swisher and Hale Counties and the eastern part of Lubbock County.

Commenting on the race, Laney said he would support legislative reform, revision of the 100-year-old Texas constitution and a workable water import plan for Texas.

The 29-year-old candidate is married to the former Nelda McQueen of Plainview. The couple has two children, Kalya, 5, and Jamey, 3. They attend the Church of Christ.

A graduate of Hale Center High School, Laney attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock, where he received a bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics. While at Tech, Laney was a student senator, a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity and currently is district representative for Swisher and Hale Counties on the Tech ex-students council.

A 32nd degree Mason and Shriner, Laney is a director of the Hale County Soil and Water Conservation District, a secretary of the South Plains Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, a member of the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce, and the Texas Flying Farmers.

He is vice chairman of the Member Service Committee of South Plains Electric Co-operative and served on the Committee of 500 for the Texas Water Plan.

Employed for that position is Charles Birdsong, who will come here in June from Wylie, Collin County, Texas. First and foremost it costs a considerable amount of money to have streets paved. This is just like everything else, the cost is going to be a great deal higher than it was a few years ago. Couple this with the fact that everything the city buys and does costs much more and all the while we have tried to maintain the tax rate and utility costs at the lowest possible figure.

complication for those who have severely limited incomes and low valued or unimproved property. The city just does not have the surplus cash available to pay any individual's assessment and allow them pay at some future date. The city will continue to pay for the cost of the intersection and in front of the alley. This amounts to over 30 percent of the total cost for the entire street so the city will still be very much involved in the cost of the project as a whole. We are most anxious to hear from anyone who is interested in getting some paving done. We will be here to make any information that we may have available to anyone. If there

are questions perhaps we can help clear them up. One thing though that all should understand is that everybody who owns property on the street that desires paving must be prepared to pay their share. We would assume that the privilege of paying 1/3 per year for a three-year period would be available to those who chose this manner of paying.

Our suggested plan of action for anyone desiring to get a paving project would be to come to the City Hall, pick up a petition form, take it to their neighbors who would be participating in the project, and get their signature on the petition. If we can be of any assistance in explaining the program, we will be happy to call, write or go with you to talk with them. It will be necessary to get the signature of every affected property owner to get the street included in the project.

Please feel free to come by the office or call for any information you may need or assistance we may be able to provide. The paving is needed badly in most areas that are unpaved. There is nothing that can be done to improve the area even semi-permanently except Class A paving with curb and gutter like the surrounding area has as the present time. If you have had mud and mess before you will have it again until the above action is taken. Your property value will be greatly enhanced and your place will be so much more livable you will wonder how you got by so long without the paving.

Summer will soon be here so please take action on this at the earliest possible date. We want to help but you must instigate the action.

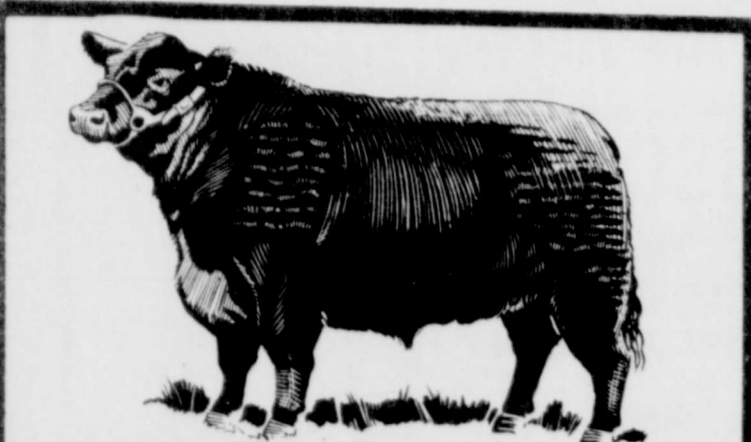

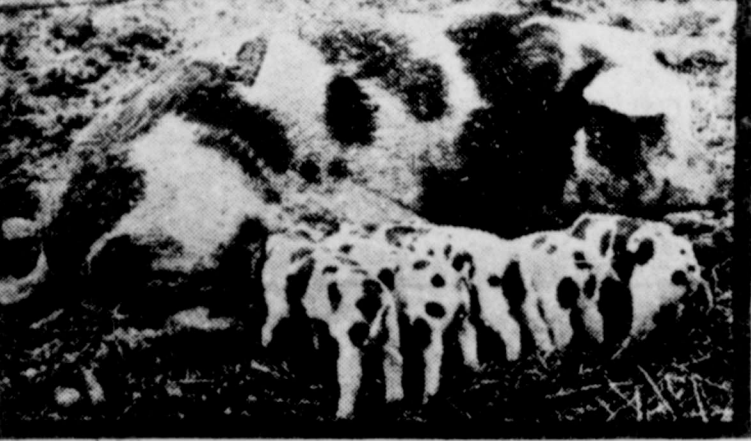
