We had a fine young man from Lubbock Christian College at our Lions Club last week and among other things, he made a statement that we think really fits the situation in which a city government many times finds itself. He was talking about individuals who succeed and he said the most important ten two-letter words that have been found together in the English language are, "If it is to be, it is up to me." Think on that for a few minutes and then think again of our city.

Does the street in front of your home turn into a quagmire when it rains or the weather is bad? Would you like to have it paved? We would just love to include it in a project with many others that are in the same shape in our city. We would be happy to start tomorrow but first someone must do what we can't accomplish. A petition must be signed by the property owner to indicate his desire to have it and willingness to pay his share. Could you suggest a place where those who are short of capital could get the money if they desired to go that route? Next fall when the rains come will you smile happily as you drive down your new pavement? The answer to your questions must come from you and it is, "If it is to be, it is up to me."

Are there other improvements or changes you would like to see that would improve our already fine city? Maybe they wouldn't cost any money. Maybe they are just attitudes or social changes that can come only after a long, hard year of carefully setting an example for those who would follow your lead and do as you do because you are their secret ideal. Will we ever respect each other for what we are instead of condemn each other because we are not alike in every way. TALK IN PRINT

In recent weeks, four children who reside in Southeast Abernathy have been bitten by rats that invade their homes at night. The county health departments of Lubbock and Hale should start a rat eradication drive here before someone is badly bitten and/or contracts a serious disease from rat bites.

Last summer, the Lockney area reported a large number of rabid skunks. That could happen in this area. The counties should have trappers or skunk hunters to help reduce the population of the stinkers. Dog and cat owners are urged to get rabies shots for their pets before skunk season this year.

The United States Supreme Court heard arguments pro and con concerning the legality of the death sentence as punishment for crimes. The Court's decision isn't expected until June. I predict that the Court will rule against capital punishment. One factor in the Court's decision, I believe, will be the more than 600 prisoners over the United States that have been sentenced to death. The States have been awaiting a ruling from the Supreme Court before carrying out the sentences of death. The Court, I believe, will be reluctant to uphold capital punishment due to the large number of persons already sentenced to death for crimes. Killing over 600 prisoners in rapid fire fashion after a ruling upholding capital punishment would be termed "human slaughter" by Americans and the world.

The only reason I've ever favored capital punishment was the hope that it would be a deterrent to major crimes. Apparently, the possibility of drawing a death sentence does not stop criminals from their savage acts. A life sentence with no possibility of parole might be more of a deterrent to crime. Also, there should not be a mandatory death sentence for hijackers of airplanes. If the skyjacker knew that he faced a certain death sentence if caught, he might say, "Man, I'm already a dead duck, so I'll take the rest of you with me... down we go."

I don't like to bring this up, but some may remember that this column last year predicted that Ralph Yarborough would be the next governor of Texas. At that time, I thought he would run for governor rather than be a candidate for U.S. Senator. Well, that's one 1972 political year prediction down the drain.

Klatt on Honor Roll at S. Ross

ALPINE, Tex.--More than 300 students enrolled at Sul Ross State University for the fall semester have qualified for the Dean's List, the University announced.

Dr. Delbert Dyke, vice president for academic affairs, said 338 students, about 12.9 per cent of last semester's enrollment, earned grade point averages above 3.0 or "B" on a 4.0 scale.

He said 162 of the students on the honor list earned grade points better than 3.5, with 30 students completing the semester with 4.0, or all "A" averages.

Dr. Dyke explained only full-time students carrying at least 15 semester hour loads could qualify for the Dean's List. He also noted that in any semester no more than 15 per cent of the total enrollment could be named to the Honor Roll.

Named to the Dean's List and Honor Roll was Robert H. Klatt, 3.1 GPA. He is a son of Bob Klatt of Abernathy, and is a graduate of AHS.

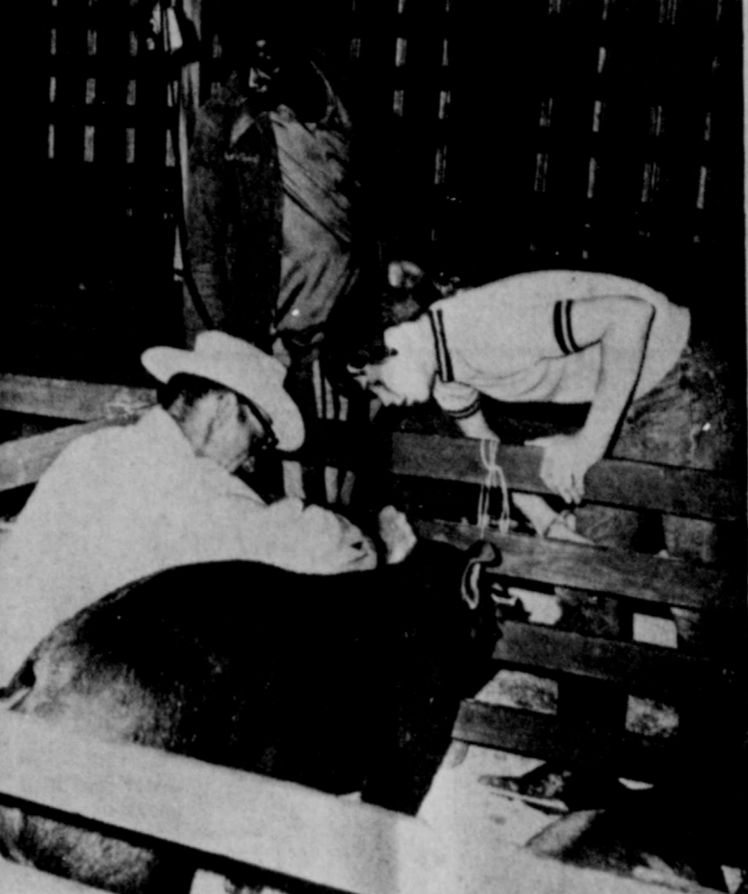

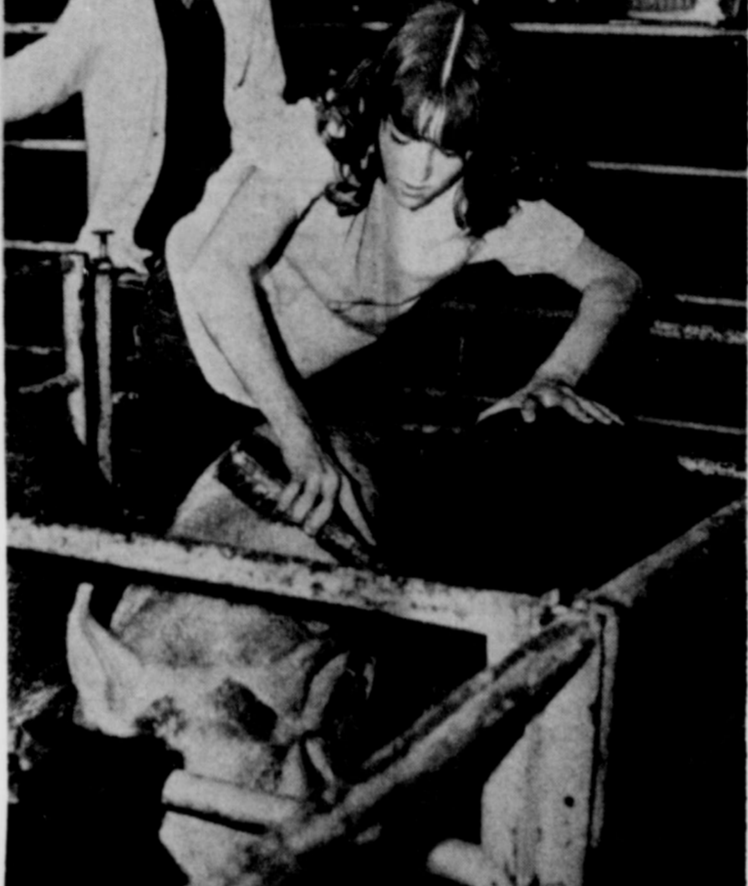
