RESOLUTION AND ORDER CALLING BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTIES OF HALE

ABERNATHY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the ABERNATHY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT is authorized to levy a maintenance tax under the provisions of Article 2784e-1 as the result of an election held within the District on the 2nd day of May , 19 59; and

SCHOOL DISTRICT deems it advisable to issue bonds under the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Texas Education Code by submitting (at an election called for the purpose) the proposition hereinafter

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ABERNATHY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That said election shall be held on the and the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for

 $\underline{\tt SECTION~2:}$ That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than six qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to

OTELA CLEMENTS is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the City Hall in said District, Abernathy, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays

 $\underline{\text{SECTION 3:}}$ That at said election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the ABERNATHY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Hale and Lubbock Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$750,000) for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall t be piedged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?'

SECTION 4: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the fol-

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF'

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified. but do not own taxable property which has been duly mendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election in a newspaper of general circulation

School Bond Election Set Here May 29

In a called meeting Mon-day, May the 15th, the Board of Education set May 29th as the day to submit a \$750,000 bond issue to the voters residin the Abernathy Independent School District.

Action on the resolution by the Board came after months of discussion and study concerning the physical needs of the local school system.

An expression of confidence for issuance of the bond propo-sal was given the board by sixty-eight patrons attending a public meeting Thursday night, May 11th. At this meeting, Mr. Loren West, Board President, chaired the meeting and expressed his appreciation to those attending for showing their interest in the school. He then asked Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent, to make a presentation to the group and to assist in answering questions concerning the proposal.

Dr. Webb shared some vital

educational concerns with the group and asked them to respond to a number of questions that pointed toward individualized instruction. Among the questions asked were these: "Do you believe each child is an individual?", "At what age should a child start to school?", "What is the future of education?" and "How does a child learn?" He then stated that "all students have different needs, wants, desires, expectations, and satisfactions and that the objective of education should be to fulfill, to the best of our ability, each person's potential," and asked, "What is our respon-sibility in meeting these needs?

Dr. Webb stated that as a district, we were not growing but in taking care of the needs of students all available building space had been exhausted. Programs that have been added in recent years include Special Education, Vocational Education for the handicapped, bilingual education, Kindergarten, power mechanics, vocational academic education, journalism, advanced science, advanced math and others. He also told the group a more serious problem existed -- that many of our buildings were in need of repair -- that they were no longer "new", the most recent being 12 years old. It was pointed out that the elementary building that houses the fourth and fifth grades, constructed in 1945, had been examined by architects and, in their opinion, renovation into a modern building would be prohibitive in cost as to the worth of the

building. The point was stressed that new facilities and major repairs are needed and that the needed improvements could be made within the present tax structure. Dr. Webb carefully pointed out that the passage of a bond issue would cause little and very probably no additional cost to the taxpayer, depending en-tirely upon the bond market when the bonds were sold. The superintendent also stressed the fact that his staff could not forecast the future cost of education beyond one year at a time, but stated that should future tax rate increases be necessary, it would be for normal operation and not to pay for the bond issue.

Noting that the \$750,000 would not take care of all of the needs, Dr. Webb said the issue would be adequate to:

Build a new, preferably, underground school to house grades 6, 7 and 8, then move grades 4 and 5 to the present Junior high building.

Build an Academic Center, the heart of which would be a combined Junior-Senior library and have space and some equipment necessary to meet the individual needs and interests of pupils.

Use the remainder of the money, if there is any, to waterproof, not rennovate, the existing 4th and 5th grade building and use it, if necessary, for some small Special Education classes, desperately needed office space, and adult education.

Repair and re-roof the auditorium, some paving, and to generally upgrade the existing facilities within the limits of funds available.

Dr. Webb closed his remarks by stating, "We think that each child that comes to and through our systems should have an opportunity for the best education afforded anywhere, regardless of the size of the school. We strongly believe that when issues are presented to the public and it is known and understood that these are to take care of the educational needs of children,

Changes Made In City Police Department Here

The regular May meeting of the City Council was held in the City Hall Monday evening the 8th. Several items of major importance were discussed and handled.

The Council accepted the resignation of Mr. Clyde Vandygriff with regrets. Several members complimented Clyde for the work that he has done for the City during his employment. Other changes in the Police Department are being made at this time. Frank Russell, who has been acting in the dual capacity of Hale County Deputy and City Police Chief, will now work full time as Police Chief and Elton Sparkman will work as a County Deputy and City Patrolman. These changes will give Frank the opportunity to devote all of his time to serving Abernathy proper and will give Eldon experience in a broader field of law enforce-ment. The Council expressed its appreciation for the manner in which Frank has operated the Police Department as well as his personal devotion to

The tax roll which the Board of Equalization had just completed was accepted and approved by all members of the Council. It was noted that the present Board had spent a great deal of time and effort in making the decisions for this tax year. Making tax rolls, equalizing and approving tax rolls and more especially paying taxes is always unpleasant at best, so any action taken is subject to critical review. Mr. Irvan Rhodes, Mr. Don Mc-Kenzie and Mr. C. C. Turpin are to be commended for the manner in which they con-

ducted the business at hand. Mr. George Ragland was reappointed City Judge for a period of two years. Chief Russell reported that 17 abandoned vehicles have been removed from the streets during the past month. It was reported that gross receipts tax from Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for the first quarter had been received in the amount of \$1,465.81 and from Southwestern Public Service in the amount of

\$1,350.04. The prospects of having a paving project this summer look very dim at this time. There is a great deal of interest on the part of some individuals, but as has been explained before in a city our size paving districts cannot be created by the Council unless ALL property owners involved are willing to participate. The Council makes a final appeal to interested parties to check with the City Manager if anything is to be done this year.

The Council voted to send two firemen to the Texas A&M University Texas Firemen's Training School. Key rates on all insurance on buildings in the city are affected by this participation. The Council went on record commending our fine Volunteer Fire Department for their degree of excellence in the performance of their duties. The City Manager reported that a training program is now in progress headed by Gene Nunn, who the City recently sent to a training and rescue school at Texas A&M University. The Manager further reported that the "storm watching" section of the Fire Department has recently been reviewed by the State Civil Defense and rated excellent, far above the average for cities in our population bracket. We are extremely fortunate to have these fine dedicated men working for our safety and wel-

Nickerson Gets Post

ABERNATHY (Special) Luke Nickerson, head coach here for the past three seasons, announced Tuesday that he has accepted the position as head coach and athletic director at District 7-AAA Atlanta High

Nickerson resigned at the end of last season with his resignation effective at the end of the school year.

He will be moving to his new assignment this summer.

Atlanta, with a population of more than 5,000, is the largest town in Cass County.

"Atlanta has a rich athletic tradition and has some outstanding boys coming back. It looks like a very good situation to me," said Nickerson. "We hate to leave this part of the country we've been here so long, but this looked like a v er y good op-
