From The Desk of the City Manager

It is hard to believe but the mosquito season is here again. We sprayed for the first time last week and this sort of thing is like milking a cow, if you ever start it, you have to keep it up. But it is our firm belief that it is many times easier to prevent a buildup of these pests rather than control or eliminate one after it is established. So we will be coming around more or less regularly each week. It is not yet known whether the State Health Department and Hale County Commissioners will be dusting this year as they have in the past. We truly hope so for this is a tremendous help to our very limited budget.

By alternating our liquid spraying program with that of their dusting program, we were modestly successful in keeping the pests under control last summer and fall. This keeps the mosquitos from building up too much resistance to any one kind of insecticide and increases the effeciency and kill of those that we do use. Tell your commissioner that you appreciate their help in this vital operation. He will certainly be pleased at your thoughtfulness and there is nothing more satisfying than knowing that your efforts are noted and approved. We are directly involved with several commissioners due to our location astraddle of the county line. We have found all of them to be cooperative and quick to respond to our needs. This certainly is not the case with some other agencies, so we are more than just aware of their kindness. We tip our collective hats to each of you individually and to all of you as a group. Thanks and many thanks for a job well done.

We are a little hesitant to repeat our call for people to step forward that want paving done this summer. We sure do not mean to wear either you or the subject out, but we have only a couple of very small paving projects requested and time is fast running out if we are going to get it done this year. We need as much as possible to do to keep the unit price reasonably within the ballpark within the reach of all. If you are not sure about your situation please call us and we will quickly check it out for you. There is still time to pick up a blank petition form at the city hall and get your neighbors to sign it with you. The City plans to participate in the cost as in the past, so please do not let

this opportunity escape. It is difficult to visualize all this dust turning into instant mud when it rains, but that is exactly what happens. I distinctly remember some folks getting stuck last year who have not requested paving. We would think that they would have been lined up waiting for the door to open. But like we said, some of us just have convenient memories and quickly dismiss any unpleasantness from our minds when the situation changes. We are no good at ducking, so we will never say "I told you so", but "as sure as shootin" the rains will come and with them the mud that makes our dirt streets miserable. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the appli-cation was not filed with the receiving school by the June I deadline.



Hale Has **1310 Farms**

Hale county showed a total of 1,310 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,273.

Of the county's total farms

in 1969, 1,178 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agriculture products in the year, as The report also shows aver-

age farm size in the county was 554.4 acres, and average value of these farms (land and build-

ings) was \$211,900. Other figures from the report are: I. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$57,112, 653; in 1964, \$61,814,500.

2. Value of all crops sold

\$52,023,358.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$27,141,865; in 1964.

\$9.790,565. Reported for the first time in an agriculture census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agriculture products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, nine of the county's \$2,500 - and - over farms are incorporated.



Need For A Junior College Object of Survey

A study is being conducted in a five county area which includes Abernathy to determine if there is a need for a junior college which offers occupational and technical education or training. The area being surveyed in the study includes, in addition to Abernathy, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Motley, and Swisher counties. The study has been approved and is sponsored by the Division of Occupational Research and Development, Texas Education Agency. Using the name Area Occupational Education Research, the study is being conducted by Perry H. Bell, Project Director, and Thomas J. Krueger, Associate

Director. To accomplish the purposes of the study several groups will be surveyed -- students, employers, parents, and out-ofschool youth. Everyone who receives a survey form in any of the named categories is urged to supply the information requested and return it as soon as possible to facilitate the completion of the study.

High school students are being asked to state their occupational goals; also their desires and expectations for occupational and technical education. School personnel and students are cooperating to the fullest extent. This portion of the survey will soon be com-
