New Deal Sets City Election

Voters in the city limits of New Deal will vote Saturday, April 1, to elect a Mayor, five Councilmen and a City Marshal. The Mayor and City Councilmen have served since the city was organized about two years ago.

Voters will mark ballots in the city election to be held in the New Deal High School building Saturday, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Mrs. C. L. Martin, City Secretary, will be the election judge, and will be assisted by Archie Acker and Mrs. Cleo Hess.

Billy Fortenberry, the first mayor of New Deal, is not seeking re-election. There will be no name on the ballot for that office, and a mayor will be elected by write-in votes.

T. J. (Red) Attebury, the Place 2 city councilman, is not seeking re-election. That council position will have to be filled by write-in votes.

Robert Shrophshire is not seeking re-election as city councilman, Place 4. There is one candidate on the ticket for city councilman, Place 4. David Pineda is seeking that post.

City Councilmen seeking re-election in the April 1 ballot are Clayton Teeter, Place 1; Berli Robertson, Place 3; and Ray West, Place 5.

Clarence Martin is a candidate for city marshal. This post has been vacant since the death of City Marshal Ray Williams.

Rough Weather Season Coming

(By Morris Wilkes)

Violent storms of spring and summer are a part of life here on the high plains of Texas, and Abernathy lies in the heart of the so-called tornado country. The purpose of this article is to give information on types of severe storms, the system of issuing warnings, and what to do when severe storms approach.

SEVERE STORMS

Severe thunderstorms accompanied by high winds, hail, heavy rains, and possibly tornadoes are small and short-lived weather phenomena which are the most difficult to forecast.

They begin as great cumulonimbus clouds built by unstable conditions in the lower atmosphere.

Like most storms, thunderstorms run on heat energy converted into wind, electrical discharge (lightning), and violent upward motion of the air. Severe storms may develop from local heating of the ground or radiation cooling of cloud tops -- anything which puts dense, colder air above warm, moist, less-dense air.

These disturbances are most severe when they occur along squall lines, which are generated when cold, dense air and warm, moist air fight along boundaries called fronts. The greater contrast in temperatures and moisture across the front, the greater the energy content and a more violent thunderstorm.

Thunderstorms may extend from near the surface into the stratosphere and may blot out the sun. The darker the sky, the greater the vertical extent of the cloud, and more severe the storm.

One can tell something about a thunderstorm's severity by observing the intensity of its rain, strength of its winds, heavy lightning, and the size of hail. These factors usually mean the storm is severe and dangerous.

TORNADOES

Tornadoes are storms of short duration formed by winds rotating at very high speeds. When a tornado touches ground, the outer ring of rotating winds becomes dark with dust and debris and a loud roar is heard.

These small storms form during warm, humid, unsettled weather, and usually in conjunction with a severe thunderstorm. Tornadoes generally occur in the middle and late afternoon, when a warm day is at its warmest.

PUBLIC WARNING SYSTEM OF SEVERE WEATHER

It is not possible to predict exactly when and where tornadoes and severe storms will occur. However, it is possible to predict general areas where they are likely to occur.

This function is performed by the National Weather Service's National Severe Storm

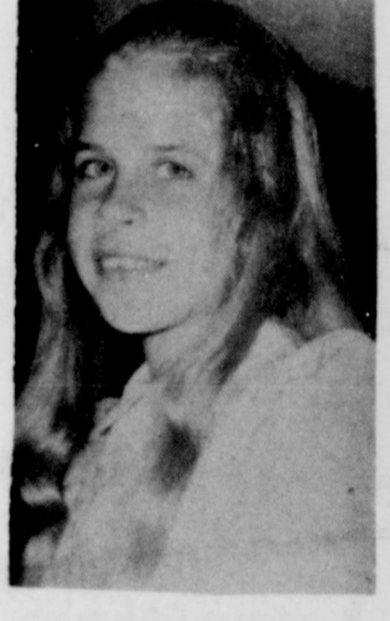

Naturally the ideal situation is to have some of both. It is wonderful when we are fortunate enough to find this sort of people to run.
