

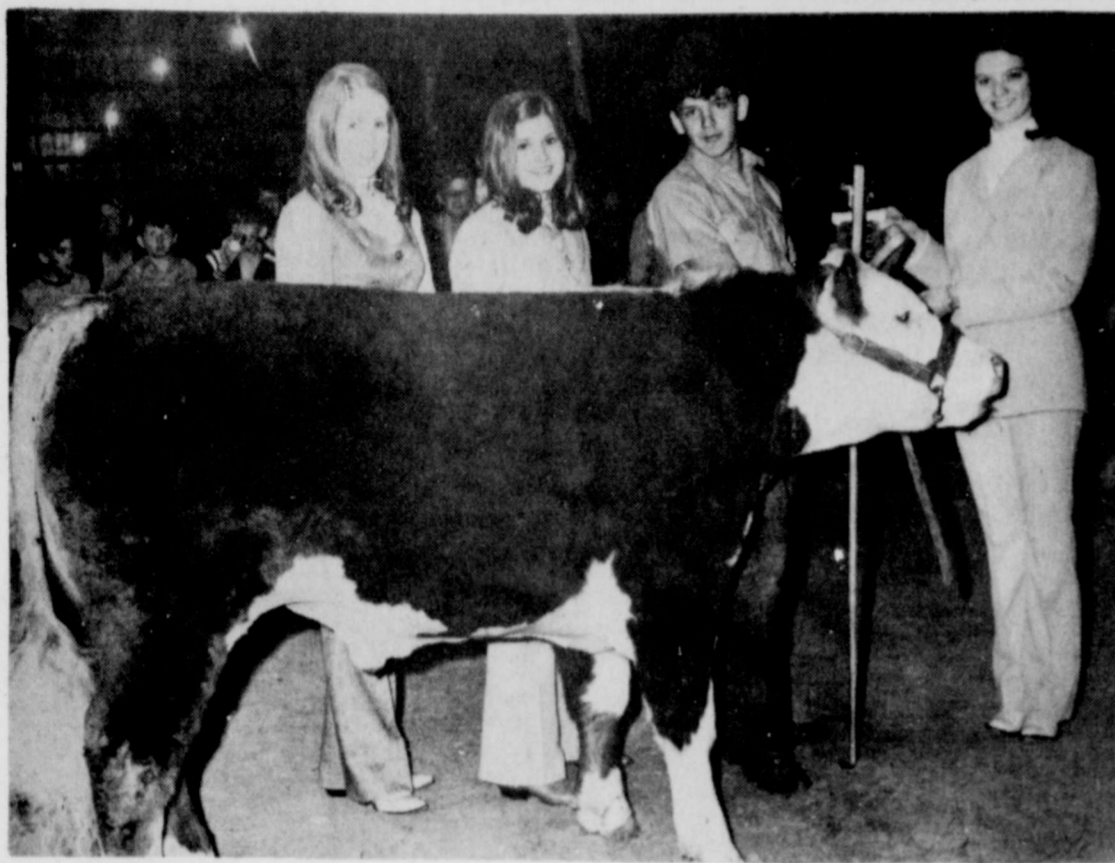

Winners Picked At Abernathy

Some 220 exhibitors took to the show ring Tuesday, March 7, during Abernathy's annual FFA-4-H Project Show, held in the Service Grain and Elevator barns. Three divisions of animals were shown: swine, lambs, and steers.

Jeff Oswalt's crossbred gilt was named Grand Champion of the show by judge Jess Holloway of Lubbock Christian College. Steve Oswalt, Jeff's cousin, placed his duroc gilt in the reserve placing. It was another crossbred owned by Melinda Huffaker which won the Grand Champion barrow trophy. Larry Lutrick's duroc was selected as Reserve Champion barrow.

Carla James showed the Champion Medium Wool lamb and Becky Adams showed the Reserve Medium Wool. In the Fine Wool crosses, Jimmy Thomas exhibited the Champion and Robert Scott placed the Reserve champ. Mike Nelson's fine wool was named Champion and Johnny Morgan showed the Reserve fine wool. Champion and Reserve Southdown were Carla James and Martha Montgomery, respectively.

It was Mark Hobgood's 913 pound Hereford that won the Grand Champion Trophy in the Steer division. Larry Lutrick's light weight Angus placed as Reserve Champion Steer.

Mike Nelson received the Chris Benn award, presented by the local Lion's Club, for his showmanship and work in the show and with show officials. The showmanship awards for the three divisions were: Swine, Martha Montgomery; Sheep, Pat Bundick; and Steers, Larry Lutrick.

In the 17 classes of swine exhibited during the show, breed champions are as follows: Tim Myatt showed the champion Chester gilt and his sister, Sharla, the reserve; Steve Oswalt placed his duroc gilt as breed champ and Doug Rogers was reserve; Champion Hampshire gilt was shown by Tim Myatt and Audy Corning showed the reserve; the champion and reserve cross were shown by Jeff and Debbie Oswalt, respectively; Sharla Myatt showed the Champion Chester barrow and Biff Wade the reserve; Duroc barrow breed champion was Larry Lutrick and Torie Adams, reserve; Melinda Huffaker, and Steve Oswalt placed Champion and Reserve hampshires respectively; the Champion Poland barrow was Becky Adams and Cheryl Rogers was reserve; Spotted Poland breed champion was Denise Rhodes and reserve, Ken Davenport; and Breed Champion in the crossbred barrows was Melinda Huffaker and reserve, Audy Corning.

There were 138 gilts and barrows shown, 73 lambs, and 11 steers in the Abernathy show. All ribbons and trophies awarded to the winners were donated by the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce.

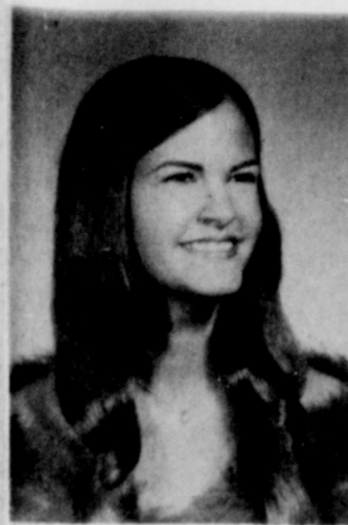

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS MEETING

The Board of Education of Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session March 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room of the High School. Those in attendance were: L. J. West, President; Billie Harrison, vice-president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; Lou Carmickle; David Pinson; Joe Oswalt; Bob Riley; Earl Carter, Business Manager; Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent; and staff members--Gid Anderson, Jerry Moorhead, Frank Bartlett, and Curtis Davenport.

In regular session, the Board appointed personnel for the 1972-73 school year. In other action, bills payable were approved by the Board; the tax report showed 97.75% of the current roll as having been collected; the enrollment report was studied which showed a decrease of 23 students from the previous month. Enrollment as of March 6th was 1136.

The Board approved the recommendations of the Textbook Committee and adopted new books for 1972 in the following areas: reading, grades 1-3; Social Studies, grades 1-6; Junior High Texas History; Advanced Texas History; Music, elementary grades; English, grades 11 & 12; Driver Education for high school; Consumer and Related Math. These new books will be delivered during the summer and distributed at the beginning of the coming school year.

The Board studied the recommended Economic Index and Local Fund Assignment for Hale and Lubbock Counties for 1972-73. The Economic Index decreased for the year but the Local Fund Assignment will be up because of the increase in cost of education.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be April 3, at 7:30 p.m.

DELEGATES TO TSTA MEETING

Three Abernathy-area educators will be official, voting delegates at the 93rd annual state convention of the Texas State Teachers Association March 16-18 in the San Antonio Convention Center.

They are among the 1,390 TSTA local association members who have been certified as representatives to the 1972 House of Delegates, which will meet twice at the convention to discuss and act on proposed amendments to the TSTA Constitution and other business.

The official delegates are elected from the 459 TSTA local associations throughout the state. They are certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members of fraction of 100. Every local association is entitled to at least one official delegate.

With total statewide membership in TSTA at a record 146,000 this year, attendance at the convention is expected to exceed 10,000.

Featured speakers will be Glenn Olds of Kent, Ohio, president of Kent State University, and Max Lerner of Waltham, Mass., a professor of American civilization and institutions at Brandeis University.

CITY LIMITS EXTENDED BY ANNEXATION

The regular City Council meeting for March saw the annexation of the Earl Davis, Stoneham Oil Co. property in the southeast portion of the city finalized. This includes Graham's Restaurant, Abernathy Mobil Station, and Annie's Drive-in plus some residents. The addition of this area will certainly be a big plus to the city and will give the owners many additional services that have previously been a problem.

Two bids for a new police car were received and opened. Both were rejected. Invitations to rebid will be extended to the two new car dealers on a different basis. Others will be invited to bid.

The water tower will be repainted on the outside in the near future. Some ideas to give the local athletic teams proper recognition on the tower were discussed and will be incorporated in the project when it is done.

The City Manager was instructed to start a program of requiring a permit before any mobile home can be permanently placed on any lot in the city. The need for further regulations on this type of residence was aired and work will be started immediately drafting some sort of regulations as to where mobile homes will be allowed and not be allowed to be located.

A rat control program has been initiated. Persons needing rat or mouse poison can obtain it free through the fine cooperation of Lubbock County at the Bethel Baptist Church. The Abernathy Neighborhood Center is sponsoring the local distribution. The Lubbock County Health Department will deliver fresh bait each week to the location and, in this way, a new supply will always be available. The Council was most appreciative of this service as the material will help eliminate a health hazard before it gets out of hand.

Other routine business was conducted. The airport was discussed but no formal action taken. The Civil Defense program was explained and it appears to be in good shape. A training program for the storm-watchers is underway and this, together with other things being done by the city's volunteer fire department, assures us of maximum protection during the upcoming storm season.

The street program was reviewed for the approaching summer season. The number of signers on petitions for paving were checked and it is apparent that many more will need to indicate their willingness to participate if we are going to be able to get the work done that the Council had anticipated. Property owners are urged to pick up a petition and get it signed for their block immediately.

FIRE LEVELS CENTURY-OLD NECHANITZ STORE BUILDING

SCENES AT NECHANITZ STORE, MOBILE HOME FIRE

The photo at top shows all that remained of the 125-year-old Matejowsky Store at Nechanitz following the mid-day fire Sunday. Four fire departments answered the call, but the building was too far gone by the time they got to the scene. Lower photos show the badly charred mobile home, which was located just to the rear of the store building. Much of the contents, including a color TV set, were removed, however, before it was hit by the blaze.



Mobile Home Also Guttred Sunday Noon

The old Matejowsky Store at Nechanitz, together with all of its contents, was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin at noon Sunday. It was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Matejowsky. Also badly gutted by the fire was a two-bedroom mobile home at the rear of the store. It was occupied by the James Bramblett family, son-in-law and daughter of the Marvin Matejowskys. Some furniture items and clothing were saved from the home, however.

The store building was one of the few century-old business structures in Fayette County still in regular use, and carried a line of groceries, meats, feed and cold drinks, and also contained many items of an antique nature. It had been under ownership of the Matejowsky family for more than 100 years. Members of the Marvin Matejowsky family, who live nearby, were the first to see smoke drifting from the west side of the building and called in the

alarm at 11:30 a. m. Firemen and equipment from Warrenton, La Grange, Round Top and Ledbetter responded to the call, but the old frame building was in full flame by the time of their arrival. However, firefighters wetted down and saved the large Marvin Matejowsky home, a scant 50 yards away and in the path of flying embers. Joe Matejowsky, who lived just across F-M Road 2145 from the store, said he arose early Sunday morning and went to his

place of business to replenish the cold drink box and attended to a few other chores, after which he and his wife drove to Austin to visit. He was fishing on Lake Austin when a messenger brought word that his store was on fire. The building, more than 125 years old according to best available records, was acquired in 1867 by Wencil Matejowsky, an immigrant from Bohemia. He became a well known merchant and cotton buyer of the community, and also served in the 20th Texas Legislature, the first to hold his session in the new capitol building at Austin. A son, Charles, followed as owner and later Marvin and Joe, cousins, were the co-proprietors until the latter bought his partner's interest. The old structure also housed the Nechanitz post office for 73 years with the postmasterhip in the Matejowsky family throughout its operation. The facility was closed by Post Office Department order a number of years ago. It also was a popular center of community activities, such as March of Dimes box suppers and other social gatherings. Amount of the loss, not covered by insurance, has not been determined, the owner said. He added that he plans to rebuild. The mobile home loss, which was insured, also was not immediately ascertained.

The societies also function to better professional relations and communications between all branches of the medical profession and the laymen.

In November of 1970 he accepted the challenge to develop a Pharmacy Department for the new St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock and become its first Director of Pharmacy Services. He developed and staffed the department at St. Mary's into a functioning integral part of the hospital operation. In June 1971, he requested that Sister Maurine, Administrator of St. Mary's, promote his assistant, John Todd, to the directorship of the Pharmacy Department and accept his own resignation so that he could return to Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center and rejoin Bob Brown as pharmacist in that complex.

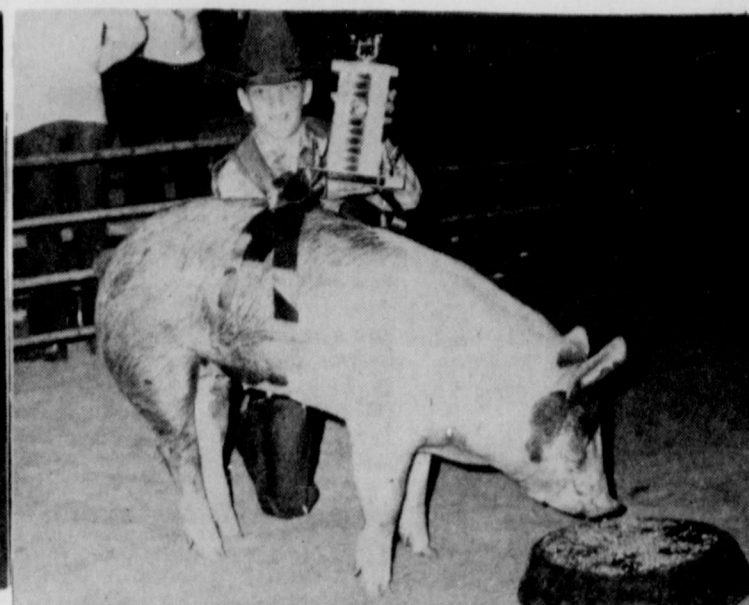

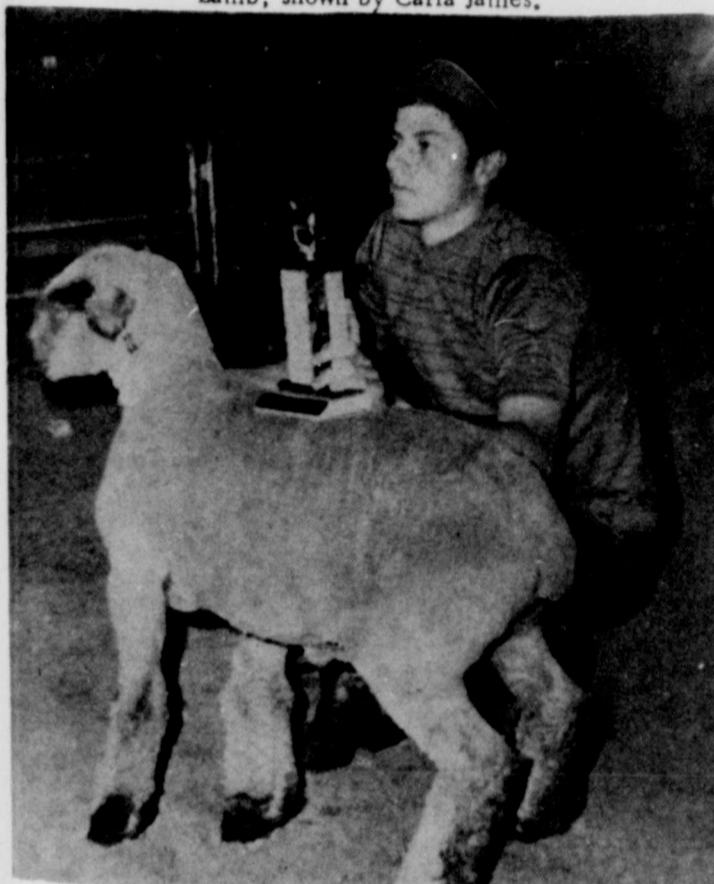

We read an article recently in a trade magazine where a city at least ten times as big as we had two as proud that they had two electron beeper-type radio receivers in their city for their Civil Defense people to use. Well, if they were entitled to be proud, and they were, then we should be popping buttons all over the place. Our fine volunteer Fire Department has 35 of these and our Chief of Police Frank Russell has one, so we now have 36 that are literally scattered all over town. There is just not a section of town that does not have one. You can get instant information from a neighbor who is a fireman. We know we will be able to give our city better protection now that we have added this equipment.

In addition to this, we have a kind of super organization within the fire department that is designated as the "Search and Rescue Squad." They work together with the Civil Defense set up in our city. These ten men plus our entire police department plus Marvin Patterson and Rickie Cox from our public works department make up a storm-watching crew that we challenge anyone in a city our size to match for dedication and loyalty toward protecting our city. We use every city unit that is equipped with a radio plus some privately owned. We have a planned operation. We don't just wander around. Of course, we, like any volunteer organization, must be flexible. Storms don't wait for everyone to be off work before they come. But most of us know the overall picture and can fill in wherever needed.

The siren will be used, as in the past, for alerting all citizens. We just know that the plectron plus for us in getting the word to us as many as possible. We trust that we will be able to avert anyone getting hurt in a case of a storm, but storms have a way of just popping out of nowhere into our back yard before any sign or signal can be given. This, there is no way to avoid. Remember how little time any one had in Lubbock last year, and they have hundreds of ways of getting and sending information where we have one.
