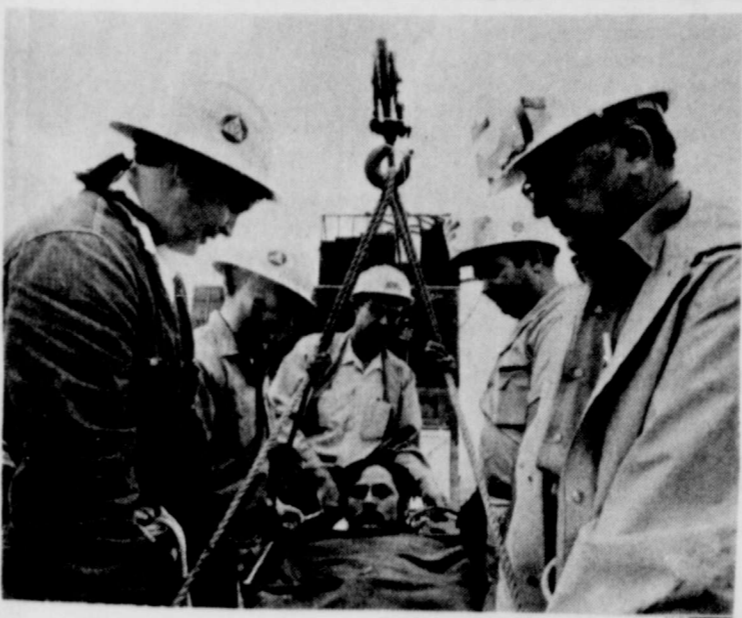
SOCIAL SECURITY REPRESENTATIVE DUE HERE MAY 9
